

Thad hoped that by now, COVID-19 would be history. However it continues to be a tremendous burden to everyone, and the thoroughbred industry has been hit hard. Thankfully racing (with safety restrictions) has resumed at both Evangeline Downs and Louisiana Downs, and the good news is that races are filling. Horsemen want to run their athletes, and the competition is strong.

Louisiana Legends Night, originally scheduled for May, ran on the 4th of July at Evangeline Downs with full fields for the six Louisiana

Bred stakes. With the best Louisiana breds battling it out around the oval, those in attendance were treated to some exciting racing, with four of the six races settled by a head. Congratulations to the connections of all.

At press time, the running of Louisiana Cup Day at Louisiana Downs is still uncertain. LTBA is working with the management of the Bossier City track, and doing everything we can to make the third major contest for Louisiana Bred stakes runners a go.

Around the country, Louisiana breds continue to make an impact.

Our Louisiana program now has a new Grade 1 Stakes Winner to our credit. No Parole (Violence - Plus One) won the G1 Woody Stephens Stakes at Belmont Park in an impressive gate to wire victory. Congratulations to breeders, Keith and Ginger Myers of Coteau Grove Farms. Another Louisiana bred. Libertyrun, became the first winner for his sire, 2015 champion sprinter Runhappy, winning a \$31,000 maiden special weight at Indiana Grand. Two time leading Louisiana breeder, James McIngvale, is both owner and breeder.

impact on the sales as well as horse racing. The LTBA is working hand in hand with Equine Sales Company to host the Consignor Select and Two-Year-Old In Training Sale. We understand how important it is for our breeders to have a venue to promote our valuable Louisiana-breds. The sale which will take place August 20th in Opelousas has 163 yearlings and seven two-year-olds catalogued at press time, with expected supplements by the time of the auction. COVID safety measures will be in place, in accordance with state guidelines.

Louisiana breds continue to impress at the sales around the country as well. A Half Ours colt (Hip 383) posted the fastest quarter mile (:20 1/5) in the under tack show for the OBS July 2-Year-Olds and Horses of Racing Age Sale, and brought the hammer down for a \$185,000 price tag at the sale, among the highest prices at the sale. Another Louisiana bred, Hip 120 (Air Force Blue-Savviest) brought a respectable \$100,000 at the same sale.

Unaffected by the pandemic, the 2020 LTBA Board of Directors election was recently completed. I would like to welcome new members Keith Hernandez and David Tillson to our board. Much appreciation to Jim Montgomery and Michele Rodriguez for your many dedicated years of service. 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SABERCAT

A few rare horses come into their stud careers with all guns blazing, lighting up the sale ring and the track from their first crops onward. Others are more surprise packages, perhaps coming up with one big horse and not much else. Then there are the horses who quietly build a reputation winner by winner but have the genetics and performance to suggest that something bigger could happen at any time.

Sabercat is one of the third type. A very good juvenile with a strong pedigree behind him, he did not get off to the fastest of starts as a sire. Nonetheless, he is climbing up the ranks among sires who entered stud in 2015 and is showing enough to be ranked among the nation's top 40 third-crop sires by progeny earnings as well as third on the comparable Louisiana list as of the end of June.

As a runner, Sabercat made most of his racing reputation in Louisiana thanks to his season-ending win in the 2011 Delta Downs Jackpot Stakes (G3). After taking four tries to break his maiden, the colt came into the Jackpot off a six-length win in the listed Garden State Stakes over a mile and 70 yards at Monmouth, suggesting that the mile and one-sixteenth of the Jackpot would not be an issue. Nonetheless, Sabercat was an 8-1 shot in a field that had drawn Del Mar Futurity (G1) winner Drill, Prairie Gold Juvenile Stakes winner Jake Mo, multiple California stakes winner Longview Drive, Jean Lafitte Stakes winner My Adonis, multiple Canadian stakes winner Dougs Buddy, and Iroquois Stakes (G3) runner-up Seven Lively Sins.

The field was considered one of the deepest in the history of the race, but after a rough start, Sabercat made it look easy, roaring down the stretch to register a four-length win over Basmati. His \$600,000 winner's purse put him squarely in contention for a starting slot in the Kentucky Derby (G1) (which then based priority for starting berths on graded stakes earnings rather than on the points system now in use.)

Unfortunately, Sabercat never seemed to quite put it together again mentally and physically after his 2-year-old season, though he was third behind the bril-

liant Bodemeister and multiple graded stakes winner Secret Circle (later the winner of the 2013 Xpressbet Breeders' Cup Sprint and the 2015 Dubai Golden Shaheen, both Grade/Group 1 races) in the 2012 Arkansas Derby (G1). Sabercat earned three more stakes placings at 4, including a third in the Oaklawn Handicap (G2), and ended his racing career having won or placed in 11 of his 23 starts with earnings of \$898,662.

Sabercat is a son of the Storm Cat horse Bluegrass Cat, an admirably consistent sort whose nine wins and placings from 11 starts included a win in the 2006 Haskell Invitational Stakes (G1) and runner-up finishes in that year's Kentucky Derby (G1), Belmont Stakes (G1), and Travers Stakes (G1). Like his son, he was a good late-season juvenile, winning the 2005 Remsen Stakes (G2) and Nashua Stakes (G3). As a stallion, Bluegrass Cat has sired runners with cumulative earnings in excess of \$49 million.

One of the best-bred horses in the American Stud Book, Bluegrass Cat was produced from the A.P. Indy mare She's a Winner, who also has Grade 2 winner Lord of the Game and stakes winner Sonoma Cat to

her credit. A full sister to 2010 Vosburgh Stakes (G1) winner Girolamo and graded winners Daydreaming and Accelerator, She's a Winner belongs to a branch of the great La Troienne family descended from 1971 champion juvenile filly Numbered Account, a branch that includes champion Rhythm and Grade 1 winners Super Saver, Private Account, Dance Number, Got Lucky, Frost Giant, and Imagining.

Sabercat also traces to La Troienne in his dam line, in his case through the branch descended from La Troienne's Blue Larkspur daughter Belle Histoire. He was produced from the Forty Niner mare Miner's Blessing, also the dam of stakes winner Olivine (by

Royal Academy) and a half sister to Grade 1-placed stakes winner Conquistadoress (by Seeking the Gold). Miner's Blessing, in turn, is out of stakes-placed Bless You (by Halo), a half sister to 1991 Tempted Stakes winner Deputation (by Deputy Minister) out of multiple Grade 3 winner Wedding Party (by Hoist the Flag).

