

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

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A CHANGE FOR Could Benefit

Louisiana enjoys a large, buoyant Thoroughbred business that could gain more revenue with new, player-friendly federal regulations on how bettors are taxed on their pari-mutuel winnings, but some of the state's industry stakeholders say it may take a while to see touted handle growth and purse increases.

Last fall, the Internal Revenue Service and U.S. Treasury amended income tax rules on how withholding and reporting are calculated, a big advantage for racing's best customers. Long-sought by Thoroughbred industry leaders, those modernized rules now make wagering more financially attractive by putting more money in the pockets of horseplayers, who re-bet their winnings, and thus drive increased handle. The trickle down from more wagering is expected to boost purses for owners, breeders, trainers, jockeys, benefit supporting businesses, grow the breeding sector with an increase in demand for bloodstock, and generate more revenue for state government, proponents of the new rules said.

Tom Early, a director of the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association, said anything that helps the handle helps purse money as well as the state's breeders, but he doesn't expect see an impact on purses in the short term.

"I don't think you'll see an immediate affect, maybe over time. To see significant changes to purses, pari-mutuel handle would have to increase by 8% to 10%," Early said.

The National Thoroughbred Racing Association estimated annual pari-mutuel handle could grow by as much as 10% with the new rules and ultimately expects an overall handle increase of \$1 billion annually.

The new rules were hailed by the NTRA, which has lobbied for the changes for several years, as "the most meaningful regulatory advances to our industry in decades."

A cursory look at U.S. handle for the first half of 2018, which includes Justify's successful Triple Crown bid, shows growth in handle. Through June 30, worldwide commingled wagering on U.S. races was up 5.6% compared with the corresponding period in 2017, according to figures compiled by Equibase Co.

In Louisiana, total Thoroughbred handle from all sources, grew 2.4% for the first half of 2018 when compared with the first six months last year, according to figures provided by the state racing commission.

Early pointed out that increases in Louisiana's handle figures were helped by Louisiana Downs' shift to a schedule that includes racing on Mondays and Tuesdays, when other U.S. tracks are closed. He also credited the format, which starts in early May, as leading to \$1,000 to \$1,500 purse increases this season through the meet's end, September 26.

Funds for Louisiana-bred purses are supplemented in part by one half of the "breakage", the pennies remaining when pari-mutuel payouts are rounded down to a nickel or dime. The higher the handle, the more breakage for purse supplements, which have helped the state's breeders improve their stock and breed better racehorses.

"[At] two of our [four] racetracks, six or seven winners out of every card are Louisiana-breds for however many races they run; the other track its like five winners out of every card are Louisiana-bred, and another track its four, roughly," said LTBA executive director Roger Heitzmann, who noted how important Louisiana-breds are to the state's Thoroughbred business

while touching on the effects of a still-fragile economy.

"We went through a down time and are struggling to get out of that down time right now," he said, referring to the long-lasting effects of 2008 global financial crisis and the huge drop in oil prices that have affected the business. In 2017 Louisiana ranked last in the U.S. by gross domestic product and several said. "The pendulum moves slowly, but the good thing is, the pendulum is moving. That's all you can hope for."

Ed Fenasci, executive director of the Louisiana Horsemen's Benevolent Association, said horse racing via the new pari-mutuel wagering model is better positioned to compete with other forms of gaming now that the onerous IRS the wagering is driving the purses on that percentage of activity. It will not have as big of an impact in overall purses numbers because when you add total purses, it includes others of purse supplements, such as slot machines and video poker, and they've made up an increasing percentage of the overall purses awarded."

The next frontier that could be a

other indicators and was one of three states where the economy actually shrank, according to the federal Bureau of Economic Analysis. Louisiana's Thoroughbred business is a bright spot, however, paying out purse supplements and breeders awards to the tune of more than \$23 million in 2016 while generating millions in revenue to the state.

The promise of higher purses from expected higher handle via new rules advantageous to horseplayers is something to look forward to, no matter how gradual.

"Just like you don't see a drop down overnight, you don't see a jump up overnight," Heitzmann reporting requirements for racetracks and bettors are gone.

"Horseplayers have a hard enough time winning over the course of time," he said. "To have them have less of a burden to keep track records ... I think it's a much more fair system for the horseplayer to take into account his total bet on that pool rather than that socalled base amount of the wager."

