

#### Keeping the Membership informed, LTBA President Warren J. Harang, III

**B** reeding and foaling season are now well under way. Breeders are spending many restless nights awaiting the results of last year's pairings and dreaming that they will eventually be earning breeders awards checks with the resulting foals, and that their athletes might be honored as a champion in the future.

You can read in this magazine about the 2021 Accredited Louisiana Bred Champions, starting on page 30. While the leading breeders as well as the top stallion are determined by statistics, the racing champions and broodmare of the year are selected by vote of the LTBA membership, making it quite an honor. Congratulations to all of the connections. The over-all Louisiana Bred Horse of the Year will be named at Annual Awards Ceremony. We are holding the ceremony on June 11th, at Mojo's at Evangeline Downs in conjunction with the REAP fundraiser again this year. The annual REAP fundraiser is held each year to help Chaplain Dwight Brown raise monies to provide relief to those of the licensed Evangeline Downs community in need. Come out and celebrate with the connections as well as help with a worthy cause.

The first Accredited Louisianabred stakes day of 2022 was held at Delta Downs, Saturday, February 5th. Traditionally racing at Delta Downs has been at night, however continuing problems with the lighting system forced the move of Louisiana Premier Night to Louisiana Premier Day again. The weather was sunny and beautiful, and fans experienced an exceptional day of racing. You can read about Louisiana Premier Day starting on page 22.

Evangeline Downs has just begun its 2022 thoroughbred meet which will run through August 27. Louisiana Legends Night will run Saturday, June 4th. Now under new ownership, Louisiana Downs will be opening its thoroughbred meet May 7 and will run through September 27. At press time, the stakes calendar for Louisiana Downs has not yet been established. However, the Super Derby (which did not run in 2020 or 2021) because of Covid) is tentatively scheduled for September 10th, and we expect Louisiana Cup Day to be held in early August.

Following the success of the 2021 Breeders Sales Company of Louisiana Yearling Sale, the LTBA is hosting a 2022 Yearling Sale followed by Mixed Session October 1, 2022. The sale will take place at the Equine Sales Facility in Opelousas. Consignment forms will be available in May, with a closing date of July 6th. With purses on the rise thanks to the legislative approval of sports gaming and historic racing, I expect the demand to be high for Louisiana breds!

I encourage everyone to be actively involved in all aspects of our industry. Come to a board meeting; be informed and involved. Come to the races; bring your family and friends; the more interest we can generate, the better for all of us. I hope to see big crowds at the Awards Banquet as well as the big Louisiana Bred stakes days at Evangeline Downs and Louisiana Downs.

We at the LTBA are doing all we can to be of service to you, the breeders. If you have any questions about our program, the staff in our office at Fair Grounds is happy to help. I personally am always happy to hear from you, especially with suggestions for improving our program.

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
#### EXAGGERATOR

Few horses enter the Louisiana stallion market with grade 1 credentials; fewer still come in with a Classic win to their names. At present, such a record belongs to only one stallion in the Pelican State: Exaggerator, now standing his first season in Louisiana at Elite Thoroughbreds after making his first four seasons at WinStar Farm in Kentucky.

A foal of 2013, Exaggerator broke his maiden at second asking over six furlongs at Del Mar before gaining greater attention at the Saratoga meeting. Last in the early going in the Saratoga Special (G2), the colt drove through a narrow gap between horses to defeat favored Saratoga Mischief, with future grade 2 winner Holding Gold among the also-rans. Over a fast track, his time for the 6½ furlongs was a respectable 1:16.39.

Exaggerator followed that effort with a second to Brody's Cause (also the winner of the 2016 Toyota Blue Grass Stakes, G1) in the Claiborne Breeders' Futurity (G1) at Keeneland and a fourth-place finish behind juvenile champion Nyquist in the Sentient Jets Breeders' Cup Juvenile (G1). He went out a winner for the season in the Delta Downs Jackpot Stakes (G3). Going to the front earlier than had been his custom, Exaggerator turned back a challenge by Champagne Stakes (G1) runner-up Sunny Ridge (a future two-time grade 3 winner and earner of over \$1.4 million) to win by a neck. Future grade 3 winner Harlan Punch was third, and future champion sprinter Whitmore checked in fifth.

As might be expected for a son of Curlin, Exaggerator improved significantly at 3. Second to Nyquist in the seven-furlong San Vicente Stakes (G2) in his season opener and third in the San Felipe Stakes (G2) over 8.5 furlongs next out, the colt put it all together in the Santa Anita Derby, sailing home by 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lengths over multiple grade 1 winner Mor Spirit in the slop. Second to Nyquist again in the Kentucky Derby—Presented by Yum! Brands (G1) after a less than ideal trip, Exaggerator finally turned the tables on his previously unbeaten rival in the Preakness Stakes (G1), winning by 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lengths as Cherry Wine nosed out Nyquist for second.



Continuing to compete against the best of his division, Exaggerator appeared to struggle with the deeper surfaces at Belmont and Saratoga in unplaced runs in the Belmont Stakes (G1) and Travers Stakes (G1), respectively, but in between those races collected his third grade 1 win of the season in the Betfair.com Haskell Invitational Stakes. He did not win again and finished his career having won six of 15 starts for earnings of \$3,581,120.

By modern standards, Exaggerator displayed remarkable toughness and durability, making those 15 starts within a period of 16 months and racing at 10 different tracks. While he gained the reputation of being an off-track specialist, his Saratoga Special win was on a dry track, as was his second in the Kentucky Derby.

Exaggerator belongs to the Smart Strike branch of the Mr. Prospector male line, a branch noted for yielding classic stamina. The winner of the 1996 Philip H. Iselin Handicap (G1) and a half brother to 1991 Canadian Horse of the Year Dance Smartly, Smart Strike led the American general sire list twice and left three good stallion sons in Curlin, English Channel, and Lookin At Lucky. All three were racetrack chamCurlin was the best of the three as a racer, winning Horse of the Year titles at ages 3 and 4, and has also been Smart Strike's top sire son in North America, ranking among the

Chile.

America, ranking among the top five general sires four times. His runners have generally been two-turn horses that start showing their best as 3year-olds.

pions at 3 or older gained their reputations at stud by siring two-turn horses, though Lookin At Lucky (who was a champion at 2 as well as 3) has also sired a number of top juveniles in

Exaggerator's ability to win at the graded level as a 2-yearold shows the influence of his dam Dawn Raid, whose other two winners both scored over sprint distances. A daughter of 2002 champion 2-year-old

male Vindication (by Seattle Slew), Dawn Raid was stakes-placed as a juvenile in Canada and is a half sister to 2011 Canadian champion older female Embur's Song (by Unbridled's Song), a stakes winner over distances from 6.5 to 8.5 furlongs. Dawn Raid is also a half sister to juvenile stakes winner Ten Point (by Meadowlake) and to Embattle, a stakes-placed sprinter at 2 and 3. Dawn Raid's dam Embur Sushine (by the good speed sire Bold Ruckus) is out of Vevila, a winning daughter of The Minstrel.

In spite of his own staying ability, Exaggerator appears to be throwing more to the speedier elements of his pedigree. He had 25 individual 2-year-old winners last year, headed by stakes winner Pacific Coast, and his 80 individual winners of 2021 made him the top second-crop sire by number of winners. While he has sired winners from a variety of sire lines, his best



results appear to be coming when his mates return both Seattle Slew and Mr. Prospector. He has also done well with inbreeding to Deputy Minister, and he has had some success with mares from the Danzig and Storm Cat branches of Northern Dancer as well.

Physically, Exaggerator is a good-sized, strongly made stallion with good bone and substance whose overall appearance is more reminiscent of the Seattle Slew tribe than of his sire. "He's a beautiful physical specimen, and we are very pleased to have him here," says Michele Rodriguez of Elite Thoroughbreds. "He retired 100 percent sound and is a great horse to handle, very easy. His first mares this season have already checked in pregnant, so fertility is not a problem."