While Bluegrass Cat is inbred 3x4 to both Northern Dancer and Secretariat, Sabercat's dam is free of both these strains. This means that crossing back to Northern Dancer, Secretariat, or both may be a winning strategy for Sabercat, and this has already been demonstrated by his leading runner, multiple stakes-placed Saber Cut, whose dam is by the Northern Dancer horse Eskimo. Simultaneous line breeding to two or more of the top strains in Sabercat's pedigree also seems to be yielding good results, a pattern seen in the winners My Mallory's On, Saber Run, and Reaffirmed. While Northern Dancer and Mr. Prospector are the most obvious and common targets for such line breeding, mares whose pedigrees feature Halo, Tom Rolfe, or animals from the family of



Numbered Account may also produce well with Sabercat, who offers an attractive physical package as well.

"He's a very nice horse with a real good front end," says Roger Mitchell who owns the stallion with his brother Rodney. He's about 16.1 and he's a big stout horse. He's got some stallion attitude, but he's not a real aggressive horse like some of the Storm Cats; he's reasonable and willing to go along with you if you've got his respect. He throws a lot of size and substance to his babies, and they're quick to learn and want to race."

Although Sabercat was a good juvenile, he took some time to come to hand, and his foals are more likely to shine in the fall than the summer of their 2-year-old seasons. On pedigree, Sabercat should be capable of getting a two-turn runner, so a bit of patience in letting his foals grow into themselves may be well rewarded as they move into their 3-year-old seasons.

Sabercat stood the 2020 breeding season at Averett Farm in Loranger for \$2,500.

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

Louisiana Premier Night in February at Delta Downs, Louisiana Legends Night at the Evangeline Downs meet, Louisiana Cup Day at the Louisiana Downs meet and Louisiana Champions Day in December at Fair Grounds

are paid based on a stallion's progeny finishing first, second or third in an allowance, handicap or stakes race in Louisiana or in a stakes race outside of Louisiana.

Galloping along contently in last place the big dark bay or brown mare gave bettors the early impression that their wager had been thrown to the wind regardless of the odds that indicated she was a sure bet to win.

"We came all the way out here to the track for this?" questioned a friend to the owner of the seemingly lackadaisical race mare. "My money would have been better spent on a coke and a hotdog."

"Just wait and watch," said the owner with confidence.

How many times had the owner of the mare teased around with a less than enthusiastic patron with a potentially winning ticket wilting in their hand? Hold tight.

Rounding the clubhouse turn the big mare switched gears with the ease that 300 years of bloodlines

selectively bred for closing speed coursed through her veins. Lengthening her stride with each jump she expertly picked off the gallopers one-by-one as she steamrolled down the stretch to a victorious romp over rivals.

"That was Hope List," reminisced owner-breeder Dr. Delmar R. Caldwell, MD. "She would hunker down in last through most of the race, biding her time, then accelerate like a brown streak rounding the turn for home. She was the most exciting horse to watch, and it didn't matter if it were over dirt, grass, or mud or against the boys she would outrun them all."

Hope List's signature running style proved thrilling for Caldwell and co-owner Jo Ann Thompson whose well-kept secret stymied out-of-town friends who had never seen her run.

"We would take friends out to the racetrack and they would watch Hope List in the early going and ask why we had brought them out to watch the race if that was the best our horse could do," mused Thompson. "She was less than impressive in the early going, always running last and then out of no where she would just fly past the field and win by a huge margin. Yes, that was our Hope List. Those truly were the glory days! We collected a lot of silver trophies and win photos that remind us daily how good she has been to us."

For a man who claims that he must have something to do, Caldwell's cup runneth over. As the years have marched on, he decided to become a trainer in 2002

among his many accomplishments. Not only does he maintain a racing stable of 14 runners, but he is also a professor and chairman of the Department of Ophthalmology at Tulane University, a world traveler, author, entrepreneur, inventor, humanitarian, philanthropist, and athlete—a true uber renaissance man. At the age of 84, he continues to add compelling chapters to his incredible life. With all his notable lifetime accomplishments he holds the memory of Hope List's victories as some of the most exciting times he has experienced.

"To watch that big mare barreling down the stretch, passing them all, gave me some of the biggest thrills any breeder and owner of a racehorse can imagine," Caldwell said fondly. "Hope List just kept getting better and better as a racehorse, on the dirt and on the grass. Her championship honors were just icing on the cake. We truly had the time of our life."

Hope List recently celebrated her 30th birthday on April 18. The classy dark bay or brown daughter of List and two-time Louisiana Broodmare of the Year Knightly Spritely, compiled an enviable race record over six seasons with seven stakes victories out of 20 wins, 12 seconds, and 13 third place finishes in 81 starts for earnings of \$601,475. She raced almost exclusively in Louisiana, with a stop at Churchill Downs for the 1997 edition of the Mint Julep Handicap and at Oaklawn Park for the Bayakoa Handicap. Louisiana Downs and Fair Grounds were prime stomping ground for Hope List where she scored three victories in the Red Camelia Handicap at Fairgrounds in 1995, '96 and '97, and two wins in the 1995-96 editions of the Louisiana Champions Day Ladies Stakes. For

her winning efforts she was honored as the Louisiana Champion Older Female in 1995-96. Trained by Brad Cathey and ridden primarily by Calvin Borel, Hope List retired sound to Caldwell and Thompson's Double Dam Farm near Folsom, Louisiana.

"Hope List really didn't show her best form until she was a fouryear-old," said Caldwell. "She was a true late bloomer, durable and sound—seldom seen these days. Early in her career she ran in claiming races. We were very fortunate that she was never claimed or we wouldn't have had the fun or the story to tell."

Hope List, like her dam Knightly Spritely, does not sweat and enjoys several unique amenities that add comfort to her cushy life at Double Dam where she is not only a celebrity but part of the family.

"Not being able to sweat seems to be a family trait," Caldwell said. "Since she has been retired to the farm, she not only has her own airconditioned stall, but a shower as well. She walks right up, we turn on the shower and she turns this way and that, gets a good soak, and goes off to graze. She is also a nanny to the yearling that we have and has always been great at teaching the

young horses how to behave. Her age seems to be in the genes as well. Her dam Knightly Spritely lived to the great old age of 31 and is buried near the training track on the farm."

Hope List was an amazingly durable and consistent racehorse but a moderate producer unlike her dam who produced several stakes winners during her career as the premier broodmare at Double Dam.

