

Richard Ronald won the Prairie Gold Juvenile S. at. Prairie Meadows. Additional Louisiana bred runners have won at Arlington Park, Canterbury Park, Churchill Downs, Delaware Park, Del Mar, Laurel Park, Lone Star Park, etc. in recent months. COUNTRY DAY

B ack around the turn of the previous century, an old Kentucky horseman was reportedly asked, "What makes a good horse?"

"Speed, suh."

"And what else?"

The old-timer gave his questioner one of those isn't-it-obvious looks. "Mo' speed, suh, mo' speed. That's what makes a good hoss."

New to Louisiana for 2019, Country Day is a horse who embodies that old hardboot's standard. A quality sprinter during his own racing days, he comes from a pedigree that promises speed to burn, grafted onto a fine old Calumet Farm family.

A foal of 2006, Country Day was still figuring things out in his two starts at 2, but at 3 he started putting it together, winning three of his five starts and finishing third in another. At 4, he won the listed Karl Boyes Memorial Northwestern Pennsylvania Stakes as Presque Isle Downs, defeating multiple stakes winner Sneaking Uponyou and grade 1-placed grade 3 winner Ravalo, and added grade 1-placed grade 3 winner Riley Tucker and multiple listed stakes winner EZ Dreamer to his list of victims in the Hot Springs Stakes at Oaklawn Park.

Country Day did not win at 5, but he turned in some of his best performances that year, placing in four sprint stakes from five outings. His best race of the season was in the 2011 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint (G2T), when he ran a strong second in spite of a wide trip and was beaten less than two lengths by grade 1 winner Regally Ready after that rival had gotten a dream run along the inside.

Brought back at 6, Country Day ended his career with a win in the listed Colonel Power Stakes at the Fair Grounds, getting the better of longtime rival and 2010 Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint winner Chamberlain Bridge. A stakes winner on dirt, turf, and synthetics with all his wins coming at 5½ or 6 furlongs, Country Day left racing with a lifetime mark of 7-4-2 from 19 starts and earnings of \$503,829.

While Country Day's sire Speightstown is not the

only speed source in his pedigree, he is certainly a major contributor. The champion sprinter of 2004, Speightstown earned his title with four graded wins that year, capped by victory in the Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1) and a track-record-equaling performance in the Alfred G. Vanderbilt Handicap (G2) at Saratoga.

Since retiring to stud in 2005, Speightstown has ranked six times among America's top ten sires, including a runner-up finish in 2013. While primarily a source of speed, he has been a versatile stallion who has sired top offspring across the American distance spectrum and on both dirt and turf. He already has one well-established stallion son in Munnings, and Jersey Town, Lord Shanakill, and Poseidon's Warrior have all sired grade 1 winners.

On the dam's side, Country Day is one of five stakes winners produced from the Mt. Livermore mare Hidden Assets. Louisiana horse people are well acquainted with the family as the best of the group, multiple grade 3 winner Cash Control (by Pioneerof the Nile), was a three-time stakes winner at the Fair Grounds, and stakes winners Due Date (by El Prado) and Good Deed (by Broken Vow) also won stakes at the Louisiana oval.

Hidden Assets herself was a speedy mare who won the seven-furlong 2001 Shirley Handicap Jones (G3)Gulfstream Park. A half sister to grade 1-placed grade 3 winner Smooth Runner (by Local Talent), she is a daughter of Blushing Groom's good son Mt. Livermore, a multiple grade 2 winner who ran third in the 1985 Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1) and sired two champion sprinters in Housebuster and Orientate.

Hidden Assets' dam Silken Ripples supplies a shot of stamina to the pedigree as she is a daughter of Roberto, winner of

the 1972 Derby Stakes (G1) in England and a top sire of staying runners. Produced from the Chieftain mare Minnetonka, Silken Ripples is a half sister to four stakes winners (including grade 2 winner Eminency and grade 3 winner Katonka) and to Roundup Rose, dam of 1980 Preakness Stakes winner Codex. This family traces back to Calumet Farm's great filly Real Delight, whose descendants include champions Our Mims and Christmas Past as well as the great runner and sire Alydar and South African champion sire Plum Bold.


Currently fifth on the Louisiana sire list, Country Day is the least expensive stallion among the top five (he stood the 2019 season for \$2,000, with special considerations for stakes-winning mares and for breeders submitting multiple mares). He is also represented by the fewest runners with just 48, but from that group has 23 winners thus far in 2019, including Eight Belles Stakes Presented by Derby City Gaming (G2) winner Break Even and stakes winner Play On.

Country Day is getting winners from a variety of sire lines, but it is worth noting that both Break Even



and 2018 Twin Spires Turf Sprint Stakes (G3T) winner Will Call were produced from mares returning Hail to Reason (the sire of Roberto) through his son Halo. Inbreeding to Mr. Prospector also seems to be a winning strategy, a pattern seen in Will Call, his stakeswinning full sister Play On, stakes-placed Sir Brogan, and six-figure earners Pattin for a Dance, Follow My Lead, and Top Player.

A strongly-made, muscular individual with great presence, Country Day is just the type to add some power and weight to mares that are lightly built or on the lanky side. "He's built like a tank," says co-owner Lora Petre, who stands Country Day at her Peach Lane Farms near Opelousas. "He's balanced, though, and he has a great mind; he's a very easy stallion to deal with. [Co-owner] Richard Klein sent some mares bred to him down here to foal out, and he's really stamping his babies; they all have his power in their hindquarters and that straight hind leg." If that conformation translates to his speed as well, Country Day should prove a welcome ray of sunshine in the Louisiana stallion market.

Sent off at 1/9 odds, Ours to Run and jockey Roberto Morales pressed the pace at 22.64, 45.09, 56.80 and gained the lead. Down the stretch, Ours to Run began to drift slightly and brushed second place finisher Our Millie, another daughter of Half Ours,

before taking off to win by 1 1/4 lengths in the 5.5 furlong time of 1:03.48.

