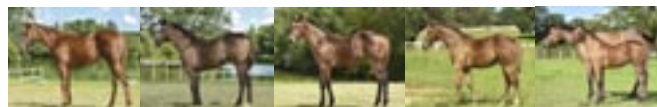

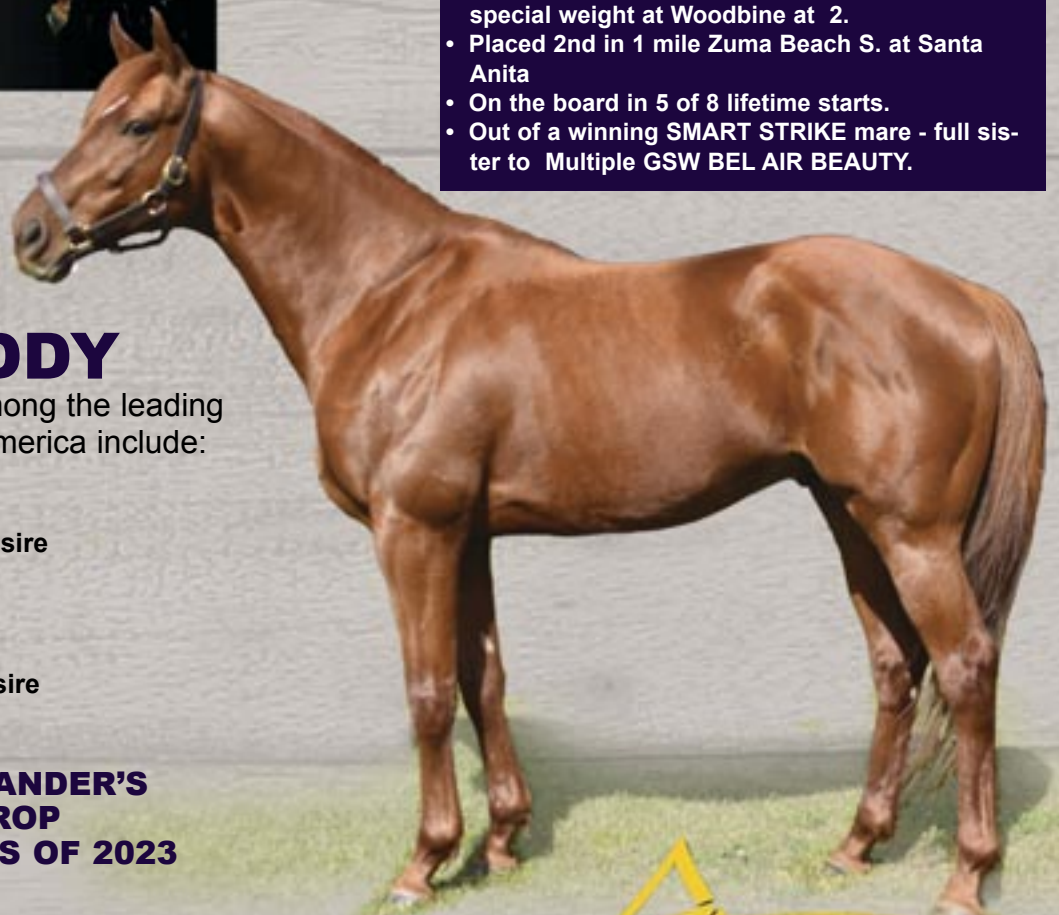

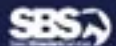

BREEDING SHED

Keeping the Membership informed, LTBA President Warren J. Harang, III

The LTBA Board of Directors has heard from many breeders who want to see those who keep their entire breeding operation in Louisiana rewarded. The LTBA is an organization for Breeders, and especially Louisiana Breeders. We heard. We listened. We took action, and have made an adjustment to the Breeders Awards. Starting October 1, 2023, Breeders Awards for accredited foals by Louisiana domiciled stallions and out of resident Louisiana mares are being increased to 25%.

The LTBA Board of Directors 2023 election is coming up soon. Ballots will be mailed from the LTBA to members on October 2nd. Seven men are running for four open positions. Three members of the current board are running for re-election: Keith Hernandez, Val Murrell and David Tillson. Danny Guidry, whose term expires this year is not seeking re-election. Nathan Granger and Keith Myers who have both served on the board previously are also running. Additionally, two new candidates have thrown their hats in the ring, Barry Scott and Lee Thomas. Each board member elected shall serve for three years with membership terms staggered to result in approximately 1/3 of the board being subject to election annually. Consider your vote thoughtfully. The men and women on our board of directors determine the direction of our organization.

Following the tremendous success of the 2021 and 2022 sales,

LTBA is hosting the 2023 Breeders Sales of Louisiana Yearling Sale Followed by Mixed Session on Thursday, September 28th at the Equine Sales Facility in Opelousas. Originally scheduled for Saturday, September 30th, the LTBA Board of Directors decided to move the date of the 2023 Sale to Thursday, September 28th, in order to attract buyers between the Keeneland and Fasig Tipton Mid-Atlantic Yearling Sales. LTBA hopes to attract more nationally prominent trainers and buyers who have traditionally skipped the Breeders Sale to go to Fasig Tipton. Catalogs were mailed in mid August, and may be found on the LTBA website as well as through The Jockey Club Information Systems' Equine Sales Catalog app for the Ipad. The Breeders Sales of Louisiana 2023 sale has attracted its largest catalog to date since the LTBA jumped in to fill the void left by Equine Sales of Louisiana in 2021. The 2023 catalog includes 162 yearlings, 41 broodmares, 3 weanlings and 2 horses of racing age. While the consignment deadline has passed, supplemental entries are still being accepted on a very limited basis. If you want to consign any yearlings, horses of racing age or breeding stock, contact Tom Early (504) 452-8208 directly. And most importantly, come to the sale! Louisiana-breds have been in high demand, and their value is expected to go up along with purse increases anticipated since the passage of legislation last fall.

Since the previous issue of Louisiana Horse, we have had two Louisiana-bred Stakes Days. First, Louisiana Legends Night in June at Evangeline Downs, which fittingly followed the LTBA's annual awards banquet and honored legendary horsemen in the winners circle after each race. Louisiana Cup Day ran at Louisiana Downs in August. As always, at both events the competition was strong and the fans were treated to some exciting races with favorites and longshots bringing home trophies and a share of the healthy purses. You can read about each in the pages of this magazine.

Coming up on Wednesday, September 27 (the evening prior to the Yearling Sale) LTBA is hosting an evening of fun with fellow horsemen and women at the Equine Sales Facility. This function has a purpose beyond socializing with our contemporaries. We are raising money for a Political Action Committee (LTBA PAC). The purpose of the LTBA PAC is to advocate for the Louisiana thoroughbred industry in our legislature.

I encourage everyone to be actively involved in all aspects of our industry. Come to a board meeting; be informed and involved. We at the LTBA are doing all we can to be of service to you, the breeders. If you have any questions about our program, the staff in our office at Fair Grounds is happy to help. I personally am always happy to hear from you, especially with suggestions for improving our program.