"She (Hope List) produced twelve named foals for us but none inherited her racing ability," said Caldwell. "Her dam wasn't much of a racehorse, but an exceptional producer so I suppose it was a fair turnaround."

Fortune's favor intervened when Caldwell was able to acquire Knightly Sprightly when her owner decided he wanted to disperse his broodmares.

"She was given to me by a breeder who was getting out of the business," Caldwell said. "He had her loaded up in the trailer ready to move off the farm, and I asked him what he had in there. He told me, and I liked her pedigree. Off the trailer she came, and we added her to the broodmare band."

The storied lives of legendary Thoroughbreds create an enduring memory to the horsemen who have brought them into the world, cared for them and experienced their exploits over the racetrack. The lucky ones, like Hope List, have etched a permanent place in the heart of their owners who cherish them in retirement.

"It is hard to imagine a day in our lives without Hope List," said Thompson. "We have scaled down our operation to a smaller farm and have just a few horses now, but Hope List is one of them. This is her home and she is part of the family."

Legends Prevail

Trainer Victor Arceneaux said it's no secret that Mariah's Galaxy blossomed as a racehorse as a 5-year-old in 2019. The multiple stakes winner went over the \$400,000 career earnings mark and added her first win on the turf in the \$60,000 Louisiana Legends Turf Distaff.

"She's such a good, consistent and hard-working horse," said Arceneaux. "It was nice to see her win on the turf, too."

The small five-horse field saw a three-horse pace race between the favorite Is Too, Smok'n Rita and Yes Gorgeous with early fractions of 24.60 and 49.22. Jockey Kevin Smith and the 6-year-old daughter of Greeley's Galaxy stalked the leaders then aggressively moved to take the lead only to win by a head over Net a Bear in 1:37.15.

"She dug in to win it," said Smith. "We tried to stay within good distance behind the pacesetters then made a sweeping move to the outside to get the win. It felt really good." Mariah's Galaxy (\$9.20), who was coming off a five-month layoff, improved to 11-26, with a career bankroll of \$420,985.

The official order of finish was Mariah's Galaxy, Net a Bear, Is Too, Yes Gorgeous and Smok'n Rita.

Relentless Dancer was an \$85,000 purchase at the 2019 Ocala Breeders' Sale and it didn't take long for this son of 2002 Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner, Midshipman, to show how good of a runner he is. After breaking his maiden at Churchill Downs by nearly 10 lengths in his second start, Michael Maker's 3-year-old colt won his first Louisiana bred stakes race last October at Delta Downs easing to a 10.5-length victory in the \$100,000 Louisiana Legacy.

The colt returned to his home state for the first time since that victory to add another Louisiana title to his eight-race resume – Louisiana Legends Cheval.

"The beginning of the race didn't turn out like I thought it would, especially going around the first time," said rider Ty Kennedy, who picked up the mount after veteran jockey Gerard Melancon has been sidelined with COVID-19. "The 6 horse (Sydster) was supposed to show a lot of early speed and didn't, so I got my horse in a nice cruising speed. Once I got him to relax, I knew it was over from that point. (Mike) Maker's horses do very good"

Longshot Unwanted Intruder set the comfortable early fractions of

24.69 and 48.91, that's when Relentless Dancer (\$2.20) had seen enough. Kennedy sent him to the lead around the far turn then held off Sydster to win by 1 3/4 lengths and cover the mile in 1:38.21.

"Once he felt the 6 horse come up to him, he kicked up on his own," added Kennedy. "That's what good horses do."

Relentless Dancer improved to 3-8 with earnings of \$155,838.

The official order of finish was Relentless Dancer, Sydster, Jax Man, Freedomfi and Unwanted Intruder.

The biggest upset on the card belonged to 12-1 Snowball who put on a "gutsy effort" said her pilot Ty Kennedy to upset the field in the \$60,000 Louisiana Legends Mademoiselle.

The 5 1/2-furlong sprint affair saw a frantic finish with five horses across the track in the final furlong, but it was Kennedy's sweeping outside move that gave the 4-year-old filly her first win in nearly a year.

"Around the final turn, we started gaining momentum," said Kennedy. "I had the opportunity to switch her outside and when I did, she laid down and took off."

The post time favorite Play

Unified (9-5) missed the break and had to play catchup most of the race. Second favorite, Our Lost Love, led most of the action with swift fractions of 22.02 and 45.79.

The closers began to reel the front speed in and give bettors a nice return. Snowball (\$26.60), whose last win was last year's Louisiana Legends Soiree, finished 1/2-length in front of 23-1 Saints N Muskets in 1:05.15. A \$1 exacta returned \$231.40.

"I worked her a few days ago, first time on her and just loved the way she worked," said Kennedy. "I had a lot of confidence going into the race." Winning trainer Sam Breaux thought the race was going to be too short for the daughter of Apriority

"She's honest," said Breaux.

"She get's short in most of her races and we want to take her back and it worked out. She felt it again today."

Shang was dominating his competition as a 3-year-old beating Louisiana breds for the mere fun of it. Owners William and Corinne Heiligbrodt then ventured the colt out to face stiff competition in the Grade 3 Lexington Stakes at Keeneland before returning him back home last July to win the Louisiana Legends Cheval at Evangeline Downs.

Over his last five competitions, the son of Shanghai Bobby was a pacesetter and came up short in four of the five races. On the grass on Legends Night, he was able to relax then move out four-wide to show late speed to win the \$60,000 Louisiana Legends Turf for trainer Steve Asmussen and the Heiligbrodts.

"You know we took the lead mid-stretch and had enough left," said jockey Joel Dominguez. "He has been getting tired at the finish but had enough in this race."

In the Navy was a modest pacesetter at 24.44 and 48.63 in the onemile course. Dominguez and Shang (\$3.60) were in perfect shape, then went outside to close with good resolve to dig past the leaders in 1:36.63 and hold off the 19-1 late charging longshot, Treys Midnight Moon.

The \$90,000 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky Sale purchase improved to 7-14 and has now earned \$356,200.

The lead storyline of the Louisiana Legends Sprint – could Monte Man win it three years in a row?

The 7-5 favorite Laughingsaintssong left no doubt about the crowning of a new Legends Sprint title holder as the 6-year-old gelded son of Songandaprayer scored an impressive win in 1:04.22 over 5-1/2 furlongs.

A Flash of Copper showed flashy speed barreling along at 22.28 and 45.77 before tossing in the towel. Laughingsaintssong

(\$4.80) was never more than a length back in the eight-horse field. Rider Timothy Thornton piloted the 6-year-old three-wide around the far turn to edge clear in the sprint in a final time of 1:04.22.