Rider Tim Thornton claimed foul, but stewards saw no change was needed.

"I thought we had a perfect trip in the 7-hole and she loves to be outside," said Morales. "She fought with me some and got out a little bit but it wasn't anything serious."

Kevin Atwood of Colonel Thoroughbred LLC said it was exciting to see two Half Ours' runners battle it out.

"She's a blessing," said Atwood. "We ran her a few times in Kentucky and Ohio then finally took her to Louisiana where she needs to be. She has blossomed and continues to show a lot of heart. We tried graded stakes company and even did quite well in Arkansas. We will always come back to Louisiana."

Ours to Run kept her 2019 record clean at 3-0 and improved to 12-20 for earnings of \$472,988.

The Sam Breaux trainee who just missed by a neck in the Equine Sales Oaks at Evangeline in May

returned at a mile and held off 12-1 shot Net a Bear by less than a length in the Louisiana Legends Soiree.

"Taking the lead was not the plan," said Saenz. "It just worked out. I didn't want to take her back so I just let her go."

SHE'S A JULIE MAKES THE GRADE

Choose your personal style of expressing congratulations and respect because Whispering Oaks Farm in Carencro, Louisiana has now produced a Grade 1 winner and it happened on the big stage.

Friday, May 3rd was part of Kentucky Derby weekend at Churchill Downs. On the undercard of the Kentucky Oaks was the prestigious Grade 1 La Troienne Stakes. Run at the distance of 1-1/16 mile, She's A Julie was put on hold by jockey Ricardo Santana in the early stages. On the rail around the far turn, the daughter of Elusive Quality picked up the bridle at the 3/8th pole and shifted out in search of racing room. Always gutsy and

never intimidated by a tough fight, She's A Julie was relentless in the stretch run, throwing down a late surge in the last 100 yards to win by a half length.

Owner and operator of Whispering Oaks Farm, Carrol Castille makes it his obligation to be present and accounted for when his horses go to the gate in stakes races. "It was pretty amazing to have an opportunity to run in that level of racing on that particular week," Castille remembers. "That is one of the biggest weekends of horse racing in the country. To win

my first Grade 1 made it even more spectacular. She ran one hell of a race for us."

Castille's sense of accomplishment after the La Troienne was cemented in his recollection of acquiring She's A Julie at the 2016 Keeneland September Yearling Sale. "Trainer Steve Asmussen buys my yearlings at the sales and we were together," Castille says. "We saw the outstanding pedigree. In the ring she had the outstanding look of an athlete. Steve loved her at first glance. Steve is a very private guy and doesn't put his feel-

ings out there too often. But I could tell that he wanted her bad and we were prepared to go after her pretty strong but the price held at something we were comfortable with."

Personal or professional—trust in a relationship goes a long way. "What I respect about Steve (Asmussen) is that he calls a spade a spade," Castille explains. "He is up front about what he thinks about a horse and disciplined as to what he thinks a horse is worth. Steve taught me that pedigree follows athleticism. He knew that my long term vision was to buy good fillies with the hope to run out their career and eventually to turn them out as broodmares to compliment my stallions."

Bred in Kentucky by Godolphin and out of the winning Dubai Millennium mare Kydd Gloves, the final sales hammer price for the yearling filly was \$160,000.

After the sale, She's A Julie was shipped to Whispering Oaks where Castille and his staff broke the yearling filly. The rapid development and potential talent was obvious. "Once she filled out and we got a few works into her you could tell she was headed in the right direction," Castille recalls of the early days. "She just started growing and growing. You could put her next to a bunch of stud colts and you would have trouble picking her out. From day one she was very smart and very correct. You can't teach a horse to be smart. They either have that quality or they don't."

A busy man with a purpose to improve his operation at Whispering Oaks, Castille travels to yearling sales and visits farms in Florida, Kentucky, New York and California in search of quality horses and fresh ideas. "We can't duplicate the big Kentucky farms," Castille explains, "but we are trying to imitate the best we can. All the major Kentucky farms are the same way. They are a showcase to the industry. I don't have the deep pockets that those big farms have but I can do with what I've got."

After She's A Julie development work at Whispering Oaks she was sent back to trainer Steve Asmussen where she won first time

at Churchill Downs. out Continuing to mature, She's A Julie's resume would progress to include a win in the 2018 Bayakoa Stakes at Oaklawn Park and a second place finish in the Grade 1 Alabama Stakes for 3-year-old fillies at Saratoga. She's A Julie took the Grade 3 Remington Park Oaks and the Iowa Oaks (Grade 3) at Prairie Meadows. Her win in the competitive La Troienne was the first Grade 1 victory of her career. The inaugural running of the La Troienne was in 1986 and in the subsequent thirty-three years no filly or mare has won the race twice.

Horses have their own way of communicating and Castille has learned how to listen. "We have learned that She's A Julie's best races come spaced apart. She is a big strapping mare now and she relishes a few months between races," Castille explains. "She gives you 120 percent all the time and it is a blessing to have a horse that bounces back and is eager to run. When you can win at those levels (graded stakes) you can afford to take your time."

The multiple graded stakes winner She's A Julie now runs in the name of an owner partnership that Team Hanley (Jim includes Hanley), Tim and Anna Cambron, Bradley Thoroughbreds and Sol Kummin's Madaket Stables. Her lifetime career box (14: 6-2-2) shows a desire to win and her earnings of \$902,880 is teasing the \$1 million plateau. Castille remains the managing partner, which means he has total decision control over where She's A Julie runs, when she runs and who trains her.