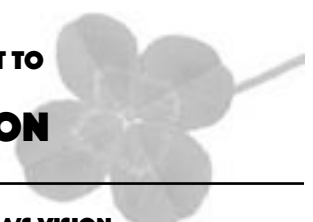

THE INS AND OUTS OF SALES PREP

Veteran horseman Al Pike shares his wisdom about the process of getting a horse to the auction ring

Every industry has its own set of unique terminology, and horse racing is no exception. You'll hear handicappers talk about superfectas and overlays, and breeders will discuss nicks and outcrosses. At an

auction, you'll hear about pinhookers and the repository. An outsider might have no idea what those terms mean, but "sales prep"—the process of preparing a horse for an auction—seems pretty simple,

right? Well, as any auction consignors will tell you, it's anything but simple.

As part of an effort to provide its members with information to help them succeed in the industry, the

Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association presented a free webinar in July featuring Al Pike, one of the most experienced and successful horsemen on the auction scene. Pike, who runs Pike Racing with his wife, Salley, and son, Colt, sat down with LTBA past president and current board member Jake Delhomme and offered his advice and insight on several auction-related topics, from the steps involved to the preparation timeline to auction day.

Due to technical issues, only a portion of the webinar is available online through louisianabred.com, and Pike provided additional information to share with Louisiana Horse readers.

Pike, who was formerly based at Copper Crowne Training Center in Opelousas, Louisiana, recently relocated to Highlander Training Center in Sulphur Springs, Texas. A noted pinhooker, Pike has found great success in buying yearlings to resell for a profit as 2-year-olds. He's had multiple horses hit the \$1 million mark in the sales ring, and he sold the \$300,000 sale topper at this year's Texas 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale. And several Pike Racing consignments have found success on the track as well, such as Louisiana-bred millionaire Vicar's in Trouble, who sold for \$80,000 at the 2013 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale and went on to win the Louisiana Derby (G2) and start in the Kentucky Derby (G1).

Timing is Everything

Many variables can alter the timeline of getting a horse ready for auction, but in general it's about a 90-day process for yearlings. Weanlings, which are less common at sales, can be prepped in about 60

days. The longest timeframe—six months or more—is for a 2-year-old sale, because horses need to be broken and achieve a level of fitness to work at least an eighth of a mile at the under-tack show (and gallop out another quarter-mile). For a 2-year-old sale, which is generally held from late March until June, Pike likes to start with a yearling in September.

“In our program, we spend the first 30 days getting them broke, getting them used to the track and building up to a good gallop, the second 30 days is to put some miles on them and then the third 30 days we start doing two-minute licks.

“At the end of the 90 days, depending on the age and maturity and what they are showing you, then you start looking at what sale you might go for,” he continued. “We try to put them in the sale where they will bring the most money.”

After that first 90-day period, the horse might be turned out for a break, and then Pike said it's about another 90 days to get the horse ready to perform in the under-tack show, which is usually held at least two days prior to the auction.

For a yearling sale, it's all about getting a horse to look its best for potential buyers. You'll hear buyers and consignors talk about a horse being “dappled out.” But how is that achieved?

“Good horsemanship, good feed, good worming program and good grooms rubbing them,” said Pike about the approximately 90-day process for yearling sale prep. “If a horse is dappled it just means they are good and healthy and happy and things aren't bothering them, and that's what you like to see.”

Picking a Horse to Pinhook

The term “pinhook” might be foreign to a newcomer to the auction game, but it can be one of the most lucrative scores. To put it simply, pinhooking is the process of buying a yearling with the intent of re-selling it as a 2-year-old, for a profit of course.

Pike specializes in pinhooking and offered some general advice for those looking to give it a try.

“You want an athlete, obviously, and something that looks like it will go quick,” he said about selecting a yearling to pinhook. “I gravitate to horses by young sires, because everyone wants to see what horses by those young sires look like, so that's half the battle right there because people will want to see those horses.

“With the proven sires, those are going to be expensive,” he added. “It's hard to buy yearlings by Tapit, Into Mischief and Gun Runner. To have a shot to make money, you have to sacrifice something, maybe with conformation or pedigree. Normally I have a lot of first-year sires because you are going to get people to come see them.”

The Costs Involved

It can be a challenge to turn a profit in horse racing, and that's true whether you are a breeder, trainer or owner. It also applies to selling a horse at auction. Regardless of if you are looking to sell a yearling that you bred or are thinking about pinhooking, knowing the costs involved is the first step in formulating a plan. Of course, costs can vary depending on the consignor, and, generally speaking, expenses are less when prepping for a sale in Louisiana compared to Kentucky, Florida or New York.

“There’s a day rate, and I would allow at least 90 days,” Pike said about sales prep for a yearling. “It’s so important how they look at the sale, it’s kind of like a beauty contest. Trying to save a dime or two by sending them in late will bite you in the end because your horse won’t look as good as the competition.”

In addition to the day rate, which varies by consignor and region, there are other potential expenses, such as X-rays, shoeing and veterinary work to name just a few. The sale company will generally take a five-percent commission (and an entry fee), and the consignor also usually takes five-percent.

That can all add up to a significant expense, but sometimes it’s the little things that can make a big difference, like how a horse is presented at the sale. Established consignors like Pike might have dozens of horses at an auction, so the responsibility of showing the horse to potential buyers is handled by the consignor’s staff.

“My wife and I are fortunate enough to have a group of top-class people to help us at the sales,” said

Pike. “People at the sale are going through there trying to look at as many horses as they can, so you’ve got to make a good impression. If you’ve got some bozo holding your horse and not presenting him properly or setting him up, then they might not come back to look at your horse again. But if he sets him up and presents him well, maybe that horse gets on the buyer’s short list.”

Advice for Newcomers

If you are thinking of sending a horse to the track to race, you’d probably take the time to interview a few trainers before deciding which one to trust with your equine investment. Pike advises doing the same when it comes to sales prep. He said it’s also important to work with someone you trust and to keep your expectations in check, because for every home run at a sale there is also a strikeout.

“It’s not cheap, and it’s not a get rich quick deal,” said Pike. “But when it works, especially with a 2-year-old when you have a sound horse and a fast horse, it’s a lot of fun.”

Again, just like with trainers at the track, you want to find the right consignor to fit your horse. If you are looking for a lot of back-and-forth communication, perhaps picking a consignor with the most horses in the sale is not the way to go. Likewise, a modestly bred prospect might not be the right fit for a consignor who sells mostly high-end horses.

“I’ve had calls out of the blue where people kind of feel me out, but I also want to know what kind of horse they have,” Pike said. “I don’t want to just take someone’s day money, so if I don’t think they have one that will sell well then I’ll tell them that.”

Like any aspect of horse racing, sending a horse to auction involves risk, but it’s the reward at the end that entices Pike and many others to put in the long hours and hard work with the hope of seeing the hammer drop as the auctioneer announces a big sale price.