Laughingsaintssong won two stakes in his 2019 campaign including the \$50,000 B-Connected Stakes at Delta Downs and the \$100,000 Louisiana Champions Day Sprint at the Fair Grounds.

"This horse has been training so well," said trainer Allen Landry. "He was short in his last few races in February and has been turning in bullet works in the morning."

Laughingsaintssong is now 10-26 including a 5-10 record in Opelousas with earnings of \$363.010.

Vacherie Girl hasn't made many mistakes in her six-race career – only once has she misfired.

The final stakes race of the evening saw drama at the wire as the 3-year-old daughter of Tapiture's late lead shrank to a head to win the \$60,000 Legends Soiree.

Massive 96-1 longshot Gator Proud led a snail's pace of 26.04 and 51.54, but business began to pick up after a half-mile. Joel Dominguez and Vacherie Girl made their move and dueled down the stretch with a gamey and previously undefeated Southern Liaison. The two battled to the finish line and it was Vacherie Girl prevailing the one-mile stakes in 1:41.39.

It was the second winner of the night for the team of Dominguez, Steve Asmussen and owners William and Corinne Heiligbrodt.

Vacherie Girl (\$4.20) earned her third stakes win and saw her record improve to 4-6 with a bankroll of \$179,307.

The final order of finish was Vacherie Girl, Southern Liaison, Quikfast N Ahurry, Saber Cut, Sebs Princess, Gator Proud and Jet Sweep.



BREEDING DECISIONS PAY OFF

The Jumonvilles have been in the business for more than half a century

J.E. and Bunny Jumonville are best known as Quarter Horse breeders. J.E., a former state senator, is a member of the Louisiana Quarter Horse Breeders Association of Hall of Fame, and their Jumonville Farms has been honored with the AQHA 50-year Legacy Breeders Award.

They have 40 mares on the farm in Ventress. Only six of them are Thoroughbred mares. But, oh, what a broodmare is Laughing Saint.

Laughing Saint is the dam of two of the top runners in the recent Louisiana Legends Night at Evangeline Downs. Her 6-year-old son Laughingsaintsong won the Louisiana Legends Sprint for owner Rodney Verret. The gelding by Songandaprayer is the 2019 Champion 4-year-old and Up Louisiana Bred Male.

Laughing Saint's 5-year-old daughter Saints N Muskets, also owned by Verret, ran a close second in the Louisiana Legends Mademoiselle Stakes at odds of 23 to 1. She's by Musket Man, who placed second in the 2009 Kentucky Derby.

Laughing Saint and her progeny are the result of sometimes circuitous breeding decisions going back decades, of horses bought for a great deal of money and horses bought for not so much, of a Triple Crown winner and a horse that never ran, of champion Quarter Horses and Keeneland sales Thoroughbreds. There's no quiz at the end of this story, but the reader might want to grab some paper and take notes.

Jumonville Farms covers more than 1,000 acres, with 200 acres devoted to the horses and growing hay.



2019 Champion Four-Year-Old and Upwards Accredited Louisiana Bred Male, Laughingsaintssong most recently won the Louisiana Legends Sprint at Evangeline Downs on the 4th of July.

The rest is leased out for sugarcane cultivation.

Fifty-five years ago, J.E. was newly married to Bunny and was running mainly cattle on the farm. He had experience with cutting horses, but as often happens, one horse deal led to more.

"I traded a Charolais bull for my first racehorse, and that was a Quarter Horse," Jumonville said. "He won five races in a row, so he got me interested in racing."

From trading a bull for a Quarter Horse in the late 1960s, Jumonville expanded his Quarter Horse racing and breeding operation to the top echelon. Jumonville Farms won the All American Derby with Justanold Love in 1982 and the All American Gold Cup with Dashingly in 1983 as Justanold Love ran second. Dashingly was named AQHA Racing World Champion in 1983. In 1985 it was Indigo Illusion taking the Rainbow Futurity. Feature Mr Jess won the Rainbow Futurity in 2000 and the Rainbow Derby in 2001.

The Jumonvilles then advanced to the high end of the Thoroughbred market, visiting the Keeneland July Select Sale in 1984.

"I bought Louisiana Slew out of

that sale," he recalls. "I didn't realize it when I did it, but I gave more for Louisiana Slew than any American had ever given for a Thoroughbred yearling. I gave \$2.9 million for him."

Louisiana Slew, then a yearling, was a son of Seattle Slew. That year, says Jumonville, four breeding shares in the Triple Crown winner were sold at auction at prices ranging from \$2.9 million to \$3.5 million. His intention was to breed for speed in Quarter Horses because of the sprinting blood on the dam side of Louisiana Slew.

Jumonville syndicated Louisiana

When Jumonville purchased Louisiana Slew at Keeneland in 1984, the sales price of \$2.9 million for the son of Seattle Slew was the highest price ever paid by an American for a thoroughbred yearling.

Slew in 40 shares and kept 10 for himself. These he used to breed Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse mares to his prize. Louisiana Slew was in training with D. Wayne Lukas and won a stakes race in California before being injured and eventually retired to stud. Louisiana Slew was the dam sire of the Quarter Horse champion Jess Louisiana Blue.

[Believe it or not, 36 years of pedigree machinations are about to connect up.]

In the mid 1980s tough economic times came to many people in Louisiana. Jumonville mostly got out of Thoroughbred racing and breeding, though he stayed with the Quarter Horses. Sometime in 2002, he and Bunny were in California for a Quarter Horse sale and through connections were invited to Bob Baffert's barn.

Jumonville asked about Baffert's Kentucky Derby prospects for 2003. "He got out this beautiful black horse," the breeder "His recalls. name was Vindication. Vindication went on and won the Breeders Cup Juvenile and was Champion 2-year-old. But he was injured."

Vindication was a son of Seattle Slew, just like Louisiana Slew. He never made it to the Derby and was euthanized in 2008 due to compli-

cations from colic. But the Jumonvilles remembered his name. And when a Florida-bred yearling filly by Vindication came through the Keeneland September sales ring that year, the Jumonvilles bought her for \$3,000.

She was named Laughing Saint. In addition to obtaining a future brilliant broodmare, J.E. says the purchase was also notable as the first time he signed Bunny's name to the sales ticket along with his own. Previous purchases were made in the name of the farm, or himself, or himself and various partners. Bunny isn't hands on at the farm, but she's a key part of the operation, he says.