The responsibility of Castille's position will soon be tested. She's A Julie is currently stabled at Saratoga for the summer. "Steve has everything laid out ahead of time. I'm sure he has a spot picked out for her but the ultimate goal is to get her to the Breeder's Cup and give her a shot," Castille explains. "We will see what happens come November. A lot of people (horsemen) are waiting to see. The stories coming out about the surface at Santa Anita are a concern. Horse racing does not need another black eye. If they don't change the venue I think a lot of people are not going to show up. For all that she has done for us; we can't take chances with a quality mare like She's A Julie."

LOUISIANA DOWNS HORSERACING HALL OF FAME

Louisiana native John Franks, a nationally prominent owner-breeder, headed the first induction class of Harrah's Louisiana Downs' new Racing Hall of Fame during ceremonies at the racetrack July 13.

The ceremonies honored the achievements of the elite group that also included trainers, jockeys, horses and others important in the history of the Bossier City racetrack, opened in 1974. The 12 enshrined were recognized with a photo and other memorabilia on a large wall display near the track's front foyer.

A Hall of Fame committee that

included track Vice President of Operations Eric Halstrom, Director of Racing David Heitzmann, and announcer John McGary selected eight members of the first induction class, which also included former track owner Ed DeBartolo Sr., trainers Frank Brothers and C.W. "Cracker" Walker, jockeys Ron Ardoin and Larry Synder, and equine stars Sunday Silence and Louisiana-bred Free Spirits Joy.

Additionally and unlike any other racetrack hall of fame in the nation, fans voting online selected four other inductees: former track general manager Tom Sweeney, trainer Bobby Barnett, jockey Calvin Borel, and fan favorite runner Alysheba.

"We wanted to have a hall of fame, but we wanted to have something fun, too...to make the public involved," Halstrom said about getting the fans and customers involved in an online poll that resulted in more than 1.400 votes.

Halstrom noted the overall difficulty in choosing the track's first induction class when so many—both people and horses—have made lasting contributions. "Establishing a hall of fame is a lot harder than keeping one going."

a Haughton, La., native and an undeniably ardent supporter of Louisiana Downs, where he was an 18-time leading owner and is credited with much of the track's success. He received multiple Eclipse Awards as the nation's outstanding owner and outstanding breeder. His operation, which included breeding farms in Louisiana and Florida, included runners such as homebred Answer Lively, champion two-year-old male of 1998.

"It goes without saying that no owner has ever had an impact on racing at Louisiana Downs or the entire state like Mr. Franks has had," McGary said during the ceremony. "And that's why we have chosen—in fact, we were forced to induct him as the first member of the Louisiana Downs Racing Hall of Fame."

Other committee selections for the first induction class were:

Edward DeBartolo Sr., who



purchased almost the entirety of stock in Louisiana Downs after the first season of operation. Under his leadership the

track set numerous national records

for handle and attendance throughout the 1970s and '80s.

"He had a clear vision of how to grow racing in northwest Louisiana and was at the helm for the creation of our signature event, the Super Derby," McGary said.

Frank Brothers won of nearly 800 races at Louisiana Downs and nine consecutive training titles from 1980 through 1988. He is the all-time leader in stakes wins there, with 127. Retired from training in 2009, he is now a bloodstock agent.

C. W. "Cracker" Walker, second all-time leading trainer at Louisiana Downs. His three-decade career was spent between Fair Grounds and Louisiana Downs where his prowess in claiming horses made him a legend. Won the track's trainer title in 1977.

Ron Ardoin, the track's all-time winningest rider. In a 20-year span won six riding titles at Louisiana Downs,



the first in 1977 and the last in 1996.

"An incredible stretch of excellence for a demanding occupation," McGary said of the former jockey, now a jockey agent, who rode nearly 3,000 winners at the track and 5,226 overall.

Larry Synder won six consecutive riding titles at Louisiana Downs from 1981 through 1986 during an exemplary 35-year riding career. He was a steward after retiring from the saddle in 1994 with 6,388 triumphs.

Free Spirits Joy, at odds of 28-1, won the 1991 Super Derby (G1) when it was worth \$1 million. By regional sire Joey Bob, he won or placed in 21 of 32 career starts and earned \$841,277 for breeders Nick Karabaic, Rudolph Bucsko, and John Lane, who campaigned him under the Free Spirit Stable banner.

Sunday Silence took the 1989 Super Derby en route to U.S. Horse of the Year and Champion 3-Year-Old Male honors that also followed wins in that year's Kentucky Derby (G1), Preakness Stakes (G1), and Breeder's Cup Classic (G1). A member of the National Museum of Racing Hall of Fame who was a breed-shaping sire in Japan.

Honorees chosen by fan voting:

Tom Sweeney, former track

general manager who was instrumental in the expansion of simulcasting and the passage and implementation of



video poker in 1992, both forms of revenue that were and continue to be key in the track's success.

Bobby Barnett, a three-time leading trainer at Louisiana Downs (1991, '94, '97) and saddled 2004 Super Derby winner Fantasticat. He was the primary trainer for John Franks. Won nearly 500 races at the track.

Calvin Borel, a three-time leading jockey at Louisiana Downs (1991, '92, '94) and winner of more than 1,200 races and 60 stakes there. A three-time winner of the Kentucky Derby (G1) who has won 5,241 races.

Alysheba won the Super Derby in 1987 after winning the Kentucky Derby and Preakness (G1). He was retired from racing in 1988 as the nation's all-time leading money earner, with \$6,679,242. He was inducted into the National Museum of Racing Hall of Fame in 1993.

"The accomplishments of these prodigious leaders, horsemen and tremendous racing champions are truly significant, both for Louisiana and the national racing industry," Halstrom said.

WILD ABOUT STAR

Close your eyes. Imagine Evelyn Benoit speechless.

Seldom at a loss for words---Benoit lost her voice for three days after Brittlyn Stable's home-bred Wild About Star won the \$100,000 The Very One stakes on May 14 at Pimlico Race Course on the undercard of the Preakness Stakes.