“It’s like winning the Kentucky Derby when you sell one for a lot of money,” he said. “But it’s also like parachuting from 30,000 feet; it’s hard to hit the X.”

BREAKING LUCKY

Speed and precocity have historically been the name of the game in the Louisiana breeding industry, and stallions featuring the bloodlines of speed-transmitting sires such as Storm Cat, Unbridled’s Song, and Speightstown have been understandably popular. Nonetheless, in a long-range breeding program, it is necessary to seek outcrosses and to balance speed with stamina. This is where a horse such as Blue Star Racing’s Breaking Lucky comes in, offering stamina, scope, and substance through bloodlines that can complement those dominating the local market.

Good-looking enough as a weanling to command \$100,000 at the 2012 Keeneland November mixed sale, Breaking Lucky did not start as a 2-year-old but was quick enough to win a maiden special weight at Woodbine over 6.5 furlongs. His next win showed what he was made of. Sent against Queen’s Plate winner and future multiple Grade 1 winner Shaman Ghost in the Prince of Wales Stakes (the second leg of Canada’s Triple Crown), Breaking Lucky unleashed a strong closing run and had the stamina to outfinish a proven mile-and-a-quarter horse by a neck. Hampered by a slow opening pace early in the mile-and-one-eighth Ontario Derby (G3), he was still able to rally strongly enough to collect a graded stakes placing.

Breaking Lucky had the best season of his career as a 4-year-old. After picking up three graded stakes placings in Canada and at Keeneland during the summer, he won the 8.5-furlong Seagram Cup Stakes (G3), defeating two-time Canadian champion older male Are You Kidding Me and multiple grade 3 winner and millionaire Melmich. In the fall, he ran the best race of his career in the Clark Handicap (G1). He was no match for Gun Runner, who was collecting his first grade 1 win on the way to his Horse of the Year season at 4, but his runner-up finish saw him home ahead of Grade 1 winners Shaman Ghost, Hoppertunity, and Noble Bird.

At 5, Breaking Lucky showed a new dimension in the New Orleans Handicap (G2). Leading all the way and carving out a solid pace, he just failed to hold off the improving Honorable Duty by a neck. After that,

Breaking Lucky added third place finishes behind Gun Runner in the Stephen Foster Handicap and the Whitney Stakes to his resume. Physical issues limited him at 6 and 7, but he added a grade 3 placing in the Fred W. Hooper Stakes during his final season before retiring with 16 wins or placings from 27 starts and a bankroll of \$1,329,670. He entered stud in 2020 at Blue Star Racing near Scott, Louisiana, and then stood two seasons at Pleasant Acres Stallions near Ocala, Florida, before returning to Blue Star to stand the 2023 season for \$4,000 live foal (stands and nurses).

As of August 2, Breaking Lucky has only three starters and no winners from his 31 named foals of racing age, but he can reasonably be expected to show better results as his foals mature and the distances stretch out. In this, he appears typical of the American progeny of Lookin At Lucky, which have tended to be rugged, honest two-turn horses that did better with maturity.

This is not to say that the possibility for quicker maturity and early speed is not there. Breaking Lucky has speedier elements in his pedigree, and Lookin At Lucky was the American 2-year-old champion of

2009, winning graded stakes at distances from 6.5 to 8.5 furlongs. At 3, Lookin At Lucky became the first juvenile champion to repeat at age 3 since Spectacular Bid in 1978-1979, taking four graded stakes races including the Preakness Stakes (G1) and the Izod Haskell Invitational Stakes (G1). His successes were a highlight in the career of his sire Smart Strike, the only son of Mr. Prospector to ever lead the North American general sire list and the sire of champions ranging from juveniles to staying turf runners. Nor has Lookin At Lucky been only a sire of staying older runners; in Chile, where he has been a two-time champion sire, his progeny have shown much more precocity and include several juvenile champions and Group 1 winners.

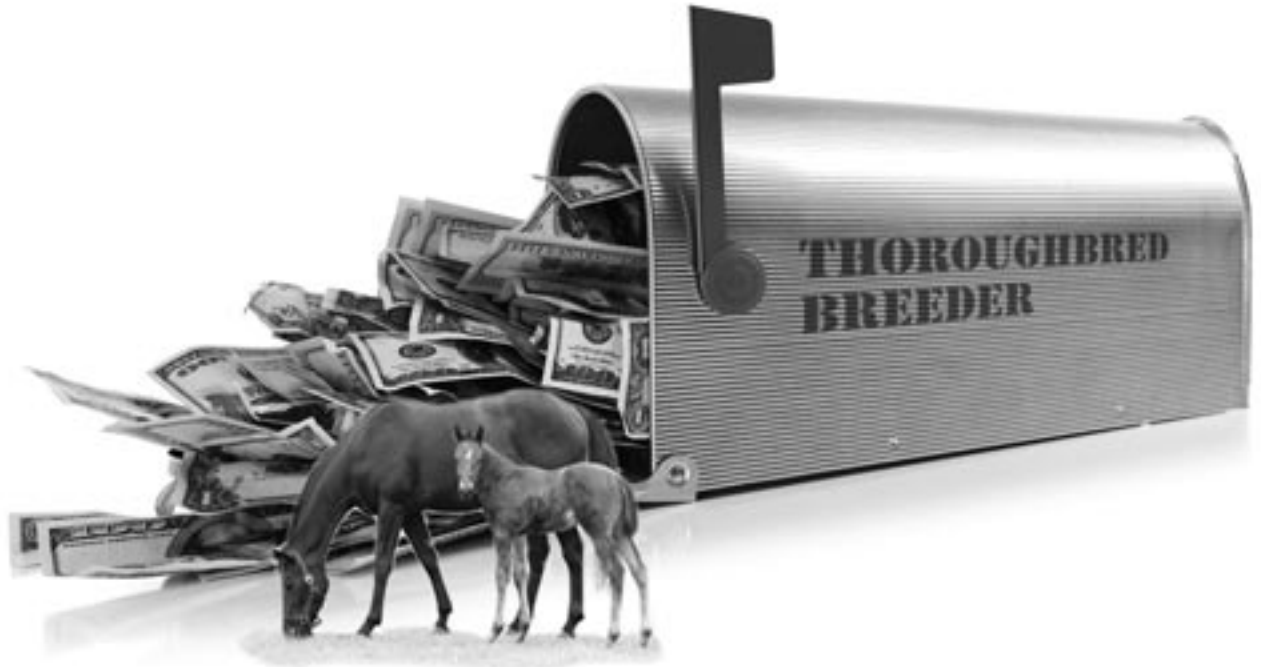
Closely related to 2019 Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) winner Country House (also by Looking At Lucky), Breaking Lucky is out of Shooting Party (by Canadian and American champion turf horse Sky Classic), whose six stakes placings include a runner-up finish in the 2001 Garden City Breeders' Cup Handicap (G1). A half sister to Country House's dam Quake Lake (by War Chant), Shooting Party is out of restricted stakes winner Ayanka (by multiple grade 1 winner Jade Hunter, by Mr. Prospector), whose dam Al's Charm is a full sister to 1978 Columbiana Handicap (G3) winner Herecomesthebride (by 1969 Monmouth Invitational Handicap winner Al Hattab). The next dam in Breaking Lucky's female line, Like a Charm (by Pied d'Or) was the undefeated winner of the 1966 Sorority Stakes, then an important race for 2-year-old fillies.