"She has an instinct for quality

horses. We look at horses together," J.E. says. "She's had a lot of input into selections I've made over the years."

Bunny has been involved all along. "When I was expecting my first baby, we went to a match race in the heat of the summer in South Louisiana," she recalls. "I sat in the hot sun in a folding chair all day at the races. This was about three weeks before I delivered our first baby. I couldn't quite get out of bed the next day."

Today her name is prominent as co-breeder with J.E. "We study the animal together and we talk about it. I just think we're a good team," she says.

The Jumonvilles hit the Louisiana broodmare jackpot with Laughing Saint. She never raced; at age 3 she posted four consecutive bullet works at Delta Downs before proving to be a severe bleeder. They brought Laughing Saint home, and when she came into season they matched her up with Jess Louisiana Blue, then standing at Jumonville Farms.

The result? Jess a Saint, winner of the \$1,000,000 2015 Louisiana QHBA Futurity at Evangeline Downs, and earner of \$537,302 with 6 wins, 3 seconds and 2 thirds from 15 starts. The gelding raced for Miguel Rodriguez.

Laughing Saint is the only mare to produce both a Louisiana Thoroughbred Champion and a Louisiana Quarter Horse Champion.

In addition to this year's Louisiana Legends Sprint, Laughingsaintsong won the 2019 Champions Day Sprint Stakes at Fair Grounds, the 2019 Louisiana Cup Sprint Stakes at Louisiana Downs and the 2017 Space City Stakes at Sam Houston.

Laughing Saint is also the dam of Gallileos Ballerina, a 3-year-old filly by Magician who was unplaced in this year's Florida Oaks. A 2-year-old by Half Ours has not yet started. She has a yearling by California Chrome and has been bred to Preakness winner Cloud Computing.

These days, Jumonville Farms stands several Quarter Horse stallions and a Thoroughbred named Power Jam who broke track records for 5 ½ furlongs at Del Mar and Santa Anita in a short career with Baffert. Like Louisiana Slew all

those years ago, Power Jam is intended to bring more speed to Quarter Horse mares as well as Thoroughbreds.

Jess Louisiana Blue passed away late last year.

The Jumonvilles have just one Quarter Horse in training at the moment. The emphasis now is on sales, not racing.

Bunny says that after more than 50 years in the breeding business, their horses are like family. "We live for our horses, and it's wonderful."

PREPARE YOUNG HORSES FOR RACE TRAINING

Reeping horses sound through training can be a challenge, but there are ways to prepare them and help young horses become stronger and more physically fit—and less likely to break down. Bill Casner (Flower Mound, Texas) has been working with racehorses all his life, and keeping them sound has been his passion.

"We need to start early, when working with young horses. Fitness, whether we're looking at tendons, ligaments, muscle or bone, must go through a process. Trainers often walk a knife's edge in their goal to move the horse forward in fitness without taking things too far and creating serious damage."

There must be some stress and strain, however, for any body part to become stronger. "The process of strengthening involves creation of micro-damage. Fitness conditioning involves stressing bone, muscle, tendons, ligaments, heart and lungs. You are putting enough stress on various structures to create a small amount of damage, and as it heals it heals stronger. With bone, this process is called remodeling," he explains.

There are two types of bone cells—osteoclasts and osteoblasts. A study at Texas A&M a number of years ago showed that when you first put a horse into training, for the first 60 days the horse is actually losing bone. "There is heightened osteoclastic activity. Remodeling is the perfect word to describe what happens with bone,

because you have to tear something down before you can rebuild it," he says.

"Some of the bone is lost, and there is a lag time with the osteoblasts-the cells that build bone. It's about day 65 before the osteoblasts start to kick in at a higher level than the osteoclasts. So it's about 120 days before the horse gets back to the point he was before you put him in training. Then he must continue to build stronger bone, from that point forward. So you actually have 120 days in which the horse is extremely vulnerable to injury, and the trainer needs to be aware of this," says Casner.

STARTING EARLY

"This all begins the day we start breaking young horses—when we put a saddle on their back and subject them to stresses they are not used to. So I try to start this process much earlier with my horses. Most Thoroughbred racehorses are started into the breaking period at about 18 or 19 months old--generally September/October of their yearling year. I compare them to children. The best human athletes are kids that start playing sports when they are 4 or 5 years old. They start playing soccer or other kids' sports, running around. By the time they are 10 to 12 years old their bodies have already gone through a lot of adaptation and it's not a sudden stress," he explains.

"If kids are couch potatoes and playing video games until they are 10 or 11 and then start sports activities, their bodies are not adapted. When they try to do something athletic they are more apt to injure themselves—whether it's running or skiing," he says.

One study assessed a group of 8-year-old club swimmers, boys and girls who had been swimming for several years. "The researchers took their weights, measurements and checked their hearts, and compared them to the general population of children the same age that had not been swimming. They found that the swimmers had significantly stronger left ventricles-a conditioning response created at an early age. Kids that start running at an early age also develop stronger hearts," he says.

"Whether we're racehorse trainers or conditioning coaches for kids, once a level of fitness is obtained, we know it is much easier to get back to that level of fitness, and we don't have to start clear over again. Fitness is regained quickly, especially cardio-respiratory systems. The left ventricle stays strong," he explains.

If we start stressing horses in small increments, methodically increasing the stress, we can hope to have a stronger, fitter, more adapted athlete," says Casner. These horses are less likely to suffer injuries when they start racing.

"Generally we start in February of their yearling year and they may be only 11 or 12 months of age—or maybe just 8 months old if they

were late foals. We start with some light activity, maybe just some socialization and handling, desensitizing them to different things, walking them over tarps, PVC pipes, etc. We do a lot of handling, picking up their feet every day, cleaning their feet, getting them used to everything. At that age they are in survival mode and every thing they look at is a potential threat to them-so we help them with that transition from their mamas to us as their leaders. We go through a handling/training process to gain their trust," he says.

GRADUAL FITNESS TRAINING

"We start doing a little swimming in March/April of their yearling year. By June we have them on a regular swimming program, up to about 5 laps in my swimming lake. It's a gradual process. You have to address the mental aspect (dealing with new experiences and stresses) as well as the physical conditioning."

These young horses must become more coordinated and learn to use various muscle groups when they do something athletic. "Their cardiovascular and respiratory systems must become stronger as well," says Casner.