Benoit was with her 5-year-old Star Guitar mare on the shed row at Delaware Park the night before the race. "I went straight from the airport to the barn," Benoit recalls. "It was 10 o'clock at night and she was

cleaning up a bucket of oats and molasses. Her color and attitude

was great. She looked amazing. You could tell she was sitting on a big race."

Trained by Venezuelan-born Jose Camejo, Wild About Star shipped in to Pimlico on the morning of the race. From the first crop of Star Guitar, Wild About Star had previously done all of her racing in Louisiana. Going five furlongs on the turf and breaking from an outside post, Wild About Star made a statement for Louisiana-breds on the national scene. Three wide on the turn, Wild About Star chased

the early pace before taking command at the 1/8th pole and drew off to win by daylight.

It may not have been good for her vocal chords but for Benoit, winning a \$100,000 stakes on the Preakness undercard was a dream come true. "From the time I landed at Delaware Park until we were in the winner's circle I was treated like royalty," Benoit recalls of the experience. "Every single person we met in Baltimore was kind and accommodating. Day or night the management and staff at Pimlico allowed us access to everything."

"The atmosphere at the track was incredible. The place was packed," Benoit continued. "The whole day was one big party just like the Kentucky Derby. The crowd was really into it. The enthusiasm was off the charts."

In the party atmosphere and media attention, Benoit never made it back to her reserved seat in the clubhouse to watch the race.



"People that I had never seen in my life came up and wanted to talk," she explained. "When I walked out of the paddock I couldn't find a place to stand."

Benoit is no stranger to traveling to stakes venues and being on hand to root for her horses. "In forty years I don't think there has been more than two occasions when I was not present," she says. "It is very important to me. I just keep trying to promote horse racing in any way that I can. No matter what other business ventures I am

involved with, horse racing has my maximum attention."

Louisiana-bred Horse of the Year four times, the top money earning Louisiana-bred in history and winner of 24 of 30 starts, Star Guitar is the glue that holds Benoit's racing stable together. "From the very beginning I knew that Star Guitar was the best horse I ever bred," Benoit says. "From the day he started racing my bond with him grew stronger and got me through some tough personal times."

For Benoit, winning The Very One stakes on the Preakness undercard was exhilarating but she is not one to dwell in the past. "I can't say enough about my trainer Jose Camejo and his racing team," Benoit explains. "They are so thrilled and committed to the progeny of Star Guitar. I'm looking forward to finding more quality mares to breed to Star Guitar. Just wait until you see the next batch."

AWARDS BANQUET

On Sunday, March 31st, Louisiana horsemen and women gathered at the Equine Sales facility in Opelousas to honor the 2018 Accredited Louisiana Bred Champions and their connections at the Annual Meeting and Awards Banquet.

While the majority of the award winners had been announced previously, the overall horse of the year was named at the banquet. Voted on by the LTBA Board of Directors, this year's Louisiana Bred Horse of the Year is Monte Man.

Monte Man won six of seven starts in 2018, including five stakes

wins. He won the Louisiana Premier Night Sprint at Delta Downs in February, the Costa Rising Stakes at Fair Grounds in March, the Louisiana Legends Night Sprint at Evangeline Downs in May, the Louisiana Cup Sprint at Louisiana Downs in August and the Heitai Stakes at Fair Grounds in November. In his final start of the year Monte Man ran third in the Louisiana Champions Day Sprint. Total 2018 earnings for the son of Custom For Carlos out of Sarah's My Angel added up to \$257,690. Monte Man, who also received the award for Older Louisiana Bred

PRE-PURCHASE EXAMS AND YEARLING SELECTIONS

Many young horses are bred and raised to be sold at special yearling sales—as prospective racehorses or breeding stock. Preparing these horses to come to the sale sound and healthy (and look their best), and give an indication of their future athletic potential, is the goal of the breeder. Every sale prospect is also thoroughly checked by a veterinarian to assess health and soundness.

Duncan Peters DVM, MS, Dipl. ACVSMR, co-owner and founder of East-West Equine Sports Medicine in Lexington, Kentucky does a lot of pre-purchase exams for all kinds of horses. "The buyer of a horse is making a decision, and we as veterinarians are there to assist with the medical aspects of that horse, and what we see at that particular time," he says.

"It's similar to a home inspection, if you were buying a house, in terms of trying to find any flaws. We are trying to see if there is anything that may affect the intended use of that horse. For racing, we are looking closely at the musculoskeletal system, the respiratory system and cardiovascular system, in terms of that horse being successful as a racehorse, and being able to perform optimally and stay sound," says Peters.

"The hardest thing to predict is how those horses are going to do, 2 years down the road or so. Racehorses have a short window of athletic performance, compared with sport horses in terms of longevity in a lifetime career. In either case, however, we want a horse that is solid and sound from a medical standpoint, respiratory standpoint and cardiovascular standpoint, as well as muscles and skeleton," he says.

"One of the first things we look at is conformation. Does this horse look like an athlete? For sales horses and young racehorses, this can be hard to determine. In many cases, the potential buyer or the agent doing the buying has already decided that this horse-because of his looks and/or bloodlines and physical exam-seems athletic and should be able to do the job. When looking at young horses, we are hoping we can predict a good future, based on certain parameters such as lineage and the physical attributes in front of us," Peters

"The pre-purchase exam is basically a physical exam looking for flaws in that horse's athletic ability that may hinder or not allow him to be the best he can be. Luck has a lot to do with it." Even though good conformation is important, you can't always predict how successful a horse will be, based on what he looks like. Sometimes the good-looking horse won't run as well as the one with poorer conformation that has a lot of heart. That's the unpredictable part of selecting a horse.