Currently second on the Louisiana sire list, Exaggerator is standing the 2022 season for \$5,000 live foal.

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# REVITALIZING LOUISIANA DOWNS

### Preston Positioning Louisiana Downs for Move Into Future

Less than six months at helm of Louisiana Downs, co-owner and new president Kevin Preston is working hard to revitalize the beleaguered Bossier City facility and return it to a onceprominent position among America's racetracks.

The track, near Shreveport, has long languished with low attendance and diminishing handle as well as smaller purses, heavily subsidized by slots revenue, but Preston, who took charge



November 1, 2021, is adamant he intends to turn things around.

Before Preston's Rubico Gaming closed on the track's purchase and assumed ownership from Caesars Entertainment November

> 1st, he got the impression during tours of the track that there were two different companies running operations: the racing side and the casino side. His goal is to have one team oversee both to ensure smooth operations, especially after horsemen said they felt a bit alienated.

> "We had meetings with (the horsemen)," said Preston. "They've come to find its becoming more of a family environment within the organization.

> "They talked about some of the things that

had been neglected on the backside. We completely re-did the tote board, painting, power washing, we re-did the kitchen on the backside, new security—the little huts that they have—there's a lot of things that we're doing. They are able to see what's going on and they've been really happy and positive about what we've really just scratched the surface on. We're not anywhere near the completion from a project standpoint."

Perhaps of greater concern, one that affects horsemen throughout the state who race at Louisiana Downs, is the dramatic decline in total purses during the last decade.

Louisiana Downs has seen total purses for Thoroughbreds plummet by more than \$5 million over the

last 10 years: from \$13,442,435 in 2012 to \$8,390,940 in 2021 while breeder supplements fell from \$429,225 to \$151,250 over the same period.

In 2021, average daily purses were \$99,582 at the 84-day meeting. At press time, Preston and Director of Racing David Heitzmann had yet to finalize the purse structure as well as the stakes schedule for the upcoming 84-day meet, which starts May 7, but

Preston stressed purses are of the utmost importance.

"I think the biggest thing for us is finding ways to increase the purses," said Preston, who is president and a co-founder of Rubico Gaming, which paid \$22 million to acquire Louisiana Downs from Ceasars and real estate investment trust VICI Properties, a Ceasars spinoff.

Gaming giant Caesars sold the track to focus on sports betting, which commenced in Louisiana October 31 at two of its properties: Horseshoe Bossier City Hotel & Casino, a longtime competitor with Louisiana Downs' casino operation.

Preston, too, is ushering in sports betting at Louisiana Downs while presiding over a new era that he hopes will see attendance and wagering return to levels that made it a top track nationally in the 1970s and '80s.

The track is partnering with Caesars on the sportsbook, which will be called Louisiana Downs Sportsbook. Also in the works with Caesars is a mobile wagering app.

"You won't see a Caesars name necessarily on anything," Preston said, adding that the sportsbook will have over 40 TVs, chairs, couches, and "phenomenal" food.

Caesars share in revenue from sports betting is private, he said.

Preston said the sportsbook would be laid out the same as the sportsbook at Magnolia Bluffs Casino, launched in 2018, in Natchez, Mississippi, which his Premier Gaming Group operates.

"The experience factor and just the technology factor—the TVs and sound system—it will be a great place for someone to come and watch games."

Louisiana Downs also coordinated with Caesars on updating IT infrastructure, which in addition to the sportsbook includes parimutuels and slots.

"We had to change out all the back of the house: the IT and (Security Operations Systems) systems, computers, software, and that's been a little bit of a headache because some of the things are so old," Preston said. "It did take a little time to get up to date."

Preston also said the casino would see over 100 new slot machines, replacing many outdated ones.

"Some of the games were older than 20 years, we couldn't even get parts for them," he said. "We also put HHR (historical horse racing) machines at the casino and also at our Mound (OTB) facility.

HHR machines play like slot machines, but instead of using a random number generator, the games use results from past horse races through a pari-mutuel system. The historical racing machines, approved by the Louisiana Legislature last summer, should be operational this spring, Preston said.

Other improvements include getting a new track ambulance, a couple of new tractors, a timing system, and two new restaurants.

First opened in October 1974 by Edward DeBartolo at a cost of \$30 million, Louisiana Downs sprawled over 300 acres and brought the first pari-mutuel wagering to an area where there was plenty opposition to racing.

The track was heavily marketed to Texas and Oklahoma where gambling was illegal at the time. At first, on-track business was less than ideal, but overcoming its initial problems, such as low attendance and wagering, track management began billing it as "America's Fastest Growing Racetrack" as racegoers flocked to Bossier City from Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Oklahoma City, and Tulsa to attend the races.

The track's centerpiece, the Super Derby (G2), was first run in 1980 with a \$500,000 purse, at the time making it the nation's richest race for 3-year-old Thoroughbreds and helping cement the track's growing reputation.

Over the years the race attracted 13 classics winners, and six previous Super Derby runners have won

the prestigious Breeders' Cup Classic (G1). Three Super Derby winners—Tiznow, Sunday Silence and Alysheba—have been voted the Eclipse Award as Horse of the Year.

The race was not run in 2020 and 2021 due to Covid and is tentatively set for September 10 this year.

Preston said interest from horse-

men in racing at Louisiana Downs is growing day by day. A big selling point is the track surface, and he has committed to its maintenance.

"The one thing I've heard unanimously from all the horsemen, jockeys, is that we definitely have the best track surface in and around Louisiana. We're going to make sure we keep it in tip-top shape.

"Over the course of the last couple of months David said that we've gotten more requests from horsemen wanting (stalls) than we've had before, so that's a telltale sign that we're doing right."

Louisiana Downs has 1,599 stalls, and the backstretch and track are open for training year-round.

Heitzmann, who had been racing secretary since 2010 was named director of racing in 2018, is just one of several track executives Preston, now in his first position at a racetrack, relies on for advice and guidance. Heitzmann's knowledge and expertise comes from his affiliation with many racetracks across the country prior joining Louisiana Downs, including Keeneland, Arlington Park, Fair Grounds, and Churchill Downs.

Preston was born in Chicago, and lives in Union, Kentucky. He originally moved to Northern Kentucky to become CEO of Tropicana Gaming, a subsidiary of Columbia Sussex, which filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy in 2009. From there he started his own casino company and has been in the casino business about 30 years.

Preston's first experience in the casino business came in 1992 when an intern at Harrah's Casino in Joliet, Illinois, through the University of St. Francis. He graduated in 1995 with a degree in industrial organization, psychology, and business management.

"I grew up going to the tracks in Chicago—Arlington, Maywood, and living in Kentucky one hour away from Churchill and Keeneland, so I sort of grew up on the tracks," Preston said. "I'm a casino guy and never actually worked at a racetrack, but there's nothing daunting. I think it's just making sure you've got the right people in the right places. overall standpoint, it's just been a great experience so far."

Preston's partner in Rubico Gaming is gaming investor Tom Benninger, whom he met when the latter was on the Tropicana board of directors. Benninger, a former board of directors' member of Caesars Entertainment, is involved in several casino and gaming companies. He also led Rubico Gaming's partnership with Toronto-based Clairvest Group in recently purchasing Delaware Park.


Preston said he was not involved in the Delaware Park deal and emphasized his focus on Louisiana Downs and crafting its resurgence.

"I think the biggest thing is marketing here," he said of Louisiana Downs. "There's a lot of people who are like 'Oh, Louisiana Downs is still racing?' It's odd that they think that.

"We're focused on getting all the food trucks, inflatables, and fireworks that are going to happen (opening day, May 7), and just creating a wow factor for folks coming for the first time and who will continue to come as regular customers."

As for any interest in racing horses himself now that he has taken the reins of such a special racetrack, Preston said the notion has its allure.

"It's really tempting when you're sitting up there watching them race, that's for sure."