Fenasci said he anticipates an eventual rise in purses but cautioned that pari-mutuel wagering does not represent as large a percentage of purse generation it did previously.

"The money generated might not be a dollar for dollar increase, but boon for the state's Thoroughbred business is sports betting, Early said. Although enabling legislation died in committee during the past legislative session, he expects a resurrection in the 2019 session.

"I heard (Governor John Bel Edwards) on the radio the other day saying it will be offered in the next (legislative) session because we can't lag behind Mississippi, which has got their legislation passed to start sports betting.

"It's going to come," Early said, adding that the state's Thoroughbred interests will have to fight for their share. "If we get a good percentage from sports betting, we'll be in good shape."



BIND

tetting off to a Jfast start is crucial in today's stallion market, and no young Louisiana stallion is doing a better job of that than Bind, who stands at Jav Adcock's Red River Farms. The leading Louisiana freshman sire of 2017 (when he was also sixth on the state's juvenile sire list), the stallion is the current leader of the second-crop sire list and got his



Handicap (G3)winner War Thief (by Lord At War). dam of 2008 Transylvania Stakes (G3T) winner Boss Lafitte (by Dynaformer); to 1998 California Derby (G3) winner Prime Meridian (by The Prime Minister); to 2001 Cardinal Handicap (G3) winner Watch (by Lord At War); to grade 2-placed stakes winner Remind (by Deputy Minister); and to

first stakes winner this spring in La Mistake, who captured the Azalea Stakes on March 9 at Delta Downs.

PEDIGREE PATTERNS

Those familiar with bloodlines will immediately note the similarity of Bind's pedigree to that of threetime leading American sire Tapit, also sired by Pulpit out of an Unbridled mare. Arguably the most important sire son of 1992 Horse of the Year A.P. Indy, Pulpit won the 1997 Fountain of Youth Stakes (G2) and Toyota Blue Grass Stakes (G2) for Claiborne Farm before suffering a career-ending injury in the Kentucky Derby (G1). Retired to his birthplace, he enjoyed a successful stud career and, in addition to Tapit, is the sire of the good stallion Sky Mesa and is the paternal grandsire of two-time Horse of the Year California Chrome, whose first foals arrived this spring.

Bind's dam Check never raced, but aside from Bind has produced four other winners including grade 3placed Hakama, a gelding by First Samurai. Produced from the Timeless Moment mare Watch the Time (a juvenile winner), she is a half sister to 1997 Modesty grade 3-placed stakes winner Stop Watch (by Lord At War).

Most of these horses were successful around two turns, and on pedigree, this would have seemed the logical expectation for Bind. Horses have a way of defying expectations, however, and Bind proved to be most effective over six furlongs-perhaps due to misfortune as much as individual proclivity. His maiden victory as a 3-year-old was truly exceptional; running six furlongs at the Fair Grounds in 1:08.80 while ridden out, he earned a 105 Beyer Speed Figure, virtually unheard-of for a first-out winner. Unfortunately, he suffered an ankle injury in his second start and never recovered the brilliance he had shown on his debut, though he won six-furlong allowance races at the Fair Grounds at 4 and 5. He was also third behind multiple graded stakes winner Flashpoint in the Sam Houston Sprint Cup Stakes at Sam Houston Race Park in Texas and retired to stud having been out of the money only once in eight races.

Part of Bind's speed may well have come to him by

way of Pulpit's dam Preach, a Mr. Prospector who mare won the Frizette Stakes (G1) as a 2-year-old. Produced from 1983 Falls City Handicap (G3) winner Narrate (by Honest Pleasure). Preach is a full sister to Yarn, who produced 2000 English and Irish champion juvenile male Minardi (by Boundary), grade 2 winner and successful sire Tale of the Cat (by Storm Cat), stakes winner

big, powerfully А made horse standing 16.2 hands, Bind is "just a grand looking horse," according to Adcock. "He has a big round hip, a good full forearm, and plenty of substance and bone. He looks a lot like Pulpit, but bigger and That's stronger. the Unbridled coming through, but he has better

Spunoutacontrol (by Wild Again), and Myth (by Ogygian), the dam of 2001 European and American champion juvenile Johannesburg (by Hennessy, by Storm Cat).