CONFORMATION

"We look at conformation, especially feet and legs. We want to make sure that their conforma-

tion will allow them to run at speed. Angular limb deformities or hoof abnormalities are scrutinized. Is this horse put together well enough to deal with the forces and stresses that come with training and running?"

General conformation is also important, looking at length, depth and angles in the body. "Is the horse well-balanced from front end to hind end? Is he strong through the top line? Does he have the musculature as well as the bone mass to support the body and to develop into an athlete that can do the job?

"Then we start looking at basic medical specifics such as how the heart and lungs sound. Can the horse see? Does he have normal jaw and dental conformation? There are many things that are part of a general exam," says Peters.

"If everything is all right in a general exam, from there we usually look at muscles and skeleton, palpate the joints, and look for any increased fluid or abnormalities associated with fluid or tissue enlargements around the joints. We check for soreness by palpation, flexion of the joints, putting pressure on them to see if the horse reacts abnormally, etc. All of these things are important, to give us an indication whether or not there may be a potential joint problem," he says.

"We also palpate ligaments and tendons—flexor tendons, suspensory ligaments, sesamoidean ligaments, etc. We are looking for any

enlargements or abnormalities, and any sensitivity or tenderness. Even at a very young age we sometimes find abnormalities in some of these horses that might preclude being an athlete," he explains.

"With young racehorses at these sales, usually we don't get the chance to evaluate them at different gaits. With yearlings and some of the sales horses we only get to evaluate them at the walk. We can only speculate and make some projections as to what they may do at the trot or gallop. This can be difficult and takes a well-trained eye-someone who has been around these horses and seen them develop as they get older and go into training, and see the type of walk that may project or correlate with the ability to run," he says.

"Some veterinarians have a tremendous eye and a knack for that, but in many cases this evaluation/projection is done by the agent or the potential buyer. They like that particular young horse because of what they see in that walk and how the horse carries himself in terms of body language. As veteri-

narians, we are mainly just looking to see if the horse has any physical impairment such as a tightness behind the knee. This might indicate that the horse could have problems with the flexor tendon down the road," he says.

If a horse is bench-kneed (offset cannons) this might make him prone to splints or medial suspensory problems-on the inside of the leg. "Those are the types of things we look at, from a little different perspective than the person who is looking at the lineage or focusing on how the horse looks (a nice body and how he is put together and how he moves). As veterinarians we may see something lower; the horse might have a nice body but he's a little abnormal on one leg; it's built a little bit differently and may result in soundness issues later," explains Peters.

"We don't want to see bumps and bruises in young racehorses because their career is short. We can't afford for them to have much time off for healing since that cuts into their earning ability in that short window," he says.

CHECKING FOR PROBLEMS

"Most sales have repository x-rays on file. During the pre-purchase exam we look at those repository x-rays and look for any problems that may show up in the bones that are not showing up when we look at the horse itself. There may be subtle changes associated with the sesamoid bones, or little cysts in joints or osteochondral fragments (chips). This makes us reconsider what we saw in our physical exam regarding the potential for that horse," he says.

Sometimes additional x-rays are taken. "The veterinarian may see something on the older x-rays and want to take a little different view of that. It might indicate a little roughness, or already a bony problem starting. We have the option to re-shoot radiographs of that area and take another view of it. This can be revealing, in some cases," says Peters.

The veterinarian may also use ultrasound to check a joint. "It's not unusual for some of these babies to go to a sale and bang themselves.

FUTURE SELECTION TOOLS

Some people are doing heart scans on sales prospects, and there will be other techniques available in the future that can aid buyers and breeders. "There will also be genetic testing; some of this is already being done. We look at bloodlines, but eventually we may be looking at types of muscle fibers, percentages of types of muscle fibers, to know if this horse is a sprinter or a distance runner, etc. We've done this a little with selective breeding, but once genetic testing is more available and more refined, we will be looking at things like that, to give us an indications of muscle make-up or weakness of bone tissue, etc.," says Peters.

"With a better understanding of the equine genome, in the future we may be selecting horses based on genetic markers for stamina, muscle types, laryngeal concerns, bone strength, tendon/ligament composition and a myriad of other characteristics that people desire. Some people are already looking at the genetic aspects of horses that are roarers or have a problem with their respiratory system. Researchers have isolated a gene, and there are ongoing studies looking at these things in Thoroughbreds because they have found it in other breeds. Genetic testing may be commonplace in the future; we can pull some blood and see if this horse has a gene for more likely being a roarer. Some of these things can be important to that horse's ability to run, later in life," he says.

They are in an unfamiliar environment for a short time, with a lot of activity going on. They may get upset and rambunctious, or may get cast in the stall—or jump up and kick out and hit themselves and get a lump on a leg. If you're looking at a horse and there's a soft tissue swelling, we can check it. If the horse got frantic in the stall he may have hit himself, and we can use ultrasound to determine if there is any damage or just a little temporary swelling."

RESPIRATORY TRACT

"We examine the respiratory tract and larynx, looking for changes that may cause a breathing problem later when these horses start training and racing. We look at size and shape of the larynx and any early indications of inflammation or irritation, or abnormalities

associated with the larynx. Many of these horses will be scoped and looked at in the barn alley at these sales," he says.

"We scope them and make some kind of projection regarding whether or not the airway is large enough. Is the arytenoid cartilage abnormally shaped? We can look at this visually (by scoping) or sometimes ultrasound the larynx and get some indication of problems that may not show up when the horse is just walking around," says Peters.

TWO-YEAR-OLD SALES AND TRAINING SALES

You can get a little more indication of the horses' athletic ability when they are a little older, at a two-year-old sale, because by that time they are working and training. "We can watch them work or gallop if a buyer wants us to watch a cer-

tain horse. We can get an indication regarding ability and soundness if we can watch horses perform and assess how they are moving and how they handle it, their running times, etc. This is an advantage if you want to try to predict what that horse will do once he gets into a full racing career," he says.