"I start putting young horses on vibration plates in February of their yearling year. By the time we put a saddle on them in August or September, they've had 6 to 8 months of bone adaptation. Their bones have been stressed as if they had been galloping, but it's easier on them. As a result, we don't get shin splints. In the years since we've been using vibration plates we haven't gotten shin problems. The science behind these tells us that the mild stress of vibration helps build periosteal bone, cortical bone and tribecular bone. We are seeing the advantage of bone adaptation," he explains.

"We are trying to make them stronger and avoid problems later when we start breaking them and put them into actual training. One thing people need to keep in mind, however, is that after these horses have been swimming for several months, on the vibration plates, and worked in the round pen, they are fitter than most long-yearlings. We start to work some of them 3 days a week, cross-training in the round pen—making them do a big jog in both directions. We start putting weight on their back at some point, using a small saddle. We might get them up to carrying a big stock saddle when we are working them in the round pen--building fitness and strengthening/building their backs--and you can really see the difference. When you get on an 18month-old immature horse that has gone through this gradual program, his back is stronger and adapted, and he has the ability to carry a rider without injuring himself," says Casner.

"The riders may not like it when they first get on that young horse because these colts are tougher to break. They are fit, strong horses and don't wear down. The trainer may have to keep them in the round pen several more days than some of the other youngsters because they don't ride down. But in the end, they are better for it. Our end product is a much stronger, fitter horse that is mentally stronger, physically stronger and easier to work with. They've had a lot of saddles on them by the time they hit the racetrack," he says.

"Our goal is to race 2-year-olds in July or August of their 2-yearold year. I want horses that can run a mile or better as late 2-year-olds. Horses bred to be sprinters tend to be more precocious from a cardiorespiratory standpoint. Their hearts are smaller and stronger and they get fit quicker. This doesn't mean their bones get strong any faster, however. Two-year-olds that are running 4½ furlongs by March through June are generally the more precocious horses that are sprinter types. We generally don't start running our young horses until a little later when the races start stretching out to at least 5½ furlongs—which is more like an adaptive long workout," he says.

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SANCTUARY HORSES

Today we buried one of our sanctuary mares. She was an older mare, a rescue from a bad situation where the owners just stopped feeding their horses. This old mare was a hard-knocking race mare with winnings over \$150,000 and a race record that stretched out over a full page, racing until she was almost ten years old - not something you see every day, especially since she was completely sound.

She was able to go out and earn a lot of good paychecks for her owners and breeders, but she wasn't quite good enough to have earned a place in their grand financial scheme to allow her to peacefully retire, foal out a few babies and relax under some shady trees. I'm sure that to a lot of people this mare, named Devil's Madwoman, was just an old horse that was no longer profitable, one who didn't make money any more and didn't deserve the space she occupied in their pasture.

Being involved in Louisiana Horse Rescue Association for over 15 years, this is unfortunately something I see on a regular basis, something that looks totally different through different mindsets, but I suppose if the horses could talk they would be able to share how it looks from their own perspective.

Maddie, as we called her, was not the most desirable-looking horse. She was a cribber and very difficult to keep weight on, which made her very hard to place in a new home. She was a kind, level-headed old mare and you could put kids on her and lead her around, so she did have some redeeming qualities.

It seems that some people only see a dollar value when they see a horse and these are the people that make our rescue efforts so hard to sustain. I once spoke about guidelines set forth for Equine care at a meeting of the Louisiana Livestock Sanitary Board (an appointed governing body which shapes policies regarding animal welfare, among other things) and much to my surprise our delegation came under fire for requesting that the guidelines for proper equine care should include availability of food, water and shelter - there was an opposition to horses requiring shelter.

An elderly board member that served on several other horse-related boards stood up, pointed his finger

at us and exclaimed "These people are a selective rescue; I have some horses that need to be rescued and they will not take them." Silence ensued, and after what seemed like several minutes he realized that he had just labeled himself a horse abuser and sat back down. I imagine what he actually had were a group of horses that were no longer financially profitable and were turned out in a dirt lot with no available shelter. Sadly enough, the soon-to-be newly adopted "Standards of Equine Care" did not include shelter.

The very best horsemen and women stand up for the quality of their horses' lives. A few of you write on the back of the papers of the horses you breed "This horse always has a home at (insert farm name here)." You are the top shelf breeders, as well as those of you who don't have enough space for all of the horses, but make contributions to a legitimate Louisiana rescue to help horses that fall into bad situations. We applaud you and appreciate you more than you know.

The flashy, young and spirited horses that are so easy to re-home do get a lot of press, but the horses that nobody wants are just as important to us. We do not discriminate one bit in that regard.

If someone is in dire financial straits we certainly do everything in our power to help them find homes for their horses. We re-home as many horses as we

can, I believe our number is 317 horses since 2005, but we also take care of several horses that nobody wants to admit exist, the ones we call sanctuary horses. Once in a while, someone finds us when looking for a companion horse for one of their other horses and low and behold one of these nice old mares or geldings finds a great new forever home.

No Parole Achieves First Grade 1 Win for Coteau Grove

Louisiana bred No Parole (Violence-Plus One) crossed the Belmont Park finish line 3 3/4 lengths clear June 20 to win the Woody Stephens Stakes Presented by Claiborne Farm (G1).

No Parole's victory in thes seven-furlong test marked the first top-level score for Keith and Ginger Myers of Coteau Grove Farms.

The Myers, began racing in 2008 before re-configuring their strategy in 2014 to prioritize breeding with the help of bloodstock agent Andrew Cary.

"It's hard to win a grade 1 and to see him rise through the ranks in the Louisiana-bred program and then win on a big day in New York was incredible," said Cary.

A registered Louisiana-bred, No Parole is a son of the Bluegrass Cat mare Plus One, a stakes winner who earned over \$160,000 from 15 starts. The mare was just the second purchased by Cary for the Myers in 2014.

Cary said the majority of all foals bred at Coteau Grove are destined for the commercial market, barring the occasional filly that could eventually join the broodmare band. Most are sold as yearlings across the country in a variety of sales held in Louisiana, Texas, New York, and Kentucky.

No Parole was consigned by Select Sales to the 2018 Keeneland

September Yearling Sale, where he was purchased by Maggi Moss for \$75,000. The colt now races for Moss and Greg Tramontin and is trained by Tom Amoss.

No Parole won his first three starts in Louisiana for Amoss including a score in the Feb. 8 LA Bred Premier Night Prince Stakes at Delta Downs.

Louisiana Bred Libertyrun Becomes Runhappy's First Winner

Louisiana-bred Libertyrun became the first winner for Runhappy, the champion sprinter of 2015, July 8 at Indiana Grand. Owned and bred by Jim "Mattress Mack" McIngvale Libertyrun drew away for a 6 1/4-length victory in his debut in a \$31,000 maiden special weight.