The 19th running of Louisiana Premier Day at Delta Downs on Feb. 5 couldn't have been scripted out any better. With clear skies and a cool breeze, the 11-race program featured 10 stakes races and more than \$900,000 in total purse money for Louisiana-bred horses who were vying for hoof-pounding greatness. Not only was the weather picture perfect, but the betting handle soared to \$3,075,587, which was nearly \$800,000 more than last year's soirée.

A new champion would be crowned in this year's Louisiana Premier Championship as the two-time defending race winner Underpressure has taken a much-deserved break from competition. Langs Day showed up and showed out with a late move to the far outside with pilot Ty Kennedy and rumbled by all nine entries to win the \$150,000 pièce de resistance with a time of 1:48.23.

"He is a simple, yet hard horse to ride," said Kennedy. "You have to let him find himself, but once he hits the three-eighths pole he does the rest and I just let the big guy roll."

Several horses vied for the early lead before longshot Beauregard stuck a head in front at fractions of 23.85 and 48.37. Speaktomeoflove, the third betting choice, looked to be the one to catch as he made a move to grab the lead down the homestretch, but Langs Day rumbled by at the 1/16th pole to win by a half-length for trainer Lee Thomas and owner Keith Plaisance.

"His character is his favorite attribute," said Thomas. "He loves to run late and that's a timing thing on a bullring track, but he loves it here. He should be a poster boy for Delta Downs." The 5-year-old gelded-son of New Year's Day, who returned \$5.40 to win bettors, won for the sixth time in 10 starts in Vinton, and more importantly 6-17 with lifetime earnings of \$277,040.

"I got excited watching the far turn," added Thomas. "When you see your horse with a chance at the top of the stretch, that's all you ask for. It's exhilarating and I am glad what he accomplished today."

The final order of finish was Langs Day, Speaktomeoflove, Jimi's a Star, Venn, Beauregard, Luck of the Draw, Maga Man, Jax Man, Izzy's Baby Boy and Magawildtime.

Jockey Tim Thornton said that Net a Bear was difficult during the early stages of the 100,000 Louisiana Premier Distaff. The 6year-old daughter of Awesome Bet was unhurried in the one-mile affair as she let early speed do all the work, which included the post-time favorite Winning Romance, who set the tone at 24.48 and 49.57 before running out of gas.

As the group reached the final turn, Thornton and Net a Bear had to angle out from the rail in the upper stretch to rundown three horses. She dueled with Fort Polk, but was up late to win by a half-length in 1:42.08.

"I had to let her do her own thing," said Thornton. "She was difficult with me early on."

Net a Bear (\$7.20) is now a sixtime stakes winner for trainer Allen Landry and owners Maximo Lamarche and Federico Deltoro. She won the \$100,000 Magnolia Stakes earlier this meet at Delta Downs and the \$100,000 Louisiana Champions Day Distaff in December at the Fair Grounds.

"It's hard to find a good one like her," said Landry. "She comes running every trip."

The mare improved to 10-30 lifetime with earnings of \$523,870.

The final order of the Louisiana Premier Distaff was Net a Bear, Fort Polk, Snowball, Winning Romance, Jet Sweep, Saints N Muskets and Eileen Alexandra.

"I give all the credit to Chasey (Pomier) and Pedro (Cotto)," said Stover. "This filly is a breeder's dream. She is a once-in-a-lifetime horse for me. It's phenomenal the way she keeps winning."

Trainer Allen Landry said Vodka Grimlet had trouble in his last start in the \$100,000 Louisiana Champions Day Prince on Dec. 11 at the Fair Grounds and if the 3year-old son of multiple Breeders' Cup stakes winner Goldencents avoided trouble in the Premier Prince, he would be tough to beat. Landry was right.

"Thomas (Pompell) found a good spot for him," said Landry. "I told him, 'Don't give up on him. He will come' and he did. That was a fast time, too."

Big Chopper set the field's swift early pace at 23.13 and 47.17.

Pompell and Vodka Gimlet moved up around the final turn and dueled with stablemate Brian's Iron Mike before driving clear to win by 2 1/4 lengths and cover the one-mile contest in an impressive time of 1:41.76. Landry also trained the second-place runner, Brian's Iron Mike.

The post-time favorite and twotime stakes winner, Unified Report, was never involved.

Owned by Ellen Epstein, Vodka Gimlet (\$15.20) is now 2-6 with earnings of \$102,645.

"It's very valuable to have a

good, sound horse of this caliber in the state of Louisiana," said Faucheux. "He loves Delta Downs and he loves the outside post position."

Faucheux gave another big compliment to Bertie's Galaxy when he compared him to his multiple stakes winning retired sprinter, Monte Man, who won nine stakes' races, with nearly \$800,000 in earnings, and has just been voted Accredited Louisiana Bred Champion Older Male by the LTBA membership

Bertie's Galaxy improved to 10-23 and upped the earnings to \$382,850. Not bad for a horse who was claimed for \$20,000 in his first start by owner Allen Cassedy.

"She is just so classy and amazing," said jockey Thomas Pompell. "I just hung on for the ride."

Icy Charlie, who ran second to Cilla in the \$75,000 Orleans Stakes at Delta Downs on Jan. 7, tried to steal the 5-furlong race by going gate-to-wire, but was caught at the 3/8-pole and the rest is history.

Cilla (\$2.40) pulled away to win by 4 3/4-lengths covering the distance in 59.73 to improve to 7-14 overall with \$476,000 lifetime earnings being added to the

bankroll for owner P. Dale Ladner.

48.12 and 1:13.98. That's when the calvary of horses began to make their move including Greeley's Dealer. Guerrero used his instincts to guide the gelding to a 3/4-length win in 1:49.55 over the 1 1/16-mile race.

"I claimed him for \$12,500 last year at Delta specifically for this race," said trainer and owner Dale White Sr. "He doesn't run very good in the summer (He is a nonsweater), so he sure liked the cooler weather today."

White commended Guerrero for making a bold move with the horse. "We got jammed up on the rail and



Pedro (Guerrero) made a good move at the rail and that's what won us the race."

Greeley's Dealer (\$14.40) is now 15-55 overall, 11 of those wins in Vinton, for career earnings of \$357,285.

The 5-year-old gelded son of Alternation won the \$50,000 Premier Ragin Cajun Starter in and impressive fashion – the horse's first stakes win in his 31-race career – and covered 5 furlongs in 59.42 to win by 3 1/2 lengths.

"Keith told me the horse was tearing the stall down, so I knew he was ready to run," said Melancon. "He was able to relax by himself during the race. Once I got behind the speed horse (Farewell Time), I knew I could get running before Double Barrel Man could get close. He is a very versatile horse."

Charles claimed Alterana for \$5,000 last summer at Evangeline Downs.

"I really needed some horses to fill up my barn stalls," said Charles. "I thought he would be a good one and he has been. We gave him a little time off and now he has won four in a row. He's been all horse."

Returning a modest \$4.40 for win bettors, Alterana has earned \$211,320 with nine victories.

As for a successful season with Melancon, Charles added, "Gerard is the man. He has been very good to me."

"We claimed her for \$5,000 during the last weekend of racing at Delta Downs last April," said Ramirez. "We took her to Evangeline Downs and she won a few races. We got really lucky. She was claimed for \$5,000, but the claim was voided due to a technicality. So we put her in some allowance races. She won and we shortened her up. We thought she deserved a chance."

Ramirez told rider Joel

Dominguez to keep the mare close to the pace, and that he did.

"I've rode her a few times, so I have gotten to know her," said Dominguez. "I had the speed on the inside, so I waited my time and she took me to the finish line."

Wild Mallory shot out of the gate and set swift fractions of 22.67 and 46.53. She couldn't match the stride of Madison's Place (\$5.80), who blew by to win by 3 3/4 lengths in 59.41.

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# RUN LIKE A GIRL

With 6 wins from 12 starts, including 5 Stakes Wins, Free Like A Girl Brings a Whole Different Meaning to the Expression "Run Like a Girl" By Martha Claussen

It's always interesting to follow the ascent of a young racehorse especially if he or she shows prominence as a 2-year-old. The breeder is listed in the program and past performances, but the history behind the title is not often known.