"You can also watch their movement and biomechanics a little better, to know how their feet and legs are moving and swinging—how they are reaching up underneath themselves, how they are using their back and neck, etc. You can evaluate their efficiency of movement versus just watching them walk around as a yearling." There are several advantages to evaluating the slightly older horse.

While Equine Sales Company's 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale may not be on the radar for many bloodstock agents, Josh Stevens started attending the Louisiana sale when his clients began sending horses to race at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots. At the 2019 Opelousas sale, Stevens purchased a gray/roan daughter of Calibrachoa for \$45,000, the highest paid for any horse at the auction, which also included broodmares and racing or broodmare prospects.



Consigned as Hip 39 by Pike Racing as agent, the filly, named Southern Beauty, was foaled Feb. 24, 2017 and bred in Louisiana by J. Adcock and Montgomery Equine Center. The filly was produced from Yes It's True mare, Isn't She Gorgeous, a winner of \$94,053 and half sister to stakes winner Yes Gorgeous.

"The filly worked well. Not only did she make good time but I thought she had good mechanics in her video," Stevens said of the sale-topper's pre-sale breeze of an eighth-mile in :10 2/5. "She was straightforward at the barn and had a big, loose, athletic walk."

Equine Sales reported the sale overall grossed \$416,600 for 32 sold, producing an average price of \$13,019 and a \$7,500 median price. From 47 offered, 15 went unsold.

During the 2018 sale, 42 head changed hands from 62 offered, with gross receipts of \$733,400 for an average price of \$17,462 and a \$11,500 median.

"I thought it was a quality sale...horses were bringing consistent money throughout," Stevens said.

Among graduates of the 2018 sale have been multiple stakes winners Midnight Fantasy (a \$77,000sale graduate; current earnings \$214,760) and Classy John (a \$12,000 sale graduate; current earnings \$202,064).

THE GOOD, THE BAD, AND THE AGING CHARLETANS

LHRA is very appreciative of the large majority of responsible horse owners out there in our small circle of the world.

There are responsible owners such as Frank and Sunny Francois, who as soon as they receive papers on a horse write on the back, "This horse always has a home at our farm, please call this number xxx-xxx-xxxx." We applaud owners that will pay to send a horse to a good home rather than squeeze out an extra hundred bucks by selling to a slaughter buyer or by selling cheap to a "mystery person" and tell themselves it is all going to be alright.

As a responsible owner, you are the industry's first line of defense against increasing government regulations and huge surges in anti-horseracing sentiment. We must remember that the general public has little knowledge of the racing industry. They know about the Kentucky Derby, but that is about it. If the general public keeps hearing horror stories, that is what they will remember the most. If you as an owner or a breeder are not contributing to the welfare and aftercare of your horses, you are part of the problem.

The world in general, but especially the horse world, is getting smaller. Social media is literally everywhere. Nearly every person in the world has a camera in their pocket and wants to be famous, often at someone else's expense. Unscrupulous people like the infamous "Kill Pen Buyers" have moved into the spotlight, extorting as much money as they can from every horse they lay their hands on.

There are fundraising organizations like Dina Alborano's "icareihelp" which is suspected to be complicit in the mass starvation of Thoroughbreds in North Louisiana.

TAA (Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance), offers to "help" our horses,

but in actuality the money they raise may not stay in our state or help our Louisiana horses. The TAA has managed to make contributions to their organization cumpulsory when you register your foals through the Jockey Club, thus draining hundreds of thousands of dollars out of Louisiana.

As an owner or breeder, you must be vigilant and aware when someone makes promises too good to be true – please let your common sense prevail.

On the brighter side of things, there are people and organizations in the world that are sincerely interested in the welfare of our Louisiana horses. It is our duty as responsible stewards of the Louisiana horse industry to seek out and support these organizations. Rick Porter and Victoria Keith brought the National Thoroughbred Welfare Organization (NTWO) to Louisiana and they have been making a difference in the Thoroughbred racing world by re-homing over 200 unwanted horses in the past year alone. There are other good people and organizations out there as well that focus more on equine care and wellness rather than fundraising, so please invest some time and due diligence into supporting them.

I know this article has been sort of a chronicle of "The Good, The Bad and the Ugly of Louisiana Thoroughbreds" but as breeders and owners we have to be aware of our industry and the footprints we leave behind for later generations to follow. The "shut it all down" mentality of some individuals toward horse racing would leave a big void in our Louisiana economy – and in our hearts.

If you as an owner, breeder or industry official should ever wonder what you can do to prevent your industry from receiving unwanted or undue scrutiny, well you are in luck.

The very first thing you can do is BE AWARE of what happens to a horse that you bred, owned or shared a stake in.

The second thing you can do is BE ACTIVE in your industry and in equine aftercare. If you see a problem, or what you feel could be a developing problem - make some noise. If somebody is telling you something that just might sound too good to be true, it usually is. If you donate a dollar even if you are forced to - make sure it does some good. Call the Jockey Club at 800-444-8521 or email them at inquiries@jockeyclub.com demand options that your money stays in your state. Be persistent, write down the names of who you spoke with and let them know we want our money back.

Always be on the lookout for scammers in the horse industry, and if you see someone on the backside of a race track campaigning for unwanted horses tell the track officials immediately. Take their picture! All four of our Louisiana racetracks are supposed to be suspending racing licenses for anyone who is remotely involved in sending a horse to slaughter, so make them be responsible.

LHRA can't be everywhere all of the time, but with your help we can – and will – promote equine welfare and help horse racing survive in this new and smaller world we all share.

Sister Peacock First Stakes Winner for Louisiana Based Real Solution

Sister Peacock and jockey Jesse Campbell led gate-to-wire in the \$100,000 Star Shoot Stakes for 3-year-old fillies at Woodbine April 21, boosting her record to three wins from five starts.