Breaking from the far outside in a field of 12, the juvenile colt pressed the early pace under Miguel Mena, took the lead leaving the turn, and extended his advantage to the wire. He completed 5 1/2 furlongs in 1:05.63 on a fast track.

"He's not a very big horse, but he is very professional," Mena said. "He came out of the gate great. When we got to the stretch, he had his ears pricked, and I hit him once and he took off running. I hit him one more time and he continued on again. I think he is a very nice horse."

Multiple G1 winner Runhappy stood at Claiborne Farm in Paris, Ky., this year for a fee of \$25,000. Like Libertyrun, he was a first-out

winner. A son of Super Saver, Runhappy went on to capture the NYRA.com King's Bishop Stakes (G1), the Stoll Keenon Ogden Phoenix Stakes (G3), the TwinSpires Breeders' Cup Sprint (G1), and the Malibu Stakes (G1) in his 3-year-old campaign.

McIngvale's sister-in-law Laura Wohlers who trains Libertyrun, said of the colt, "He ran big, and (that) was a bad post to draw into. I didn't expect him to win, so a great day."

Libertyrun will likely be pointed to a stakes race for Louisiana-bred 2-year-olds though the \$100,000 RUNHAPPY Juvenile Stakes Aug. 9 at Ellis Park is a possibility.

Out of the unraced Came Home mare Slews Return, Libertyrun is the seventh winner for his dam.

The Jockey Club Adopts Rule Regarding Thoroughbred Stallion Breedings

The Jockey Club has adopted a final rule limiting the annual breeding of individual stallions. The rule reflects The Jockey Club's goal to preserve the health of the Thoroughbred breed for the long term and will apply prospectively to stallions born in 2020 or later.

Effective May 7, 2020, The Jockey Club's Principal Rules and Requirements of the American Studbook are amended by adding the following italicized language to the text of Rule 14C, limiting book size to 140 mares as follows:

The total number of broodmares bred per individual stallion whose

The Jockey Club will issue stallion certificates for all mares bred by such stallions within the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico during a calendar year.

For stallions born in 2020 and later, the maximum number of mares covered within the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico in a calendar year will be 140. The aforementioned limit will apply to all mares bred during a calendar year regardless of when The Jockey Club receives a Report of Mares bred (or any amendments or supplements thereto).

The Jockey Club will modify its Report of Mares Bred form and other related forms in recognition of the amendment to Rule 14. Stallion Service Certificates will be issued on the basis of first cover date in the order of mares listed on the Report of Mares Bred.

Louisiana Downs Announces Restrictions For Jockeys Due To Covid-19

Harrah's Louisiana Downs announced an updated policy, effective Wednesday, July 15, regarding riders leaving and entering the racetrack.

The following restrictions have been implemented. If a rider accepts a mount at another racetrack, he or she must quarantine for a 14-day period and submit a negative COVID-19 test prior to returning to Harrah's Louisiana Downs. Jockeys who have ridden at other racetracks must self-quarantine for 14-days and present a negative COVID-19 test before gaining access to Harrah's Louisiana Downs. This policy will be in effect until further notice.

"After careful consideration, we felt it was necessary to implement these restrictions at Harrah's Louisiana Downs," said David Heitzmann, Director of Racing. "The health and safety of everyone involved must be protected; we join other racetracks in North America by enacting these measures."

Harrah's Louisiana Downs has continued to follow the policy set by Governor John Bel Edwards and protocols regarding COVID-19 on the OpenSafely.la.gov website. Prior to the opening of the meet, the jocks room was expanded to ensure social distancing. Additionally, patrons are required to enter via a specially marked designated entrance and temperature checks are conducted. Face masks are required and no more than three people are permitted in the saddling paddock.

The 64-day Harrah's Louisiana Downs Thoroughbred meet began on Saturday June 6. Live racing continues Saturday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday through September 23.

Cox Enjoys Banner Fair Grounds Meet

Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots returned to the traditional Thanksgiving Day opening for the start of the 148th racing season, but the meet concluded six racing days prior to the scheduled March 29 closing date due to a "stay-home" order issued by New Orleans Mayor LaToya Cantrell, following public health concerns in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic. Some eight days earlier on Friday, March 13, Fair Grounds was ordered to conduct live racing with no patrons, only essential employees, licensed horsemen (including owners) and credentialed media were allowed on track.

On what would be the final racing day of the meet, in front of an empty grandstand with only essential employees and horsemen with a horse in the race allowed to be present, Wells Bayou captured the 107th running of the Twin Spires.com Louisiana Derby (G2) in front-running style, earning 100 points on the Road to the Kentucky Derby. Extended to the 1 3/16thsmile distance for the first time, the Louisiana Derby drew an overflow field, and 14 horses started.

Trainer Brad Cox won the final three stakes, and four races in total, on the Louisiana Derby Day card, taking the Mervin Muniz Memorial Classic (G2) with Gaining Ground Racing's Factor This and the Twinspires.com Fair Grounds Oaks with Juddmonte Farms' homebred

Bonny South (G2).

Cox, who led all trainers with 12 stakes wins at the meet, took home his third consecutive trainer's title winning with 40 of his 147 starters. Locally-based Ron Faucheaux, who won his 500th career race during the meet, finished second with 34 wins. Tom Amoss (29), Steve Asmussen (26) and Bret Calhoun (22) rounded out the top five.

James Graham (63 wins) held off Mitchell Murrill (60) and Colby Hernandez (60) to take down his second Fair Grounds' jockey title, with the first coming during the 2014-15 meet.

Florent Geroux, who finished fourth in the standings with 56 wins, led all jockeys in purses earned with \$2,939,706 and stakes victories with ten. Shaun Bridgmohan was second with nine stakes scores.

In what was a tight owner's race, Winalot Racing, LLC edged Maggie Moss 13-12, with Godolphin, LLC (11), Earl J. Hernandez, Keith J. Hernandez and John Duvielh (11) and Calumet Farm (10).

Fourteen horses won three races at the meet. In addition to Finite, Factor This (both graded), Bobby's Wicked One, Play On, Hieronymus, and Louisiana-breds Net a Bear, Vacherie Girl, Ninety One Assault each won two stakes.

For the 2019-20 racing season, Fair Grounds eliminated handicap conditions for stakes races. These races are now weighted under allowance conditions.