2021 Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association Champion 2year-old filly Free Like a Girl has quite an interesting story involving her breeders: sisters Kim Renee Stover and Lisa Osborne.

They grew up in Clearwater, Florida and Kim was destined for a life with horses. She was a jockey, riding both Thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses in Texas and Louisiana. Forced to retire in 2006 when she was thrown from her mount out of the gate at Evangeline Downs, Stover remained in a coma for 20 days. Her arduous recovery process would have derailed the majority of those suffering trauma to the brain, but is a true testament to her grit and courage.

Kim's younger sister, Lisa, ponied horses at several racetracks prior to becoming an x-ray technician. She will never forget Kim's battle following her spill.

horrible," "It was stated Osborne. "Jockeys come off horses all the time, but this was very serious. The medical staff didn't think she would recover, but they didn't know Kim! I told them that when she woke up, she was going to want to leave. They called to let me know she had come out of the coma, and sure enough, she was walking out of the room. The nurse told me that in her 20-year career, she had never seen anything like that!"

Stover still does not remember the accident but soldiered bravely through rehabilitation.

"I had balance issues and could only recall what happened in the

last three-hours," she explained. "I didn't know if I would see or feel anything. I had a dead spot in my brain, but thankfully, over time, the brain reworks."

Stover has a farm in Starks, Louisiana and cares for 12 mares each year: some Louisiana-breds and others out-of state. She sale preps for Paul Pruett, a former trainer who she won races for as a jockey. As the 2018 Fall Mixed Equine Sale in Opelousas, Louisiana approached, Kim and Lisa decided to buy a mare. Kim looked at the catalog and had three mares circled. One was Flashy Prize, a Kentucky-bred daughter of Flashy Bull. She had won just \$33,000 in her racing career and was in foal for the third time, this time to first-crop stallion El Deal.

Pruett reminded Stover that Flashy Prize did not have one bid in the previous sale. Jay Adcock, of Red River Farms, who stands El Deal, also nixed the idea.

The sisters were prepared to spend \$2,000 at the sale, but somehow were able to purchase Flashy Prize for just \$500.

"Lisa and I are cheap people," admitted Stover.

Knowing what was to come with Free Like a Girl, cheap might have been one of the understatements of the century.

Free Like a Girl made her arrival on February 24 at Stover's farm in Starks.

"We didn't name her, but because she was born around Desi Arnaz's birthday, her nickname is Desi," said Stover.

Free Like a Girl was sent to Carl

Deville and his daughter, Chasey Deville Pomier and began her racing career for owner Gerald Bruno, Jr.

She ran second in her debut on May 8, 2021, at Lone Star Park, in open company, and followed that with another runner-up finish two weeks later. She looked poised to break the maiden in her third start, also at Lone Star, but she had traffic woes and rider Richard Eramia was forced to take her off the rail and mount a bid.

On July 9 at Evangeline Downs, Free Like a Girl notched her first win. Pedro Cotto, Jr. had the call and has remained her rider to date. Despite a poor break in the \$50,000 Louisiana Juvenile Fillies on August 21 at Louisiana Downs, in which she spotted her rivals by ten lengths, she rallied for third. Whether the experience paid off or the patient handling by Cotto.

Free Like a Girl sparkled in the \$60,000 D.S. Shine Young Futurity on September 21 at Evangeline Downs and won back-to back stakes at Delta Downs. She dominated nine rivals in the \$100,000 Louisiana Jewel on October 22 and scored another impressive victory one month later in the \$100,000 My Trusty Cat Stakes.

Her final two starts of 2021 came at Fair Grounds where she ran second in the \$100,000 Louisiana Lassie on Champions Day. But she left no doubt as to who was best 2-year-old filly the \$109,600 Louisiana Futurity. The bay filly quickly took command, extending her lead and crossing the wire of the six furlong feature by 6 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lengths in a final time of 1:11.11.

"We stuck with the plan to get her close to the pace," Cotto, Jr. said in a post-race interview. "When I got a chance, I put her in the clear, and she just did her thing today. I don't think she's even as good as she can get right now. That's one thing that has impressed me about her. I think she's just going to get better when she gets older."

Free Like a Girl began her 3year-old campaign on February 5 with a gate-to-wire romp on Louisiana Premier Day at Delta Downs, winning the \$100,000 Starlet by four lengths. Her connections sent her to Oaklawn Park where she ran fourth in the Grade 3, \$300,000 Honeybee on February 26. The winner, Secret Oath, showed so much dominance that her conditioner, Hall of Famer D. Wayne Lukas will run her against the boys in the Grade 1, Arkansas Derby.

"There were people who disagreed with her running outside of Louisiana, but she deserved a chance," said Stover. "We were not embarrassed."

Free Like a Girl has won six of her 12 starts and has already banked \$356,473 for her current owner partnership of Gerald Bruno, Jr; Carl J, Deville; Chasey Deville Pomier and Jerry Caroom.

While the training and race selection for Free Like a Girl is in the hands of Deville, Pomier and the owners, the entire Stover family continues to be 100% emotionally

invested. Kim and Lisa's mom, Helen Stover, bakes her prize cheesecake for Pomier's team each time Free Like a Girl wins.

"Our mother makes a cheesecake to die for," stated Osborne. "It's her own recipe and at 87, she still has the magic!"

There may be some icing on the cake of Free Like a Girl in June, when LTBA holds its annual banquet and announces its Horse of the Year. Could a \$500 purchase by two sisters possibly become the first 2-year-old filly to claim that coveted honor?

"Free Like a Girl is our once in a lifetime horse," said Stover. "Trying to get the right cross is a guessing game, and breeding to a high dollar stallion is not what we are all about. She's a blessing!"

## **CONFORMATION AFFECTS MOTION**

Nonformation refers to body structures and how they are put together; body proportions and angles, leg angles, straightness or imbalance in limbs/feet. All of these factors play a role in how the horse moves, how his feet push off and strike the ground, how hooves wear and grow, and whether there will be limb interference while traveling. We try to select horses with the least conformational faults that might hinder racing performance. No horse is perfect, however, so we try to choose a good one and help him with proper foot care.

Observing a horse standing and in motion, assessing his action and conformation, is important in determining how his feet should be trimmed and shod, enabling him to travel most efficiently and stay sound, with the least stress on limb structures. Good trimming and shoeing can help most horses perform to their optimum potential.

Ideally, leg action should be free-flowing, with feet and legs moving forward in relatively straight lines. No horse travels perfectly straight, but exaggerated deviations will cause problems. A horse with crooked legs and crooked foot flight puts strain on bones, joints, tendons and ligaments and is less likely to stay sound. When working at speed, he's also likely to strike himself (especially when shod, since weight added to the feet accentuates any deviation in foot flight) and may injure his legs. A horse with well-formed feet and legs tends to handle the stresses of athletic activity with less risk for injury and is less apt to develop arthritic joints.

An experienced horseman can tell a lot about how the horse handles his feet just by "reading" feet and shoes (observing wear points), but some clues about how the horse moves become more obvious when you observe leg and body angles and also watch his limbs in motion.

Steve Norman, a Kentucky farrier who shoes a lot of racehorses, says there are basically three main types of leg structure: toed out, toed in, and "normal" (with feet moving in relatively straight lines). "If a horse doesn't have straight legs and feet, the foot flight will be altered," says Norman.

"The two basic toe-out structures are deviational (lower legs splaying outward from the knees—which may be knockkneed—or from the fetlock joints) and rotational (the whole leg is rotated). If the leg is rotated, the horse's elbows are turned inward and the whole leg is turned outward," explains Norman.

If toes are turned outward due to deviational conformation, foot flight will arc inward. There will also be distortions in the hoof capsule due to uneven weight bearing. "Deviational conformation puts a lot of pressure on the inside quarters, which can create sheared heels. Rotational conformation won't put quite as much additional concussion on the inside of the foot, and if that foot is trimmed and balanced, both heels could possibly land at the same time; there won't be as much stress on just one heel," he says.