In physical type, Breaking Lucky is what one would expect from crossing Lookin At Lucky over Sky



Classic: a good-sized, scopy, strongly made horse with good bone and substance, clearly built for two-turn distances. He looks as if he would be an excellent choice for adding length to the body and legs of a mare that has a build promising power and explosiveness but lacking in scope, especially if a foal capable of racing well at distances beyond a mile is desired. As Lookin At Lucky has done well with mares from the Storm Cat male line, especially those tracing to Storm Cat through Hennessy—a line not present in Breaking Lucky's bloodlines—this would seem a natural place to start when considering possible mates. Other desirable pedigree elements may include Speightstown, Sadler's Wells, Blushing Groom, and Danzig. Breaking Lucky is an outcross to the A.P. Indy male line and may do particularly well with mares tracing to Tapit, a stallion that has historically done well with crossing back to Breaking Lucky's ancestors Mr. Prospector and Nijinsky II.

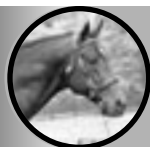

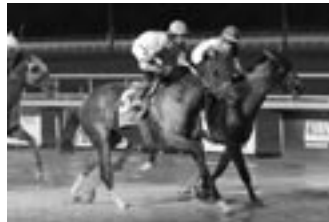

The yearly event is the richest night of racing for the Boyd Gaming property and featured \$600,000 in stakes purse money – a 33% purse increase from last year while \$1.8 million was wagered on the card, which was also up from 2022.

Cheapskate Diva, the daughter of champion, Kentucky Derby and Dubai World Cup winner Animal Kingdom, may have been somewhat overlooked at the betting window, but the 5-year-old mare put on one of the night's most impressive showings in the \$100,000 Louisiana Legends Turf Distaff.

Sent to the starting gate at 9/2 odds, Cheapskate Diva earned her second stakes victory and did so in a rapid time of 1:35.80, which was

1 second off the track record of 1:34.19 set in 2009 by State Power.

"Joseph (Felks) has been doing an amazing job with her," said jockey Carlos Marquez, who won three consecutive races with her last summer in Louisiana. "Two weeks ago when we worked her, I told him that the workout was incredible, so it definitely gave us a lot of confidence heading into the race. And tonight she put everything together and Mr. Felks has made my job riding her really easy."

Eve's Delight moved up to take control of the 1-mile race and set solid fractions of 23.35 and 47.43 before weakening as she was confronted by Cheapskate Diva, who immediately challenged for the lead. Within moments, Marquez urged the filly and drew clear to win by 2 ½ lengths over post-time favorite A G's Charlotte.

Cheapskate Diva (\$11.40) improved to 5-15 with earnings of \$176,640 for owner and breeder Keith Plaisance.

What can be said about the 2022 Louisiana Horse of the Year that hasn't already been said? It's not will she win, but by how much?

It wasn't an ideal start for last year's Filly of the Year, though. Jockey Tim Thornton and Free Like a Girl maneuvered through early traffic yet was able to stay close to the leaders, Wupkar and Beleout, who rapidly set fractions of 22.50 and 46.22. As soon as they reached the final turn, Free Like a Girl, who

was 2 lengths back, was briskly roused and used a late surge to win going away by 1 3/4 lengths over Beleout in 1:05.17.

"There was a lot of speed in the race, I just wanted to make sure we stayed out of too much trouble so she could just do her job," said Thornton. "She is such a nice filly. I am very thankful to be aboard her."

The 4-year-old daughter of El Deal, who was purchased for a mere \$5,500, has earned \$930,378

in 13 wins over 27 starts. She also has a perfect record at Evangeline Downs, 5-5.

"We were a little concerned because we shortened her up," said trainer Chasey Poimer. "She's a big filly, so if something happens, it may be harder for her to overcome, but it worked out. This has been an unreal experience. For her to be named a champion then win four stakes races this year, it's unbelievable."

The final order of finish was Free Like a Girl (\$3.80), Beleout, First I've Seen, Noneya, Final Quest, Wupkra, Snowball and Flashy Meg. Hei Hei Custivity was scratched.

Allnight Moonlight took an unconventional route to Louisiana. Roger Smith purchased the son of multiple graded stakes winner Ransom the Moon for \$15,000 in 2021 at the Texas Yearling sale. He then shipped the colt to Florida to train before starting him at the Fair Grounds in New Orleans in November in 2022.

“He’s a big colt and we’ve had to wait on him,” said Smith. “We started him out in sprints, but he then found his footing in route races and it has been worth the wait.”

Thornton, who won two stakes on the night, kept Allnight Moonlight close to the pace from the outside behind the 3-1 second choice, Calibrachoa Kid, who led the way until the far turn in 24.00, 48.06 and 1:13.39. The eventual winner went four-wide around the final turn then used the entire Evangeline Downs stretch to duel with Mangum and get up by a neck in 1:39.59.

“My horse was definitely the class of the race,” said Thornton, who was riding the colt for the first

time. “I was able to work him a few weeks ago to get familiar with him. Everything was fine. I let the speed burn themselves out and when I asked him late, he answered. He still had plenty left.”

Allnight Moonlight (\$6) won for the fourth time in eight starts, three of which are Louisiana state bred stakes for career earnings of \$229,000.

The final order of finish in the Louisiana Legends Cheval was Allnight Moonlight, Mangum, The Boss Soss, Clear as a Bele, Reddingandlee, Calibrachoa Kid, Macho Beanie, Kajun Karma and Z’s Guitar.

All eyes were on Star Moment, the betting favorite who came into the Louisiana Legends Soiree with two consecutive dominating stakes wins, but that was prerace. After, those same eyes watched Louisiana Liberty add a first stakes win to her resumé.

“We knew there would be a lack of pace in this race, so I told Gerard (Melancon) to keep her close,” said winning trainer Steve Flint. “We just worked her last week and she was just phenomenal. We couldn’t have asked for any better results.”

Highly Wicked took command and set a pace of 24.08 and 48.38, but faltered in the stretch as both Star Moment and Louisiana Liberty made their moves. Veteran rider Gerard Melancon, who has surpassed 5,000 wins, shook the reins and the pair made an outside bid around the final turn and wore down both Highly Wicked and Star Moment to win by a half-length in 1:40.79.

“Our plan worked out perfectly,” said Melancon. “I knew the nine horse (Star Moment) was the heavy

favorite, so I followed her as close as I could. We began to inch up to her around the final turn and was able to grab the lead at the wire.”