Preach and Yarn form an interesting pedigree hook, for they appear 4x4 in the pedigree of Triple Crown winner Justify (by Johannesburg's son Scat Daddy out of a maternal granddaughter of Pulpit). They also appear 3x4 in the pedigree of La Mistake, who was produced from the Lion Heart mare Guculka Ksenya. Lion Heart is a son of Tale of the Cat, and while La Mistake is no Justify, she certainly shows there was no mistake in trying a pedigree combination that echoes that of the unbeaten sensation. Bred and owned by the Cantrell Family Partnership, the speedy filly has won four of her six outings and earned \$119,250. Her success certainly suggests that putting mares with Tale of the Cat or Johannesburg close up to Bind may be a winning strategy.

Like the similarly bred Tapit, Bind has also been doing well with mares returning Mr. Prospector, especially in multiple strains. However, he does not appear to be picky about broodmare sire lines, having gotten winners from mares from the Storm Cat, Danzig, Mr. legs than Unbridled did. The nice thing is that while Pulpit could be a bit hot, Bind is good-natured, which is a big plus when you're handling a horse as big and strong as he is. He's easy to handle around the breeding shed and very fertile."

Adcock is also liking what he is seeing from Bind's foals. "He's stamping them," he says. "They're good-sized foals, and they get that big round hip and full forearm he has. They have all the substance and bone you could want, and they seem to be getting that good mind he has, too—they're smart and learn well."

Given that Bind's limitation to sprint distances may have been due to injury more than his innate limitations, he may just represent the best of both worlds to Louisiana breeders — a horse that throws enough natural speed and precocity to get horses that can earn their way in the short races so common on the Louisiana circuit, yet has the potential of begetting runners that can train on to tackle longer trips as well. That's a winning combination for anyone whose primary goal is to breed a good horse.

Named Nite Jean, the sale-topper went to prominent Southwest owner Carl Moore from the consignment of Pike Racing, agent. The May foal worked an eighthmile on Sunday in :10 1/5, just one tick off the fastest time of :10 flat set by a trio of horses. Nite Jean is out of the winning Macho Uno mare St. Jean, who has produced a winner from her only starter and whose second dam is Grade 2 winner and graded stakes producer French Park.

The second-highest price was \$65,000 for an accredited Louisiana-bred from the first crop of Sum of the Parts. The filly out of stakes winner La Salle Glory worked :10 flat and went to J. Stevens Bloodstock, agent, from the consignment of Ricky Courville, agent.

J. Stevens Bloodstock also picked up the highest-priced colt and third-highest price overall. The accredited Louisiana-bred by top Louisiana sire Half Ours sold for \$55,000 after working :10 2/5. All told, 42 of 61 horses sold for a total of \$733,400. The average 2year-old price was \$18,168 with a median of \$12,000. Last year's sale posted an average 2-year-old price of \$20,308 with an identical median. That auction was fueled by two six-figure sales, including an all-



time sale record \$110,000 for a Flat Out filly named Special Blessing. That filly just won the \$75,000

Siblings Dex and Kristen Comardelle invest in developing Blue Star Racing, a full service thoroughbred facility where hospitality comes second only to premium horse care.

Success generally follows when preparation, timing and opportunity meet. The three ingredients for the recipe were well blended for Dex Comardelle, his sister Kristen and Blue Star Racing when they received the news that millionaire

Real Solution would be the first stallion on their roster for the 2018 breeding season. The multiple grade 1winning son of Kitten's Joy out of Reachfortheheavens by Pulpit, formerly stood at the iconic Calumet Farm in Lexington, Kentucky.

"Real Solution is a grand looking individual and we are thrilled with the opportunity to stand him at stud here in Louisiana," Comardelle

said. "He is the type of stallion to set the foundation for what we want to build here at Blue Star. Real Solution offers Louisiana breeders a fantastic opportunity to have access to one of Kitten's Joy's most accomplished racing sons. We are honored to work with Calumet Farm and very appreciative that we were able to lease Real Solution."