The horse with toed-out conformation will have a rolled-in heel and straight wall on the inside, and a flared or more angled wall on the outside. The hoof capsule is pushed outward. "This creates foot distortion that necessitates support on the inside corner when shod. The farrier may also need to eliminate a flare on the outside. Supporting the inside is especially important on a deviational conformation, because that heel will tend to roll under," explains Norman.

With a toed-in horse, effects are usually the opposite. The horse breaks over to the outside of the foot and wears the outside more. "We need to support the lateral side (outside) of the foot each time it's shod, to reduce pressure and concussion. A horse with this conformational defect generally lands off balance. There may be some differences in how you deal with this, depending on whether the horse has a short pastern or long pastern; you might have to give more hoof support to а Thoroughbred due to pastern length and foot angle," he says.

Conformation and movement, and how these are addressed when trimming or shoeing, must also be looked at in terms of the horse's age. A foal has important considerations that will be different from the mature animal whose bones are no longer growing. Some corrections can be made in a foal, even up through yearling age. Changes are easier to accomplish when bones are growing fast, and cannot be accomplished after bones have stopped growing.

## **HOOF BALANCE**

Conformation can be evaluated as static balance and dynamic balance (during movement). Static balance involves the way a horse is put together, the way he stands, and the way he loads his limbs, bones, joints and hoof capsule while standing.

There are two forces that affect that static balance. The ground force (opposing force of the ground against the foot/leg) balances/cancels out forces coming down the leg (the horse's weight). The other force is called the phenomenon of creep. We see this in wood structures that support weight (compression) or resist pulling forces (tension) over time. When something is under chronic compression, tension or torque, it will eventually yield and move.

The hoof capsule is affected by these forces. Toe grabs or calks affect the horse's static balance by causing the foot to load different than it was trimmed. The toe is elevated as the horse stands still (such as in a stall), overloading the heels (excessive compression) and slinging the sole off the ground. This puts excessive tension on the laminae at the toe, and compression on the sole.

This static imbalance can have two unhealthy results. It compromises blood supply to the heel area and slows heel growth. Second, it lifts the toe and sole off the ground, putting more tension on the front of the hoof wall. This can lead to dished toes, stretched white lines and flat soles, over time.

The hoof capsule is constantly growing. It is also elastic, and changes shape according to the weight it bears. With good conformation, limbs are proportional (without undo stress on any one part). As you look down the leg from a front or rear view, you want the joints to be directly under one another. If horse's legs are proportionately straight, the hoof capsules are also loaded proportionately for good balance.

## **STATIC BALANCE**

Equine feet are rarely symmetrical. It's common to have a straighter wall on the medial side (inside) and a slightly more angled wall on the lateral side (outside of the foot). Not only are there differences between inside and outside wall, but front feet are not shaped the same as hind feet. Horses bear weight differently on fronts versus hinds.

When viewed from the side, you can see that most of the weight on the front feet is on the back half of the foot, especially when under load. On hind feet, most of the weight is on the front part of the foot, due to the leg's relationship to (and weight distribution of) the body. Consequently, as a general rule, we don't see as many underslung heels on hind feet as front feet.

Looking at just front feet, or just hind feet, they should match and be a mirror image of one another, but they're not perfectly symmetrical. Regarding front legs, if we look at a normal horse from the front, his body mass is slung/suspended on the inside of the front legs. As a result, as the foal grows, there is always a little more weight on the inside of the leg and foot than there is on the outside. That's why there's asymmetry in the coffin bone (front to side) and we see this reflected in the hoof capsule.

The compressive forces on the foot as it lands and impacts the ground will also influence hoof shape. Front legs generally bear a little more weight on the inside of the limb. As the limb begins to bear weight during movement, the fetlock joint usually bends inward as well as downward. This puts more force on the inside of the legs. There must be compensating factors to address this force.

Although a foal is born with very symmetrical coffin bones, as he grows and the foot bears more weight, the inside of the coffin bone remodels to handle the load and concussion and becomes straighter up and down. The outside has а little more angle. Consequently the inside of the hoof is a little straighter and the outside wall a little less straight, and this is normal. Taken to extreme, however, this outside angle becomes a flare. But front feet should be matched pairs, even though they are not perfectly round.

On hind feet, if you look at horses from behind, some horses tend to be more base narrow behind than they are in front. As a result, the leg compensates by having a little more outward rotation when standing. Hind legs are not set outside the frame of the body (as they are in the front); they go right into the pelvis. There's a major grouping of muscles on the hindquarters, and often the legs are set on the inside of that mass, rather than outside.

Even if a horse's hind legs rotate

slightly outward, with his toes pointing slightly off center to the outside (which is the most common/normal hind leg conformation) he can be fairly correct behind. When you look at his footprints as he stands squarely, his toes are pointing to 11 o'clock and 1 o'clock, rather than what conventional halter horse conformation would dictate (toes pointing straight forward at 12 o'clock).

When we look at the horse standing, if conformation is a problem, we see it in the way the hoof wall remodels. If that remodeling continues unchecked, we find unhealthy coffin bone remodeling. The "creep" we see in the feet of horses with conformation faults who stand all day in stalls is a result of disproportionate weight on the feet beyond normal physiological limits. Areas of the foot that are more loaded will grow less. Areas that are not loaded grow more. If there is a conformation fault, it puts the limb and ultimately the foot into an unequal loading pattern and the horse needs a shorter shoeing cycle (more frequent trim) to prevent major imbalance. Feet get out of balance much more quickly if they have a conformational fault.

When horses with correct conformation grow long feet, even if the long toe becomes a little dished or the heels roll under, all we have to do is trim away excess growth, re-sculpt the hoof shape, and they are fine. But if a horse has a medial-lateral imbalance (base wide or base narrow) the feet will be flaring and there's a lot more hoof capsule warping we must to try to correct.

Growth on a normal foot (with straight limbs) is not as detrimental as the extra growth on a conformationally-challenged foot. A very correct horse, even if his feet grow long and neglected at pasture, when the long feet break off they will still be relatively well balanced.

## **DYNAMIC BALANCE**

The way a horse moves (dynamic balance) is directly related to static balance. The less correct a horse's conformation, the more faulty the gait. Normal movement of horses is not two-dimensional. Because of the design and function of joints, limb movements are three-dimensional. As the conformationally-correct horse moves and gains more speed, there is subtle medial to lateral variation as the front foot bears weight, and more weight on the lateral (outside) toe than the center of the toe.

The timing of each phase of the stride changes with speed and gait, but these phases are present in all gaits. Phases of the stride are generally referred to as impact phase (heel strike), slide phase, loading phase (mid-stance is when the fetlock joint is fully loaded and the cannon bone perpendicular to the ground), heel up and break-over phase, and swing phase when the limb is in the air.

It's critical for athletic soundness that these phases of stride occur in organized and sequential manner. Faulty conformation tends to affect the normal timing of the stride phases, which in turn can result not only in faulty gait but lameness in some cases. As lameness progresses it will also affect timing and placement of the foot and leg during these phases of the stride.

In gaits faster than a walk, some phases of the stride are accelerating and some are decelerating the speed of the limb. For example, when the foot leaves the ground the whole limb is protracted forward, gaining speed. When the limb is fully extended it retracts or pulls down to the ground in a steeper angle, slowing its speed, getting ready for impact.

When the foot is pulled back down to the ground, it doesn't land flat. It's more common for the outside of the foot to land a fraction of a second before the inside. Some people think that if horses land outside heel first, they slap the inside heel down. But high-speed videos show that normal horses land outside heel first and by the time the foot gradually comes to a slide and stops, the inside heel is loaded, a smooth transference of weight and loading.

There's some rotation of the hinge joints and other joints in the leg. They all function and articulate around a rotation; they don't articulate on just one plane like a machine. Almost all joints have some rotation. Also, as the horse pulls the leg back down--to land the hoof on the ground--the extensor and flexor muscles work together to make this a smooth transition.