Paying \$23.30 for win backers, Louisiana Liberty won for the second time in 11 starts for \$135,230.

Sent to the gate as the 9-5 favorite, Woods N Water was forwardly placed by jockey Thomas Pompell and never sat further than 2 lengths behind the frontrunner,

Carlea's Dream at 24.22, 49.18 and 1:13.50. In fact, Carlea's Dream was stubborn and dueled with sev-

eral rivals down the lane before bowing out to Woods N Water in the final furlong. Pompell and the son of Palace edged clear late to win by 1 1/2 lengths in 1:43.53.

"There wasn't a whole lot of speed in this race, so I wanted to lay about 3 to 4 lengths back of the leader," said Pompell. "When we hit the turn, I knew I had a lot of horse left, so I thought it would be a perfect time to make a move and steal the race."

With the win, it marked the first stakes win in 17 starts for Woods N Water (\$5.80) with earnings of \$186,255 in six trips to the winner's circle.

"This horse is doing great and I'm pleased he is picking it up on the turf," said Thomas. "It's nice to have flexibility in horse who can win on both surfaces. Thomas (Pompell) did an excellent job in the saddle."

There's nothing like Louisiana thoroughbred racing, especially for both the breeder and trainer of a

horse who seems to be hitting its stride with back-to-back stakes victories.

After a dominating 4-length win in the \$60,000 King Creole on May 6, 2023, Black Sword, a 6-year-old son of the unraced sire Awesome Sword returned a month later to put on another show, this time for the \$100,000 Louisiana Legends Sprint, which included last year's winner Bertie's Galaxy and multiple stakes victor Big Chopper. Neither were a match for Black Sword.

"It's really fun to win," said Ronnie Averett, trainer and son of the breeder, Margie Averett. "It's

really fun to win stakes races especially when you have been around the horse since he was born. It truly is a big honor."

The 5 1/2-furlong affair began with a bang as 24-1 longshot Grunt broke sharp and sprinted clear for a lead that wasn't contested much in 22.27 and 46.15. With Black Sword in striking distance from the outside, Vicente Del-Cid moved the gelded runner closer to the front near the final turn and went 3-wide driving towards Grunt in the final furlong. Del-Cid urged and received a fantastic response to cover the sprint in 1:04.84 and win by 2 over the second favorite, Big Chopper, who rallied late to earn second.

"This horse really likes the outside post," said Del-Cid. "I was able to keep him in good position and he did the rest."

Black Sword (\$6.40) has now won eight times in 25 starts with a boosted bankroll of \$274,705. He is owned by Dr. Leonard Treanor.

Final order of finish was Black Sword, Big Chopper, Grunt, Mike J, Binding Agreement, X Clown, Bertie's Galaxy and My Man Louie. Bootsie's Galaxy was scratched.

The day featured six, \$75,000-guaranteed stakes races as the crème de la crème vied for a coveted chance and have their names etched alongside Louisiana thoroughbred racing royalty. Two prodigy trainers also had their day in the sun – Jayde Gelner and Rylee Magnon.

Despite temperatures and heat indices well above 100 degrees, total handle wagered on the program saw an increase of 33% from last year's Louisiana Cup Day with \$1,213,260.

All eyes were locked in on Free Like a Girl, LTBA Champion Filly and winner of last year's Louisiana Cup Filly & Mare Sprint, but it was front-runner Norah G that upset the apple cart at 21-1 in gate-to-wire fashion with rider Emanuel Nieves in the irons for trainer Patricia West and owner/breeder Thomas Galvin.

The 3-year-old daughter of Fast Anna shot out of the inside post

position and literarily never looked back. Though she never had a lead larger than one length, Norah G (\$44.80) cruised with swift fractions of 22.38, 45.53 and 58.07 and held off all rivals in 1:11.74. Final Quest, also at big odds of 31-1, came from mid-pack and seven wide to grab second.

Free Like a Girl broke from the far outside post though never threatened during the race and fin-

ished eighth.

Though many were surprised at the winner, the lightly-raced Norah G did win the \$112,000 Louisiana Futurity last December at the Fair Grounds. This was the filly's first start in six months and her third win in five starts for \$163,955.

"Maybe she likes to run after a layoff," said West. "I was surprised she was able to break so sharp, but definitely proud of her."

Owner and breeder Thomas Galvin explained the horse

was named after his youngest granddaughter, Norah, who is 9.

"Just an incredible race," said Galvin. "I couldn't be happier. Patty (Patricia West) has been so good to not only our horses, but to me as an owner."

What would a day dedicated to Louisiana thoroughbreds be without a Star Guitar progeny winning a stakes race?

Star Moment, who was the least "experienced" in the Distaff field with seven career starts, has been nothing short of spectacular and the 3-year-old daughter of the great Star Guitar flashed her sire's brilliance to win her fifth start in eight attempts – three of which are stakes

victories.

"She is all class," said Star Moment's pilot, Timothy Thornton. "We stalked the pace and saved some ground. We waited our turn, and when I called on her, she just took off."

Birdie Call led most of the way and did all the work up front chewing up the turf in 22.91, 46.81 and 1:10.76. Jock Carlos Lozado and

With a 10-length romp in his debut at Evangeline Downs and a half-length win in the \$150,000 TTA Futurity at Lone Star Park, the son of Broken Vow shipped in to Louisiana Downs and had no issues with the heat.

With 73-1 longshot Western Afleet setting the early tone in the 5 1/2-furlong affair, jockey Luis Fuentes gave Strong Promise (\$2.60) the cue and easily surpassed his rivals to win by more than two lengths in 1:05.52 and improve to three wins and three starts.

Purchased for \$125,000 in the TTA Thoroughbred Sale, Strong Promise has already returned a profit to Norman Stables with earnings of \$155,400.

“Watching the race unfold, because I was a little nervous prior seeing Free Like a Girl not respond in her race,” said Gelner, “But he exploded late. I think this is going to be a very good route horse. The state bred programs at Fair Grounds and Delta Downs are so good, I think he will end up racing at both.”

Gelner added he knew this horse was special the first day he saw him breeze at Copper Crown. “I have a great team who makes this all possible,” said Gelner of his 12-member staff. “I strive to be perfect. If you get comfortable where you are at, it’s hard to achieve any more that you have already done.”

circled the field through the far turn of the 5 1/2-furlong contest and took the lead at the quarter pole when Tap Galore joined her stable mate by an exciting rally by pilot Joel Dominguez. The latter two launched their bid and shifted five-wide in the upper stretch to close the race in 1:06.18.

Dominguez said he studied Tap Galore’s first two races and though she needed to be a little more patient. “I felt she would run better laying off the speed and she responded,” he said.

X Clown, whose last stakes win came in 2019 at the Fair Grounds during the \$100,000 Louisiana Futurity, shot out of the gate and managed to hold off a field of nine to win at 25-1 odds returning lucky backers (\$52.40).