Owned by Brent and Russell McLellan and trainer Stuart Simon, the Kentucky-bred daughter of Real Solution, who stands at Blue Star Racing in Scott, Louisiana, was a 1 1/4-length winner in the six-furlong feature, giving her sire his first stakes winner.

Blue Star Racing to Stand Breaking Lucky

Blue Star Racing in Louisiana announced May 7 it will add Breaking Lucky, a graded stakeswinning half brother to the dam of Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) winner Country House, to its stallion roster for 2020.

The farm near Scott, La., bought the millionaire son of Lookin At Lucky prior to the Arkansas Derby (G1) from a racing partnership that included West Point Thoroughbreds, Reeves Thoroughbred Racing, Eric Young, and R. A. Hill Stable.

"We are so excited because we are adding another graded stakeswinning millionaire to our roster," said Blue Star Racing owner Dex Comardelle, who started standing multiple grade 1 winner Real

Solution in 2018. "This is an opportunity for the breeders in our area to tap into a sire line that is red hot in Lookin At Lucky. You also are tapping into a very deep female family as well."

Breaking Lucky broke his maiden in his second start at 3 and four races later won his first stakes in the Prince of Wales Stakes at Fort Erie Racetrack. At 4, the chestnut colt won the Seagram Cup Stakes (G3) at Woodbine and placed in four other graded stakes, including a runner-up effort in the Clark Handicap (G1).

Breaking Lucky retired with a 4-6-6 record out of 27 starts and earnings of \$1,196,376.

Quake Lake, who died during foaling in 2016, produced three winners from as many to race, including two black-type winners.

Comardelle said a fee for Breaking Lucky will be announced at a later date.

Call Me George Gets First Winner With Lady George

Freshman sire Call Me George, a grade 2 winning son of Point Given, had his first winner when Lady George won a maiden claiming race in her second start May 10 at Pimlico Race Course.

The 2-year-old Lady George, came from just off the pace to sweep to the front in the stretch of the 4 1/2-furlong test, winning by 2 1/2 lengths in a final time of :52.13.

Lady George was bred in Maryland by Lady Olivia at North Cliff, which also campaigns the filly.

Undefeated through his three-year-old year, One Liner was among Steve Haskins "Derby Dozen" before an injury took him off the Kentucky Derby trail. At four he ran second in the G3 Pimloco Stakes. Trained by Todd Pletcher, One Liner accumulated \$475,250 in earnings from nine starts with four wins.

He is the only son of top sire and sire of sires Into Mischief standing in Louisiana. Into Mischief son Goldencents concluded 2018 ranked #2 among first crop sires in the country.

Bred in Kentucky, One Liner is out of the winning Cherokee Run mare Cayala and is from the family of Donn Handicap winner Albertus Maximus.

One Liner will stand for a 2019 fee of \$3,500 live foal.

Country Day daughter Break Even wins the G2 Eight Belles Stakes

Klein family homebred Break Even took a runaway victory in the \$250,000 Eight Belles Stakes Presented by Derby City Gaming (G2) on May 3 at Churchill Downs.

"This is a homebred on homebred," said Richard Klein, who owns the 3-year-old filly's sire Country Day and raced her dam, Exotic Wager. "This is emotional because my parents aren't here to be a part of it, but I went to the cemetery yesterday and told them we were going to have a good weekend."

The family bred and raced Break Even's sire, graded-placed stakes winner Country Day, a son of Speightstown, who was relocated from Crestwood Farm to Peach Lane Farms in Louisiana for this year's breeding season.

Break Even broke her maiden Jan. 1 at Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots by five lengths. Since then, she won consecutive races by 4 1/2 lengths each, including the listed Purple Martin Stakes at Oaklawn Park.

Break Even is the third black-type winner for Country Day. The others are grade 3 winner Will Call and black-type winner Play On, all of them bred and raced by Klein and trained by Cox.

Country Day is a graded-placed, multiple stakes winner, who banked more than \$500,000 when he was retired. To date he has sired 37 winners out of 57 to race. His progeny have earned more than \$2.32 million and average \$40,721 per runner. He is standing at Peach Lane Farms in Opelousas, Louisiana.

Bob Fortus

Bob Fortus, a longtime Times-Picayune writer who won national awards for his painstaking coverage of horse racing in New Orleans over three decades, died Tuesday of complications of injuries he suffered when a car struck him on March 29. Fortus, who died in Capitol House Nursing and Rehabilitation Center in Baton Rouge, was 69.

Fortus was hit while walking near the Fair Grounds racetrack, where he had poured his passion for the sport and its practitioners – jockeys, trainers, owners and the horses themselves – into his coverage. He worked for the newspaper from the early 1980s until he was laid off in 2012.

"What Bob was passionate about, he was really passionate about," said Doug Tatum, another former Times-Picayune sports editor. "He didn't go halfway on things. He was immensely passionate about horse-race coverage. He took pride in it, in being the source in New Orleans for horse-racing news."

Fortus won recognition for his devotion to racing coverage. He was named to the Fair Grounds Press Box Hall of Fame in 2011. Two years later, he won the National Turf Writers and Broadcasters' Walter Haight Award, which, the organization said, honored "career excellence in turf writing."

"I don't think we can overstate his love for horse racing," said Gary West, a close friend. He and Fortus collaborated on "Ride to Win: An Inside Look at the Jockey's Craft," which was published in 2015.

During their tenure at Caesars' racing properties, the horses are cared for by multiple staff members on behalf of individual trainers and owners, who provide the utmost care through feeding programs, veterinary care, horseshoeing needs and other essential requirements for their overall physical condition. Individual trainers and owners make the decision on the next step for their horses after their racing careers are over, and often reach out to aftercare programs as the best option for a second career.