The extensor muscles are on the outside of the forearm. As the horse is pulling the leg down and preloading the joint so it's in a closed/packed position (to bear weight) and ready to hit the ground, the muscles tend to pull the leg outward slightly in a lateral motion. If you watch the horse's legs in motion, they are never moving in an absolutely straight line. There's always a little medial/lateral deviation as the foot makes its flight, and this is never a problem unless the inward or outward swing is excessive.

## Graham 's Cruiser First Winner for Hard Aces

Graham 's Cruiser became the first winner for Louisiana stallion Hard Aces when he won a statebred maiden race at Delta Downs Feb. 11.

The 3-year-old raced in fourth for the first three-eighths of a mile before gaining on the leaders and taking the lead in the final furlong. He won by three-quarters of a length, racing five furlongs in 1:00.78 under C. J. McMahon.

Wayne Schexnayder bred Graham 's Cruiser in Louisiana out of the Harborage mare Rich Rezultz. The gelding is one of her four winners from five to race.

Hard Aces, a millionaire by Hard Spun, won the 2015 Gold Cup at Santa Anita Stakes (G1) in his top achievement for owner Hronis Racing and trainer John Sadler. In subsequent years, he added the 2016 Cougar II Handicap (G3) at Del Mar and the 2017 Tokyo City Cup Stakes (G3) at Santa Anita Park.

He was retired after running 11th in the Berkeley Handicap (G3) at Golden Gate Fields in November 2017 and went to stud the following year at Averett Farm in Louisiana. He currently stands there for a \$2,000 fee.

## Honor A. P.'s First Reported Foal Born in Louisiana

Lane's End's grade 1 winner Honor A. P. sired his first reported foal Jan. 27 at Coteau Grove Farms near Sunset, La. Bred by Coteau Grove, the filly is out of multiple graded-placed stakes winner Joanie's Catch .

"The resemblance of this filly to her sire is uncanny, right down to her four white socks," said Andrew Cary, Coteau Grove Farms' bloodstock adviser. "There is no doubt about who her sire is. Honor A. P. was right up there with the best of his generation, and we likely only saw a fraction of what he was capable of. We have two more mares due to foal to Honor A. P., including a mare who produced a \$400,000 Saratoga yearling for us."

Honor A. P., a 5-year-old son of Honor Code, won or placed five times from six starts and won the 2020 Runhappy Santa Anita Derby (G1). He was also second in the San Felipe Stakes (G2) and Shared Belief Stakes on his way to earning \$532,200. The stallion is out of multiple grade 1 winner and 15time graded stakes performer Hollywood Story (Wild Rush).

Honor A. P. stands for \$15,000 this year.

## The Jockey Club Rescinds Mare Cap Rule

The Jockey Club announced Feb 7th that it is rescinding the following italicized language in Rule 14C of The Jockey Club's Principal Rules and Requirements of the American Studbook that addresses limitations to the total number of mares bred per stallion:

The total number of broodmares bred per individual stallion whose year of birth is 2020 or thereafter shall not exceed 140 per calendar year in the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico. The Jockey Club shall limit the number of Stallion Service Certificates for such stallions to a maximum of 140 per calendar year.

"The Jockey Club board of stewards is rescinding this rule as it is concerned that the reaction to the rule may divide the industry at a time when there are many important issues that need to be addressed with unity," said Stuart S. Janney III, chairman of The Jockey Club. "We are taking this action for the greater good of the entire industry.

"The Jockey Club remains committed to the sustainability and welfare of the breed and will continue to invest in programs and research that will bolster and support the industry in the years to come."

The Jockey Club will continue to maintain the Principal Rules and Requirements of the American Studbook in keeping with its mission to ensure the health of the Thoroughbred breed.

## Thornton, Broberg And End Zone Athletics Continue Delta Downs Dominance During 2021-22 Thoroughbred Season

The 2021-22 Thoroughbred season at Delta Downs wrapped up on Saturday, March 5th, with familiar names topping the horsemen standings. Tim Thornton won his fourth straight leading rider title while Karl Broberg notched his 11th consecutive crown in the training ranks. Broberg and Matt Johansen's End Zone Athletics, Inc. earned their seventh leading owner title and their 10th in the last 11 years.

Thornton's season included 129 wins and mount earnings of \$2,782,260. The title was Thornton's fourth consecutive since moving his tack to Vinton in late 2017. During his first full season in 2018-19, Thornton set a new track record for mount earnings in a single season with \$2,894,080.

Thornton, a husband and father of three, won six of the track's 26 stakes races during the meet. His biggest score came with the Allen Landy-trained Net a Bear, who took the \$125,000 Louisiana Premier Day Distaff on the track's richest race day of the year, February 5.

Following Thornton in the jockey standings were Joel Dominguez (65 wins), Joe Stokes (61), Jose Guerrero (50), Alex Birzer (46), Thomas Pompell (45), Vicente Del-Cid (42), C. J. McMahon (33), Kevin Roman (29), and Gerard Melancon (28).

Broberg continued his dominance at Delta Downs in 2021-22 by sending out 105 winners and totaling \$1,928,820 in barn earnings. Broberg nearly bettered his own records for Thoroughbred conditioners this meet as well. During the 2018-19 season his horses set the current standard with 107 wins and earnings of \$2,017,120.

Rounding out the list of leading trainers for the Delta Downs meeting were Allen Landry (31), Eduardo Ramirez (31), Brett Brinkman (26), Dale White, Sr. (21), Sam Breaux (20), Scott Gelner (19), Benjamin Zeno (19), Greg Tracy (19), and Lee M. Thomas (19).

End Zone Athletics, Inc. saw 78 of their runners win and earn a total of \$1,322,480. The accomplishment broke their own records set just last year when End Zone won 64 races and took home \$1,186,210.

Rounding out the top owners for the season were Dale White, Sr. (18), Elite Thoroughbred Racing, LLC (Michele Rodriguez) (12), Israel Flores Horses LLC (10), Keith Charles (9), Adriel Gonzalez (8), Gerald L. Averett, Jr. (7), Norman Stables, LLC (7), Rylee Grudzien (7), and Sandy Badeaux (6).

Delta Downs now looks forward to its upcoming American Quarter Horse season which gets underway on April 29 and runs through July 16. The 46-day meeting will feature live racing each Wednesday through Saturday night with first post time set for 6:15 pm Central Time.

the fourth race on Cypriano for trainer Chris Hartman. The duo has contributed greatly to each other's success, teaming up for 82 wins since joining forces four years ago.

"It's pretty awesome," Murrill said of reaching the milestone. "All week it's been pretty tough to get into the winner's circle, but we got it done and I can't be more grateful for everyone who has contributed."

The 27-year-old native of Mobile, Alabama scored his first career win aboard Golden Barbara on May 28, 2014. Perennially in the top five in the jockey standings at both Fair Grounds and Arlington Park, he had a breakthrough meet in November at Churchill Downs, finishing fifth with 15 wins. He earned a career-best \$5,619,207 in purses in 2021.

## Oklahoma Commission Adopts Category 1 Interference Philosophy

The Oklahoma Horse Racing Commission (OHRC) became the first in North America to pass a rule which emulates the globally-recognized Category 1 interference philosophy after agreeing to amend its rules at its meeting on Thursday, February 17 in Oklahoma City.

"This is a tremendous first step for North American racing jurisdictions to begin the process of harmonizing rules governing interference and improving the overall experience for racing's primary customers – the bettors," said Patrick Cummings, Executive Director of the Thoroughbred Idea Foundation.

"What we have in North America is a patchwork quilt of various rules which often place total equity above consistency and logic in determining which infractions warrant a demotion. It is always toughest to be the first, so I commend the OHRC for taking that step and I anticipate several others will follow in the near future."

The amended rule changes the consideration of stewards when determining interference. The exact wording of the amended rule is below:

"If the Stewards determine a Horse or its rider has caused an interference and finished in front of the Horse it interfered with, and if not for the interference the Horse would have finished behind the horse it interfered with, the interfering Horse shall be placed immediately behind the Horse with which it interfered. If the interference is a result of dangerous riding, the Stewards shall place the interfering horse in last place."