Trainer Rylee Magnon, 22, recently claimed the 6-year-old gelded runner of Jimmy Creed for \$20,000 in April at Evangeline Downs.



“He is a laid-back horse, but he has been more aggressive and happier,” said Magnon. “He may have just needed a change of scenery. I love training horses, but I really get a true enjoyment of helping older ones. I love to claim horses and see what I can do with them. The idea is

to claim and improve. I want to be able to see if I can add a new spark.”

Magnon’s other spark, is husband and 26-year-old rider Devin Magnon. The two celebrated the win in the winner’s circle and will also celebrate one year of marriage in October.

With Devin in the irons, X Clown vied for the early lead and set early fractions of 22.55 and 45.72. The two were pressured multiple times by Mike J, Charli Michael and then Pickens down the stretch in a multi-horse battle, but held on to win by less than a length in 1:11.06.

“He’s gotten better after each work,” said Devin. “We had concern shipping up here, but Rylee actually rode in the trailer up here

with him, so that really helped.”

Owned by BW and HTS Stables, LLC and Jason Grudzien, who is Rylee’s father and a former horse trainer, X Clown has totaled \$327,270 in 29 starts and six wins.

“I’ve been training since I was 18, but I got a chance to be around horses and at early age thanks to my parents,” said Rylee. “I was around older, classy horses in Florida and it really taught me a lot. Having great help is also a factor.

“This is truly a great feeling. It hits home lot harder when your family owns the horse you’re your husband is the jockey.”

No, they don’t argue when they don’t finish first.

EVALUATING AND DIAGNOSING LAMENESS

Lameness can mean anything from a slight hitch in the gait or a little tenderness when trotting on hard ground to severe pain that makes the horse three-legged lame and unwilling to put weight on the affected limb. There are many degrees of lameness and equine practitioners have come up with ways to try to score and categorize these. The AAEP created a scoring system to grade lameness from 0 (no lameness) to 5 (severe, non-weight-bearing). Pinpointing the cause of lameness is also crucial before proper treatment can be prescribed.

A mild lameness may actually be career threatening, depending on the cause and on what that horse does for a living, versus a horse that suddenly comes up very lame but it's something that can be resolved. For instance, a stone bruise or a foot abscess can be treated and the horse will get over and be fine. In many cases a subtle lameness may be more problematic for the long-term soundness of that horse. A ligament injury or bone bruise can be a longer-term problem that takes months or even a year to heal.

A grading system doesn't tell us what the problem is, or the prognosis. It's just a scale to try to determine at this particular time how lame the horse is. On the scale of 0 to 5, the most nebulous one to define is number 2 (difficult to observe at a walk or when trotting in a straight line, but apparent when circling, carrying weight, going up or down an incline or traveling on hard surfaces). Number 3 is easier to define because you can see a lameness no matter what the horse is doing, especially at the trot--on the lunge line, being led, etc.

Dr. Lauren Trager Burns, Clinical Assistant Professor of Equine Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation at the VA-MD College of Veterinary Medicine says subtle lameness due to pain can manifest in many ways, such as a change in attitude or performance. An uncomfortable horse may not move as freely as he normally would.

"Whenever I start a lameness exam I gather a thorough history regardless of whether it is the first time I am seeing the horse or if I have known the horse for many

years. The questions I ask involve the horse and also what the owner or trainer/rider is seeing or feeling. The people who spend time with the horse every day can provide a lot of insight as to if there has been a change in the horse's attitude during its daily routine or feeding habits," she says.

A young horse in training can become body sore, for instance. Has there been any change in tack or equipment? "A thorough history is followed by what I call a static exam with the horse standing and not in motion, to evaluate posture, conformation, etc. If I find something abnormal from a conformation standpoint, I want to know if it's always looked like this or has it changed recently. For example, I may see a horse with front feet that don't match. Maybe one hoof capsule is smaller and more upright than the other. I want to know if this has always been the case or has it changed over time. Someone who sees the horse every day may not notice gradual changes, but if I haven't seen the horse in a while it may be easier for me to notice a new asymmetry. Little clues can help us determine whether there

- 0: Lameness not perceptible under any circumstances.
- 1: Lameness is difficult to observe and is not consistently apparent, regardless of circumstances (e.g. under saddle, circling, inclines, hard surface, etc.).
- 2: Lameness is difficult to observe at a walk or when trotting in a straight line but consistently apparent under certain circumstances (e.g. weight-carrying, circling, inclines, hard surface, etc.).
- 3: Lameness is consistently observable at a trot under all circumstances.
- 4: Lameness is obvious at a walk.
- 5: Lameness produces minimal weight bearing in motion and/or at rest or a complete inability to move.

has been a subtle weight-bearing discrepancy.”

When evaluating hind-end lameness issues she looks closely at muscle symmetry. “One of the easiest ways to look for asymmetry in muscle development, which can occur due to loss of use or some other issue, is to have someone hold the tail to the side so I can look at the horse from behind. I focus on the muscles between the legs, in the quadriceps and gluteal region and compare thigh circumference. Comparing side by side enables me to see if there is any asymmetry,” she says.

She also looks for any abnormality during a palpation exam, palpating the legs, while weight-bearing and non-weight-bearing. “I look for any withdrawal response from the horse, if I squeeze something that hurts or if I put a joint through passive range of motion and the horse pulls away. If repeatable, I would consider that an avoidance response. I usually end with palpation of the poll, neck, back and pelvis.”

Then she evaluates the horse in motion. “It is important to watch the horse first without tack or a rider, but I often incorporate a ridden evaluation into a lameness exam (if it’s not a young horse that hasn’t been trained or ridden yet), especially if the problem seems to occur when the horse is under saddle. I always ask if the person is comfortable riding this horse to show me the problem. If the problem is the horse bucking the rider off, we skip the ridden evaluation! Fortunately there are other strategies we can use to simulate the weight of a rider on the horse,” Burns says.

“It’s important to watch the

horse move over multiple surfaces because different problems may arise depending on whether footing is hard or soft. There are certain degrees of lameness, however, that do not warrant a full motion exam. I grade lameness using the AAEP scale of 0 to 5. I think it’s easiest to use that scale by starting with the worst grade. If a horse doesn’t want to put any weight on the leg or it’s a toe-touching lameness, that’s something you can see before the horse even moves. If the horse is consistently lame at the walk, that’s a grade 4. In those situations it’s not appropriate to have the horse moved, because it might be something as serious as a broken leg. I am very conservative about moving that horse until I know exactly what’s wrong. We don’t want to inadvertently make it worse,” she explains.

“Within those lameness grades you can have varying degrees of severity. I may write in my notes that it’s a grade 4 out of 5 but then label it mild, moderate or severe. A horse could have a mild lameness at the walk or a very obvious lameness. A grade 3 out of 5, in my mind, is a lameness that is consistently obvious when the horse is trotting, the lameness present with every stride,” says Burns.