Comardelle is confident that Real Solution, who stood the 2018 breeding season at Blue Star



Racing for \$5,000 live foal, will attract a competitive book of mares with the lucrative Louisiana-bred program. The nine-year old regal bay stallion retired sound with earnings of \$1,374,175 at the age of five. He scored two Grade 1 victories in the Arlington Million (G1) at Arlington Park and the Knob Creek Manhattan Stakes (G1) at Belmont Park. Real Solution is the first stallion to grace the paddocks of Blue Star Racing located in the

humble community of Scott just outside of Lafayette. Plans will eventually include more stallions to be housed in the newly built 10,000 square foot 24-stall barn located on 100 prime acres of Louisiana farmland but for now Real Solution is the four-legged king of all he surveys.

"With the addition of Big Blue Kitten (by Kitten's Joy) to their stallion roster

Jak Knelman, director of stallions for Calumet, felt as though Real Solution would have increased opportunities at stud here in Louisiana," said Comardelle. "The opportunity to participate in the

Louisiana-bred program will give Real Solution a distinct advantage during breeding season. He is the first stallion for us, and we are thrilled and honored to have a horse of his caliber. I believe with his race record and pedigree that he'll be able to get top class runners over turf and dirt and a wide variety of distances"

Freshman sire Real Solution notched his first winner on July 7 when the colt Lagartijo scored by 3 ½ lengths in a 5 1/2-furlong maiden claiming race at Hipodromo de las Americas in Mexico City in a final time of 1:07.20 for owner Cuadra San Jorge. Lagartijo is the fourth winner out of Keeping Watch, by Danehill, who most recently sold at the 2017 Keeneland November Breeding Stock Sale for \$10,000 in foal to Kitten's Joy.

"I was very pleased to hear about Lagartijo," said Comardelle with more than a tinge of excitement in his voice. "Real Solution also had two very nice colts that sold at the Ocala Breeders' Sales in March for over a million dollars. Both were very well bred and quick, and it will be exciting to see how they perform this coming year."

Hip 479, a chestnut colt by Real Solution out of the Mineshaft mare Money Huntress, sold to Mark Casse, agent, for \$675,000 after cruising the quarter-mile in :20 3/5 on March 14. A bay colt out of the Grand Slam mare Easy Slam, hip 285, sizzled over the quarter-mile distance in :21 3/5 and sold for a final hammer of \$325,000 to Klaravich Racing on the previous day.

"It is a great way to kick off his [Real Solution's] freshman year as a stallion," said Comardelle. "The plan is to get a well-bred group of mares on his book in 2019. We'd like to see our fields full of little Real Solutions next year."

T w e n t y - e i g h t - y e a r - o l d Comardelle grew up most appropriately in the rural community of Raceland. He was raised in a horse oriented family who participated in barrel racing, rodeos, horse shows and trail riding. The first racehorse that truly inspired Comardelle was none other than the illustrious Smarty Jones whose Triple Crown campaign ignited a spark in the teenager.

"I was absolutely fascinated by Smarty Jones," said Comardelle. "It had been twenty-six years since a horse had won the Triple Crown and I really thought he could do it. Smarty Jones became the inspiration for Blue Star. It was 2004, and I became a racing fan with the dream of becoming a farm owner. It's easy to want everything right then and there, but I had to wait for a while before the farm became a reality."

The dream of raising Thoroughbreds was shelved for several years as Comardelle attended college to complete a Bachelor's degree in hospitality and a Master's Degree in business administration from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge. Following graduation Comardelle and his father Ricky started the unique business Go-Motel which supplied mobile luxury hotel-like accommodations to oil field workers in South Dakota the Gulf of Mexico. and Comardelle found himself wearing a suit and tie, and feeling a little off kilter even though he loved the business.

"It just wasn't me; a suit and tie," Comardelle reflects, chuckling. "I loved the business and it was a daily challenge, but of course I was the one who ended up staying in South Dakota during the winter. I am a Louisiana boy and don't really care for cold weather. It was miserable, so I decided that it was time to go home and work on getting that farm idea up and running."

During the time I was away, Kristen ended up getting a Thoroughbred mare as a barrel racing prospect, and completed a degree in equine management. From that point on, our small farm became more of a ranch. Horses had always been a family affair. The farm had always been a place where family and friends came to ride, socialize and enjoy their horses. It was a natural for me so I took the plunge and never looked back."