Kentucky Derby, Oaks Will Have Spectators

Churchill Downs Racetrack announced June 25 that after consultation with Kentucky Gov. Andy

Beshear and state public health officials, the 146th running of the Kentucky Derby Presented by Woodford Reserve (G1) and Longines Kentucky Oaks (G1) will occur with spectators under strict guidelines.

Kentucky Derby Week will be held Sept. 1-5 with the Oaks set for Sept. 4 and the Derby Sept. 5.

The number of fans is yet to be announced.

Churchill Downs' plan was developed in conjunction with advice and counsel set forth by the Louisville Metro Health Department and Kentucky's Healthy at Work guidance.

Tickets purchased for the originally scheduled Kentucky Derby Week dates are automatically valid for the new race dates. Guests may arrive on the new dates in September with their printed ticket or mobile ticket to be scanned for entry at the gates. Guests that have purchased a ticket and are not able to attend the newly scheduled race dates, can visit www.-KentuckyDerby.com/TicketStatus for more information. Guests who purchased tickets from a vendor or secondary market website other than Churchill Downs, Ticket-master.com or Derby Experiences must contact those sites directly.

Minimum Purses Lowered for Non-Listed Stakes for 2020

The North American International Cataloguing Standards Committee voted May 21 to lower the minimum purse requirement for existing non-listed black-type races

by 20% for the remainder of 2020.

Because of the impact of COVID-19 on live race meets and casino operations that support purse funds, the NAICSC lowered the minimum purse for non-listed black-type races that ran prior to 2019 from \$50,000 to \$40,000 for the remainder of 2020, and the minimum purse value for non-listed black-type races that ran for the first time in 2019 will be reduced from \$75,000 to \$60,000 for their second running in 2020.

Requests to receive black type for any new races will continue to be reviewed by a subcommittee of NAICSC and require a minimum purse of \$75,000. These changes provide racetracks with some flexibility in continuing to offer their black-type stakes without either putting a race's black-type status at risk or forcing them to not offer a race at all.

This change follows a May 13 decision by the American Graded Stakes Committee to lower the minimum purses required for grade 1 and grade 2 stakes for the remainder of 2020.

The minimum purse for grade 1 stakes was lowered to \$250,000 from \$300,000, and the minimum for grade 2 stakes is now \$150,000, down from \$200,000. The minimum purse for grade 3s remains at \$100,000, and the minimum purse for listed stakes and grade-eligible stakes remains at \$75,000.

Welfare & Safety of the Racehorse Summit Concludes with Equine Injury Database Update

The ninth Welfare and Safety of the Racehorse Summit, held this year as a series of weekly webinars due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, concluded with a presentation on findings from the Equine Injury Database. The webinars were hosted by Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation.

The virtual Welfare and Safety of the Racehorse Summit kicked off May 12 with a presentation by Dr. Katherine Garrett of Rood & Riddle Equine Hospital, who discussed the uses and advantages of different imaging modalities. She also highlighted common injuries to the fetlock.

On May 19, Dr. Dionne Benson, chief veterinary officer of The Stronach Group, moderated a panel consisting of Dr. Ryan Carpenter, a private veterinarian in California; Dr. William Farmer, the equine medical director for Churchill Downs Incorporated; and Dr. Scott Palmer, the equine medical director for the New York State Gaming Commission. The group emphasized the importance of transparency in medical records throughout a horse's racing career.

The May 26 webinar featured Dr. Mick Peterson, executive director of the Racing Surfaces Testing Laboratory and professor of Biosystems and Agricultural Engineering at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Peterson focused on the Maintenance Quality System, which monitors track conditions.

The fourth webinar was moderated by Dr. Jennifer Durenberger, The Jockey Club steward for NYRA, on June 2. This session featured a presentation by Dr. Sue Stover, professor of Surgical and Radiological Sciences at UC Davis School of Veterinary Medicine. She delved into findings from the California Horse Racing Board's

postmortem program. Stover noted that catastrophic injuries are the result of pre-existing conditions and tend to occur in predictable locations.

The final presentation was delivered by Dr. Tim Parkin, professor of Veterinary Epidemiology at the University of Glasgow, and the webinar was moderated by Dr. Mary Scollay, executive director and chief operating officer of the Racing Medication & Testing Consortium. Parkin described risk factors for fatal injury Thoroughbred racehorses based on data from the Equine Injury Database. Risk factors included history of previous industry, time spent on the vet's list, increased age at first start, changing trainers and time spent with a trainer, track surface and condition, race distance, and racing in claiming races.

Retired Racehorse Project Postpones 2020 Thoroughbred Makeover

After extensive information gathering, research and consideration, the board of the Retired Racehorse Project (RRP) has made the unanimous decision to postpone the 2020 Thoroughbred Makeover and National Symposium, presented by Thoroughbred Charities of America (TCA), until 2021. The RRP plans to host an expanded Thoroughbred Makeover October 12-17, 2021 that will offer separate classes in all ten disciplines for both 2020 and 2021 entries.

Put on each year by the RRP, a

501c3 nonprofit organization, the Thoroughbred Makeover typically draws hundreds of competitors from 40+ states and multiple Canadian provinces, each of whom has taken on the challenge of bringing along a Thoroughbred in his or her first year of retraining post-racing. In a normal year, the event also includes the ASPCA Makeover

Marketplace (a large-scale horse shopping experience), a vendor fair with more than 70 on-site retailers and other equine businesses, seminars, the Thoroughbred Aftercare Summit and various social and networking events.

To comply with COVID-19 pandemic event guidelines as recommended by US Equestrian and the Kentucky Horse Park, many of these aspects, which monetize a significant portion of the event, would have to be eliminated or heavily modified.

Several aspects of the 2020 TCA Thoroughbred Makeover will be run virtually this year in October, including a virtual vendor fair, webinars in place of seminars, and

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the ASPCA Makeover Marketplace. The Marketplace will transition into an expanded online showcase of transitioned Thoroughbreds who were intended to compete in October and be offered for sale or adoption at the Makeover.

Trainers who entered this year's Thoroughbred Makeover will have the opportunity to retain their registered 2020 horses to compete in a special 2020 division at the 2021 Thoroughbred Makeover. They also have the option to withdraw their 2020 horses and roll their entry fee to the 2021 competition with a new 2021-eligible horse. In some cases, some 2020-entered horses will be able to retain their eligibility for the 2021 division as long as they do not exceed the maximum of 15 retraining rides before December 1, 2020.


TCA's Horses First Fund Supports Backstretch and Aftercare Orgs

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