Should interference be the result of dangerous riding, the OHRC's rule empowers stewards to demote the interfering horse to last, regardless of where the sufferer of the interference finished. This addition to the rule, within the scope of the international Category 1 philosophy, was adopted to discourage jockeys from employing a "win-atany-cost" approach.

"Dangerous riding' means a rider causes a serious infraction by: (A) purposely interference with another horse or rider; or (B) riding in a way which is far below that of a competent and careful rider and where it would be obvious to a competent and careful rider that riding in that way would likely endanger the safety of another horse or rider."

The rule amendment was proposed in November 2021 and after a public comment period, was passed unanimously by the Commission's Rules Committee. Racing in the state occurs across three tracks – Fair Meadows, Remington Park and Will Rogers Downs.



As government affairs consultant Joe Clabes sees it, when horse racing conducts industry days on state capitol steps it's perfectly all right for many of racing's participants to show up in jeans.

"It's OK if there's a cowboy hat or two and big belt buckles," Clabes noted during a panel discussion on how horsemen can interact and build relationships with lawmakers March 3 during the National Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association conference at the Oaklawn Park hotel in Hot Springs, Ark.

Clabes, who has lobbied for the Kentucky industry and the Kentucky HBPA, said seeing that everyday fashion helps remind lawmakers that while racing may be the Sport of Kings, there are plenty of people going to work each day to make a living in the sport and the ancillary businesses that keep it up and running.

Panel member Angel Moore, an attorney who represents the Mountaineer (W.Va.) HBPA, said it is important to educate lawmakers about the livelihoods tied to horse racing.

"We're not the sport of kings. That image is something that we struggle with in West Virginia," Moore said. "People think, 'Oh, they own Thoroughbreds; they have money' It's a very difficult notion to overcome unless you have racing families and people in the communities telling a different story."

In terms of ways to convey that story, panel members said it's important to stay engaged. Clabes noted that while legislators are often very busy during session, they have more time the rest of the year. He also noted that during meetings in this time of the year bills often begin to take shape.

"It's important that you're engaging year-round and being in contact with your legislators as individuals and not just showing up during the session when everybody in the state is there trying to get some time with legislators," Clabes said. "They may view that as, 'Here's another person trying to get a message to me or trying to get an appointment with me.""

Clabes noted that lawmakers may not have the time to fully consider your message once a session starts. Beyond staying engaged throughout the year, he noted that horsemen should be active in community groups like Rotary and social groups as a way to potentially educate lawmakers and community leaders about the racing industry in a less formal setting.

Panel member Bill Walmsley, president of the Arkansas HBPA and a former member of the Arkansas state senate, said that if a horsemen's association finds a candidate that understands racing's interests, it should support that candidate's campaign. He said getting in early can mean a lot to a candidate.

"After I won the first time, a big insurance company sent me a check for \$1,000," Walmsley said. "You know I never did anything for them or cared anything about it. Those \$50 contributions I got while I was running—before I won—meant more to me than that \$1,000 after I won."

Moore said Mountaineer HBPA has had success in inviting lawmakers to days at the races or on the backstretch. She noted that when the HBPA saw a lot of women earning seats in state office, the HBPA decided to specifically reach out to these new lawmakers. The HBPA launched a "women in racing" day to facilitate meetings.

"We thought that we weren't focusing on the women coming into office and this day would offer us an opportunity as women in the industry to speak with them directly," Moore said of the program that also includes the Charles Town (W.Va.) HBPA.

## 482 Trainers Accepted to 2022 Thoroughbred Makeover

The Retired Racehorse Project (RRP) has accepted 482 trainers, including both individuals and team members, to the 2022 class of

the Thoroughbred Makeover and National Symposium, presented by Thoroughbred Charities of America (TCA).

The Thoroughbred Makeover is the world's largest and most lucrative retraining competition for exawarding racehorses. over \$100,000 in prize money annually since 2015. The Makeover returns to its single-year format in 2022 after the postponement of the 2020 event led to a "double" Makeover in 2021, with two competition years running simultaneously. The 2022 Makeover will take place on October 12-15, 2022 at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington.

Open to professionals, juniors, and teams, amateurs, the Thoroughbred Makeover is а retraining competition for recentlyretired ex-racehorses. Competition is available in ten disciplines, with trainers choosing to compete in up to two: barrel racing, competitive trail, dressage, eventing, field hunter, polo, ranch work, show hunter, show jumper, and freestyle (a free-form discipline to demonstrate skills of the trainer's choice).

All horses compete in preliminary rounds in their respective disciplines, with the top five in each discipline returning for the Finale Championship to determine final placings. A panel including all discipline judges will determine the overall Thoroughbred Makeover Champion and a \$10,000 cash prize; a popular vote by in-person and online spectators will determine the People's Choice Award who wins the right to direct a donation to an equine charity of their choosing.

"TCA has been a supporter of the Makeover since the beginning because we believe strongly in the mission of the RRP," said Erin Halliwell, executive director of TCA. "The RRP and its programming have made a positive impact on the lives of thousands of Thoroughbreds over the years. We congratulate the trainers accepted into the 2022 Makeover and appreciate your dedication to Thoroughbreds."

Accepted trainers are encouraged to register their horses at TBMakeover.org as soon as they acquire them; horse registration closes on July 29, 2022. As horses are registered, they will appear on the entry list at tbmakeover.org/entries-2022. Trainers have signed up to bring a total of 505 horses.

With the uncertainty of training green horses, the length of time between acceptance of trainers and final entry, and the fact that some horses sell before the Makeover, the RRP is once again offering a waitlist. Individuals who missed the initial round of applications are welcome to apply to the waitlist and can do so at TBMakeover.org/trainer-portal. The waitlist does not guarantee final entry into the competition, but does widen the impact of the Makeover and helps more horses transition to second careers.

New for 2022, the Makeover will also play host to The Jockey Club Thoroughbred Incentive Program (T.I.P.) Western Championships and Central Region Dressage Championships. After a successful implementation of the inaugural T.I.P. Barrel Racing Championships in 2021, the RRP and T.I.P. are expanding on their working relationship to add more opportunities for Thoroughbreds and Thoroughbred enthusiasts to make the most of the week at the Kentucky Horse Park.

For riders seeking a well-started off-track Thoroughbred for competition or pleasure, the ASPCA Makeover Marketplace will return in 2022, offering buyers and adopters the opportunity to watch a horse compete, trial ride, and complete a pre-purchase exam all in one location. New for 2022, the Makeover will offer the ASPCA Future Prospects barn, including recently-retired Thoroughbreds available for adoption from participating aftercare organizations.

The Makeover also provides ample opportunities for education for both trainers and the public, including the Thoroughbred Aftercare Summit, the seminar series, and the Makeover Master Class (a retraining demonstration featuring three trainers with their own unique approaches to initial training sessions with recentlyretired Thoroughbreds). A vendor fair provides plenty of shopping opportunities for attendees as well.

The Thoroughbred Makeover is the flagship event for the RRP, a 501(c)(3) non-profit committed to increasing the demand and value of Thoroughbreds in their careers after racing. Warren Harang called the meeting to order and asked Roger Heitzmann to call the roll. A quorum was present with Daniel Guidry and Jake Delhomme absent. The meeting was ready to proceed on with business.

Charlotte Clavier led us in prayer.

Warren asked Roger to present the results of the 2021 board elections. Roger announced in order of most votes received, Jay Adcock, Michelle LaVoice, Jim Montgomery, Michele Rodriguez, and Jake Delhomme are to be elected/re-elected to the Board of Directors. Roger asked if the board to approve the results if satisfied. Michele Rodriguez made a motion to approve the results. He also does business dealings, breeding and selling horses, with members of the LTBA as well as members of the Board.

Brett Brinkman – Brett is a cousin by marriage to fellow board member, Charlotte Clavier. He is also the owner of Brett A. Brinkman Racing, LeMesa Stallion LLC, as well as Spanish Class LLC. Brett breeds to stallions owned by LTBA members and Board members. As well as trains horses owned by LTBA members and Board members.