Empire of Hope will be launched at four of Caesars' racing properties: Harrah's Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, LA; Indiana Grand in Shelbyville, IN; Harrah's Hoosier Park in Anderson, IN; and Harrah's Philadelphia.

Texas Purses to Get Boost From New Law

As much as \$17.5 million per year could be used to support Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse purses in Texas as a result of legislation signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott in the 2019 legislative session.

House Bill 2463 diverts sales taxes on horse feed, tack and other horse-related products and services from the state's general fund to an escrow account established by the Texas Racing Commission and capped at \$25 million annually. No more than 70% of the funds in the escrow account may go toward purses. If the escrow account reaches \$25 million, that would be an additional \$17.5 million in purse money annually, virtually doubling the current amount, based on an economic study conducted by TXP Inc. consultants.

A second piece of racing legislation, House Bill 1995, was also signed into law by Abbott. This bill diverts the 1% simulcast tax from the general fund to the Texas Racing Commission, which has been financially strained in recent years. The approiximate \$2.8 million windfall will allow the commission to restructure racetrack license fees.

Texas, the largest state in the continental U.S., does not permit off-track betting or advance-deposit wagering. Over the last 15 years, according to the TXP Inc. study, wagering in Texas has fallen from \$900 million annually to \$340.2 million and purses have dropped from \$32.5 million to \$16.8 million.

Louisiana Legislature Passes Bill Allocating \$5 Per Start To Fund Aftercare

The Louisiana state legislature approved a measure to allocate \$5 per start to a fund for Thoroughbred aftercare. HB384 states monies raised from the funding stream would be managed by a representative of Louisiana horsemen for withdrawals and disbursement from the Horsemen's Bookkeeper Account.

The bill, authored by Rep. Clay Schexnayder (R-District 81), was passed unanimously by both the Louisiana House of Representatives and Senate.

The language in HB384 does allow the automatic donation to be "withdrawn or opted out of by providing written notification to the representative of horsemen in the state."

The bill was signed by the governor June 11.

FDA Issues Warning After Compounded EPM Medication Leads To The Death Of Three Horses

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is alerting horse owners and veterinarians that one lot of a compounded combination drug product containing pyrimethamine and toltrazuril has been associated with adverse events in at least three horses. Two horses in Maine and one in Ohio ultimately died or were euthanized as a result.

The FDA recently finalized testing that revealed that this lot of product contained approximately 18 to 21 times the pyrimethamine indicated on the labeling. High doses of pyrimethamine can cause symptoms such as seizures, fever, and death.

Rapid Equine Solutions, LLC of Aston, PA, compounded the product, which was labeled as containing toltrazuril 416 mg/ml and pyrimethamine 17 mg/ml, packaged in 60 ml oral paste syringes for the treatment of the neurologic disease Equine Protozoal Myeloencephalitis (EPM). This product lot is accounted for and is

no longer in distribution. The firm learned of the adverse events on May 24, 2019 and initiated a recall to the consumer/user level the same day.

The FDA is working with Rapid Equine Solutions and state partners to investigate these adverse events.

It is important to note that compounded products are not FDAapproved animal Additionally, toltrazuril is not FDA-approved for use in horses. The FDA has serious safety concerns about unapproved animal drugs, including certain compounded animal drugs, because they are of unknown quality have not been evaluated by the FDA for safety and effectiveness. Unapproved animal drugs also may not be labeled appropriately, which could potentially result in unsafe use of the product.

The FDA has approved several drug products for the treatment of EPM. Horse owners should consult their veterinarian for treatment advice.

The FDA encourages horse owners, caretakers and veterinarians to report adverse events to the FDA (such as seizure, fever, or collapse) in horses being treated with compounded pyrimethamine-containing products.

Owners and veterinarians can report complaints about animal drug products by following the instructions at: How to Report Animal Drug Side Effects and Product Problems.

New Vocations Opens Facility in Louisiana

New Vocations Racehorse Adoption Program announced March 28, that they have expanded their efforts by opening a satellite facility in Covington, Louisiana. The new facility will focus solely on taking in horses retiring from one of the four Louisiana race-tracks as well as training centers and farms within the state.

Last November former jockey Rosie Napravnik initiated talks with both New Vocations and the Louisiana HBPA, expressing her concern for the need to create more aftercare options for retired racehorses in the state. Those talks lead to what will now be the New Vocations Louisiana facility located at the Equi-Best Equestrian Center.

They only care about certain trainers, owners and cheap horses. The purse structure is set to help the cheap horse and not the better horse.

Discussion continued on racing and what it means to the breeding program, including how the lower claimers are keeping racing enthusiasts from buying young horses to develop when they can turn around a lower level claimer for a pot that is four times their worth.

Val then asked guest Heidie Mikrantz to weigh in on the subject of our breed back domicile rules as a breeder from Texas that participates in our program. She informed the board of their involvement and their lack of participation lately. Her response was that the cost to leave a mare in Louisiana was just high trying to adhere to the domicile rules. She voiced that she was firmly against the Z Horse concept.

L.T.B.A. MINUTES

Val mentioned the change he was proposing does not have the Z Horse in it. Discussion continued on the proposal made by Val Murrell. Dates of domicile, breed back sires, and time spent in the state were some of the subjects covered.

Different types of modification to Val's presentation were offered in an effort to work something out.

Several changes suggested were tied to each mare having their own entry and departure date, with the idea that they had to spend six months in the state. Jay Adcock pointed out that it would be an inspection nightmare. The inspector would have to inspect every mare at entry and at departure.

Jay objected to any by-law change today as the specific changes were not identified. Alex Bonin stressed to the board that changes could be made but the best way to make changes is to have them completely done and submitted to vote. When you change the changes made while meeting, it clouds the water and opens the door for members to object to them at a later date due to lack of knowledge of a specific change.