“A grade 2 and grade 1 can be more challenging to pick up on or describe. I consider grades 1 and 2 to be present at the trot but only under certain circumstances.” The difference between a grade 1 and a grade 2 is whether the lameness is consistently apparent or inconsistently apparent under certain circumstances.

“We might trot the horse on a lunge line in a circle, for instance, and circling one way or the other

might produce a more obvious lameness. Or, trotting on a certain type of footing might worsen the lameness. If consistent at every stride it would be considered a grade 2.” The horse might travel sound on soft footing, but not when trotted on a hard surface, experiencing more concussion.

“When we watch horses move, we can see different issues that are accentuated by whether the horse is traveling in a circle or straight. We can further differentiate whether the movement asymmetry occurs during the impact or push-off phase of stride. An impact lameness shows up when the foot strikes the ground; absorbing that impact causes pain. We see a different alteration in that horse’s gait, versus a push-off lameness which shows up when the horse breaks over into the push-off phase of the stride as the foot leaves the ground. Often a push-off lameness is worse when that limb is on the outside of a circle. Impact lameness would be more obvious when the limb is on the inside of the circle.”

The strategy is to first identify the affected limb or determine whether it’s a problem in the back or neck. “Even with a thorough static and dynamic evaluation we may not be able to tell immediately what is wrong and may utilize additional diagnostics like nerve or joint blocks to pinpoint the area of pain, and then follow up with imaging. We typically start with radiographs and ultrasound and depending on what we find, may suggest an MRI, bone scan or CT,” says Burns. “Sometimes we can watch a horse and immediately determine the problem, but often we need to do a little detective work to figure it out.”

LTBA Raises Breeders Awards

The LTBA Board of Directors voted to make changes to the Louisiana Breeders Awards Schedule at their August 8, 2023, meeting.

Breeders Awards for accredited foals by Louisiana domiciled stallions and out of Louisiana domiciled mares are being increased to 25%. This change will be effective October 1, 2023, for races run in Louisiana.

All other awards will remain at the current percentage level.

UNIFIED RELOCATES TO LACER @ AZTEC EQUINE

David Tillson and partners acquired the multiple Graded stakes winner Unified from Lane's End Farm. Unified will be the only son of Candy Ride standing in Louisiana.

Unified is one of three sons of Candy Ride ranked among the top eight Third Crop Sires, #1 Gun Runner #6 Unified and #8 Mastery. In this year's Kentucky Derby there were two sons of Candy Ride and one son of Gun Runner.

Unified is the sire of 3-year-old filly Unified Alliance, winner of Saratoga's 5 1/2 furlong Coronation Cup Stakes."

Unified broke his maiden at first asking in 1:08.4, earning a 102 Equibase figure. Stakes Winner of the Gulfstream Park Sprint Stakes (G3) with a 118 Equibase. Additionally, Unified won the G2

Harris Desormeaux

Harris Desormeaux died at age 80 on Saturday, April 22, 2023.

Harris had a deep love for horses and livestock farming. This passion led him to create the infamous Acadiana Downs bushtrack. He has six children of extraordinary success, including hall-of-fame jockey, Kent, and Grade 1-winning trainer Keith, who together won an American Classic-The Preakness.

Harris proudly served in the United States Army, and he was a man of great integrity and honor.

Survivors include his wife, Brenda Hebert Desormeaux; his children, Keith Desormeaux, Kent Desormeaux, Kristie Wright (Coy), Kelli Maeda (Kenji), Kalen Duhon (Kyle), and Kip Desormeaux; grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

David Hooper,

Longtime Racing Official and Executive, Passes

David Elliott Hooper, 88, of Georgetown, Texas, passed away peacefully on Monday, May 29, 2023 after a long battle with cancer.

Hooper was born on Jan. 3, 1935. After attending the United States Naval Academy through an appointment from Congress (1953-56), he completed his studies by graduating from University of Pennsylvania as part of the class of 1961.

After graduating with a degree in International Relations, Hooper began a storied career in the horse racing industry that spanned over 60 years. He held many regulatory positions, including executive secretary of the Illinois Racing Board, and served as a steward at the state and racetrack levels in eight states. In 2018, he was the recipient of the Pete Pedersen Award from the Racing Officials Accreditation Program, which recognizes professional excellence, integrity, and benevolent consideration in the performance of their duties. In addition to his positions as a regulator, Hooper also held positions in executive administration at the Thoroughbred Breeders of Kentucky (1970-76), the Illinois Thoroughbred Breeders (1984-86), and the Texas Thoroughbred Association (1997-2012). Often referred to respectfully as "Judge," Hooper was regarded widely as being fair in his stewardship and interactions with fellow horsemen, while prioritizing the ethics of the game and safety of the jockeys. He retired in 2020, his final position as steward at Canterbury Park in Minnesota.

Survivors include his wife Martha, Sara Hufford (step daughter), Warren Hufford (step son), daughter Cynthia Slachta (Michael), Suzanne Hooper (daughter), daughter Jennifer Kash (Brian) ten grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Peter Pan Stakes and G3 Bay Shore S., both in New York. Second by a neck in the G1 Carter Handicap, Unified retired with nearly half-million dollars in earnings.

Unified will join leading general sire in Louisiana, Carpe Diem and first crop yearling sire Bobby's Wicked One for the 2024 breeding season.

Unified will be owned by Unified Stud, LLC and units (shares) will be available for purchase. He will stand for \$3,500 live foal.

El Corredor Dies at 26

Grade 1 winner El Corredor, who carried out his stud career on three continents since 2002, reportedly died June 20 at Çelikoğlu Stud in Turkey, according to the Thoroughbred racing news outlet Yyaris Dergisi. The son of Mr. Greeley was 26.

El Corredor was the first foal out of the unraced Silver Deputy mare Silvery Swan and bred in Kentucky by Needham-Betz Thoroughbreds and Liberation Farm. El Corredor sold as a yearling for \$110,000 at the 1998 Keeneland September Yearling Sale to trainer Bob Baffert, who bought the colt on behalf of owner Hal Earnhardt III.

The colt became a winner in his second start at 2 and at 3 won four of five starts, getting including the Cigar Mile H. (G1) and Del Mar Breeders' Cup H. (G2). At 4, he added two more graded stakes wins, the Del Mar Breeders' Cup and the Pat O'Brien Handicap (G2). He ended his racing career with an unplaced finish in the Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1), in which he was hindered by a quarter crack.

El Corredor entered stud at Hill 'n' Dale Farms. He was second-

ranked by progeny earnings as a freshman sire in 2005 and remained in the top five of his sire class through their second-crop and third-crop seasons. His early stud career included five shuttle trips to Argentina in 2008-2012. The stallion was relocated to Questroyal North in New York for 2013 and then to The Stallion Station @ Copper Crowne in Louisiana for 2014.

Turkish breeder Tevfik Çelikoğlu bought El Corredor in October 2014 in a deal negotiated by David Tillson of Copper Crowne Stallion Station, Marie Yoshida of Winchester Farm near Lexington, and French bloodstock agent Jean-Pierre Deroubaix.