Tom Early – Tom holds shares in the stallions Custom For Carlos and Imperial Hint at Clear Creek Stud. As well as Apriority who stands at Elite Thoroughbreds. Tom also writes articles for the Louisiana Horse Magazine.

Charlotte Clavier – Charlotte is a cousin by marriage to fellow board member, Brett Brinkman. She is the President of Stemmans Supply Inc., the Vice President of Traders Rest Farm Inc., the owner of Carencro Title Notary, as well as the owner of PACE Res. LLC. Charlotte is the Treasurer of REAP as well as the Vice President of the La HBPA while also on its Board of Directors and Board of Trustees. With these positions she has business dealings with all horsemen.

Warren Harang III – Warren both breeds and boards mares at Clear Creek Stud, Which is owned and operated by fellow board members, Val Murrell and Michelle LaVoice.

Val Murrell – Val is the father of fellow board member, Michelle LaVoice. He is the owner of Clear Creek Stud. Val has mares in partnership with fellow Board member, Warren Harang, As well as stallion shares with both fellow Board members, Tom Early and Keith Hernandez. Clear Creek Stud buys supplies from Stemmans Supply Inc. which is owned by fellow Board member, Charlotte Clavier. Val also does business with fellow Board member, Brett Brinkman, by Brett nursing, training, and vanning his mares.

Michelle LaVoice – Michelle is farm manager at Clear Creek Stud which is owned and operated by her father and fellow board member, Val Murrell. Clear Creek Stud does business with many members of the LTBA as well as members of the Board.

Michele Rodriguez – Michele is the owner of Elite Thoroughbreds who does business with many members of the board as well as members of the LTBA. She is a director of Louisiana Horse Rescue, Equine Sales, as well as the HBPA.

Daniel Guidry – Daniel is a member of DocAtty Stables LLC as well as a Board of Director for Home Bank. He holds stock ownership through DocAtty Stables LLC at Equine Sales and is a partner at Pike Racing.

Keith Hernandez – Keith is a Board member at HBPA as well as LTBA and has stallion shares at Clear Creek Stud.

Next on the agenda was the election of officers. Michele Rodriguez made a motion to nominate Warren Harang III for President of the Board. Tom Early seconded the motion. With no objections and no other nominations the Board voted unanimously to elect Warren Harang III as President for the 2021-2022 year. Warren thanked the board for their support and proceeded with the meeting.

Warren opened the floor for nomination to serve as 1st Vice President. Michele Rodriguez made a motion to nominate Keith Hernandez as 1st Vice President of the Board. Charlotte Clavier seconded this motion. With no opposition and no additional nominations, the Board voted unanimously to elect Keith Hernandez as 1st Vice President of the Board for the 2021-2022 year.

Warren then requested nominations for the 2nd Vice President. Michele Rodriguez made a motion to nominate Brett Brinkman for 2nd Vice President of the Board. This motion was seconded by Charlotte Clavier. With no opposition and no other nominations the board voted to elect Brett Brinkman as 2nd Vice President of the Board for the 2021-2022 year.

Moving forward, Warren asks Theresa and to proceed with the presentation of the new computer system. Therese Arroyo, Chris Homberg, and Travis Steelman gave a presentation on the new computer system, how it works, when it will be ready to be fully implemented, and when it will be ready to run on its own without the old system. Some recommendations for what can be added to the new system to make it even more accessible were made by the board and noted by Therese and the Lookfar Lab team. Discussion ensued over postcards, emails, and fax and how best to continue to contact members in the future regarding the new system. Warren asked if anyone has further questions regarding the new computer system. With no questions, Warren announced to move forward with the agenda.

Warren requested an approval of the minutes for the meeting of the Board on October 15, 2021. Tom Early made a motion to approve the minutes. This motion was seconded by Charlotte Clavier, which was voted on and passed unanimously.

The next item on the agenda was the Lawsuit Discussion. John Duvieilh stated there is currently no update and we are still in the 5th Circuit Court. Both involved parties' lawyers have asked to lift the stay, but nothing has changed or moved forward regarding this. Discussion ensued over how Covid and Covid restrictions are currently still slowing down the courts and thereby extending the processes. Warren asked if there were any further questions regarding the current status of the lawsuit. With no questions, Warren announced to carry on with the agenda.

Warren asked Tom Early to give the sales audit report. After presenting the numbers, discussion ensued over the status of payment concerning cosigners, as well as Tom Early for running the October sale. Therese stated that all cosigners have been paid except for one, Hip 9A, who was bought by a man who then claimed he did not mean to purchase the horse. This caused the horse to be sold twice for two different prices. Therese reported this predicament is being dealt with currently. Further discussion ensued over the success of the Sale, and Tom Early possibly running the Sale next year. Compensation for Tom and staff was discussed as well for successfully running the October sale on short notice. A figure was presented by Keith Hernandez and Brett Brinkman. Michelle Rodriguez made a motion to approve this figure which was voted on and passed unanimously. Further discussion took place on the availability of a facility for next year.

After discussing the sales audit received days after the October sale, Warren stated to move on with the agenda.

The next item on the agenda was Louisiana Bred Races. Warren asked Ed Fenanci to give us some input on this topic. Ed stated we are doing well for LA racing and breeding with gaming monies going to Louisiana Breds, and Historic Racing Machines coming on line. Tom Early agreed, stating that more people are currently interested in buying LA brood mares or breeding with LA stallions. Discussion ensued over how the HBPA has joined the lawsuit against HISA. Much discussion took place on the rules in HISA cutting race dates and removing Lasix from racing etc. Charlotte stated HBPA should commission a statement regarding the situation.

Discussion on the status of Louisiana Downs took place. No motions were made.

Discussion took place on items at the Fair Grounds. No motions were made.

Roger Heitzmann stated the reason for the Agenda item is that he wanted the Board's input on the different types of Louisiana bred races that were being offered at the racetracks without consulting with the association. The Board should consider differentiating the price for LA races vs. open races and asks for the Board's opinion on this matter. He stated he is unaware of how to approach answering these questions when asked as the Board has yet to come to a decision regarding the matter. Another issue is the Louisiana Sired races. Roger asked for the Board's input on how they wished we pursue or not pursue these items. Discussion took place on these subjects. The first subject of the all Open Allowance races having the condition of state bred races not considered in the condition was agreed on by all after discussion. The Board feels that that this is needed in all open allowance races.

The next item is the different claiming prices for open and Louisiana bred horses, in the same race. Discussion took place on this subject. The board feels that the main problem is the poor performance in the writing of the condition book. The board concluded that the different claiming prices in the open races appear to be a good thing at all tracks but the FG. With the understanding that we can't ask three tracks to do this and not the Fair Grounds, the LTBA will go along with the request of the HBPA to do away with them. The next item that Roger wanted a decision on is the Louisiana Sired Races. He asked the Board to give him a direction in which they wanted him to travel as far as the implementation of them or not. After discussion the idea of a bonus plan for winners by Louisiana Sires was brought to the table. This idea was supported by the Board and the Board was willing to look into this possibility. This will be discussed further at a later date.

The topic turned to the amount of monies that the Fair Grounds uses on Louisiana State bred Stakes. John Duvieilh informed the Board that the amount of monies the FG uses on State Bred races was grossly underpaid. Keith Hernandez said that he is trying to get the FG to pay entirely for Louisiana Champions Day and raise the purses.

Therese Arroyo asks if our 800 phone line can be discontinued from today forward as it is now only spam calls and telemarketers. Tom made a motion to discontinue the 800 number as it seems to be something no longer useful in today's society. Michele Rodriguez seconded this motion which was voted on and passed unanimously.

David Tillson made a motion to exit Executive Session. This motion was seconded by Charlotte, which was voted on and passed unanimously.


A figure is presented by Keith Hernandez to be given as Christmas Bonus. This motion was seconded by Warren Harang, which was voted on and passed unanimously.