For his career to date, El Corredor has sired 44 black-type winners that include 13 graded/group winners. El Corredor's progeny won nearly 2,200 races and earned more than US\$46.7 million.

New Breeding Statistics Added to the Jockey Club Online Fact Book

In addition to the quarterly update to its Online Fact Book, The Jockey Club June 8th, announced two new pages to the Fact Book breeding section: Number of Unique Sires by Position in the Pedigree Top Line and Percent of Mares Bred Categorized by Stallion Book Size.

The unique sires by position table shows the number of unique sires by position within the top line of the pedigree and enables users to drill down by year and generation. Those links provide stallion names and the number of registered Thoroughbreds for that generation's sires on the top sire line pedi-

gree for the registered foals of the specific year.

The percent stallions and mares bred statistics display how the number of stallions and mares have changed over time based on stallion book size.

Other updates to the Fact Book, include Reports of Mares Bred statistics' being sortable by stallion name, number of mares bred, and state, and the Breeding Statistics' being sortable by year and then by stallion name, mares bred, reports received, live foals, percent of live foals, and state.

The online Fact Book is a statistical and informational guide to Thoroughbred breeding, racing, and auction sales in North America and is updated quarterly.

Breeders Sales of Louisiana Sale Catalog Online

The Breeders Sales of Louisiana 2023 Yearling Sale followed by Mixed Session catalog is now online on the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association (LTBA) website.

The Yearling Sale which will be followed by a Mixed Session under the banner of Breeders Sales of Louisiana, will be held on Thursday, September 28th at the Equine Sales of Louisiana facility in Opelousas, La.

Originally scheduled for Saturday, September 30th, the LTBA Board of Directors decided to move the date of the 2023 Sale to Thursday, September 28th, in order

to attract buyers between the Keeneland and Fasig Tipton Mid-Atlantic Yearling Sales. LTBA hopes to attract more nationally prominent trainers and buyers who have traditionally skipped the Breeders Sale to go to Fasig Tipton.

The Breeders Sales of Louisiana 2023 sale has attracted its largest catalog to date since the LTBA jumped in to fill the void left by Equine Sales of Louisiana in 2021. The 2023 catalog includes 162 yearlings, 41 broodmares, 3 weanlings and 2 horses of racing age.

In the 2022 Sale, 138 yearlings were cataloged with 18 withdrawn. 101 yearlings sold for a gross of \$1,690,600 nearly doubling the 2021 gross of \$898,000. The yearling average was \$16,739 with a median of \$10,000 another significant increase over 2021 average \$13,027 and median \$8,000.

Three weanlings sold for a gross of \$20,000, one horse of racing age sold for \$7,000, and nine broodmares sold for a gross of \$67,800. The gross for the overall sale was \$1,785,400.

"Louisiana Breds have been very popular at the sales around the country. Now with the introduction of Sports Betting and the coming of Historical Horse Racing Machines, we anticipate that purses for Accredited Louisiana Breds will increase dramatically. We expect the value of, and demand for Louisiana Bred yearlings to increase substantially as well," says LTBA Secretary/Treasurer Roger Heitzmann, III

\$1 million Claiming Crown set for Dec. 2 at Fair Grounds

The 2023 Claiming Crown will be staged for the first time since 2011 at the Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots in New Orleans on Saturday Dec. 2. The event will feature eight races totaling \$1 million in base purses, headlined by the \$200,000 Claiming Crown Jewel.

The 25th Claiming Crown marks the second straight year that the series has gone to a Churchill Downs Inc.-owned locale. The 2022 races were held for the first time at the company's flagship track in Louisville after a 10-year-run at Gulfstream Park in Florida. The Fair Grounds staged a truncated version of the event in 2011, when the Claiming Crown moved from the summer to the late fall for the first time.

The Claiming Crown races are restricted to horses that have competed at least once for a certain claiming level or cheaper during a designated time frame, in this case 2022 or 2023. Purses for the eight Claiming Crown races will range from \$75,000 to \$200,000 for the Jewel. Another \$25,000 in each race will be available in purse supplements for accredited Louisiana-bred horses.

Conceived to be a Breeders' Cup-style event for claiming horses, the Claiming Crown was created in 1999 by the National

Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (NHBPA) and the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders Association (TOBA). The program gives thoroughbred racing's workhorses, their owners and trainers a day in the spotlight in recognition of their importance to filling out race cards across the nation.

The eight 2023 Claiming Crown races all are for horses 3 years old and up, with two of those restricted to fillies and mares. Headlining the card is the \$200,000 Jewel at 1 1/8 miles for horses that have started for a claiming price of \$35,000 or less in 2022-23. Three other races, all on turf, will offer a \$150,000 purse and have a \$25,000 claiming requirement. Those races are the Emerald at 1 1/16 miles; its filly and mare counterpart, the Tiara; and the Canterbury Tom Metzen Memorial at 5 1/2 furlongs.

The other Claiming Crown races are the \$100,000 Rapid Transit (\$16,000 claiming requirement) at six furlongs; \$100,000 Glass Slipper (\$12,500 claiming requirement) at a mile for fillies and mares; \$75,000 Iron Horse Kent Stirling Memorial (\$8,000 claiming requirement) at 1 1/16 miles, and \$75,000 Ready's Rocket Express (\$8,000 claiming requirement) at six furlongs.

The deadline to make horses eligible for the Claiming Crown is November 18, with entries to be taken November 25. Eligibility Request Forms will be available at <https://claimingcrown.com/>

Transferred as Retired from Racing now Digital

The Transferred as Retired from Racing process can now be completed digitally through the

Interactive Registration (IR) website at registry.jockeyclub.com.

Previously, the retired from racing process required notarized signatures on a hardcopy form. With the assistance of digital signature verification, The Jockey Club can confidently collect the signatures required to complete the retired from racing process through IR.

"Being able to ensure a horse can still be used for breeding but cannot race is important for many owners, and we wanted to make the retired from racing process as easy as possible yet still ensure the integrity of the process," said Rick Bailey, registrar of The Jockey Club.

The Jockey Club amended Rule 18 of the Principal Rules and Requirements of The American Stud Book from Sold Without Pedigree to Transferred as Retired from Racing in 2013 so that an owner can retire a Thoroughbred from racing without affecting its breeding privileges.

However, to bolster this current endeavor, dedicated funding has been allocated to enable each RTCA Chaplain and all local support staff members to pursue immediate accreditation through QPR Gatekeeper Training, a national program that equips individuals with the necessary skills to identify, understand, and respond to signs of potential suicide.

RTCA remains steadfast in its commitment to promoting mental

health awareness and fostering a compassionate environment within the racing community. Through the QPR accreditation of its Chaplains and local staff members, the RTCA aims to strengthen their ability to recognize and respond to mental health challenges effectively, and RTCA will continue to provide ongoing training for increased responsiveness in the days ahead.