Comardelle blended his background in hospitality and business administration with a passion for the Thoroughbred business. He traveled to Kentucky and attended the sales, he became a student of pedigrees, and visited farms throughout the country to get ideas on farm layout, management and design. He immersed himself in learning the commercial sales end of the business and credits horseman Don Stemmans, the owner of Stemman's Horse Supply in Carencro, among his mentors.

"Don was a big help and guided me along the wav." said Comardelle. "He has been around a long time and is a well-respected horseman who knows the business. He suggested we start off small, and we began with just one mare. I have received so much help from so many horsemen. They have been eager to educate. That is just how everyone is around here-always ready to lend a hand and give some good advice. Slowly we are building up the broodmare band, and plan on buying more mares at the Kentucky breeding stock sales this year. We are building a great group of clients who will keep their mares here all year long and patronize Louisiana stallions.

After trading in the suit and tie for a muck bucket and a broom, Dex and Kristin have discovered that building a commercial boarding and breeding business from the ground up is an everchanging experience. Plans for the paddocks and barns were revamped several times, but the focus remained the same a boarding and breeding business where hospitality and good horsemanship are paramount—a real southern home place for clients, family and friends to congregate.

"We have a stocked pond where clients can go fishing when they visit their horses," said Comardelle, "and we're working on the plans for an entertainment building. Our goal is to personalize the Blue Star experience for every owner that visits, and be a full-service center to the community. We are hoping to attract breeders and boarders from Oklahoma, Florida, Arkansas and Texas, and retain our clientele all year long for more than just breeding services, but lay-ups, breaking and training. We'd like to make the Blue Star experience allinclusive for everyone involved."

Along with hospitality and top quality horsemanship, an additional goal is Comardelle's dream to increase the visibility of Louisiana in the Thoroughbred sales and breeding industry nationwide.

"We really want to focus on expanding Louisiana's potential as a commercial Thoroughbred breeding, boarding and training destination," Comardelle continued. "We're planning on making a trip to Kentucky this year to purchase mares in foal to good Kentucky stallions with an eye on breeding them back to Louisiana-based stallions. I think we are poised to increase visibility with a topnotch facility and the great staff we have. We are all riding a big learning curve, and it is an ongoing education. Besides Kristen and myself we employ five people on the farm. Everyone is all-in and hands on. First and foremost is our dedication to hospitality and keeping the farm family friendly. We want to have a farm where everyone feels at home. It is more than just a place to board your mares, but a great place to visit and enjoy."

But as the starting gates swung open, Mobile Bay was slow and never recovered allowing the rest of the field to stake their claim in the night's biggest race.

Fractions were modest at best -24.99, 50.01, 1:14.40 — with 15-1 shot No One Greater leading the way before gracefully bowing out to leaving the stretch to Social Misfit and Lucky Andy. Both dueled down to the final stride as Social Misfit (\$18.20) got the nod by a head to hold 12-1 Lucky Andy in 1:45.94 over one and one sixteenth miles. Mageez, who also got off to a late start, mounted a late rally to run third.

"I knew Mobile Bay was the horse to beat and saw

he got left at the gates," said jockey Tim Thornton. "I kept an eye on him because I knew he would make a run. Once I go to the stretch, it was just a matter of getting my horse to the wire first and we made it."

The oldest runner in the race at 9 years of age, it was Social Misfit won for only the third time in 12 starts to improve to 17-62 for total career earnings of \$486,966.

"Trust Factor is a nice horse," said Hernandez, who won two stakes races on the card. "He broke good then put himself on the lead. At the quarter pole I asked him, and he finished up like we expected."

With eight wins in 18 starts for \$335,958, Trust Factor (\$5) won by a length in 1:45.45.

The final order of finish was Trust Factor, In the Navy, Extra Credit and Paddy O'Lionel.

HEALTH CONCERNS OF YOUNG HORSES

There are a number of diseases that show up more commonly in young horses, since they are still building immunity to common diseases and parasites.

One of the basic strategies for horse owners to avoid disease problems is to vaccinate foals and young horses, to start building their immunity to certain common equine diseases. Bruce Connally, an equine sportsmedicine veterinarian in Berthoud, Colorado, says respiratory disease in young horses can be minimized with a good vaccination program.

"The main recommendations regarding vaccination against influenza, for instance, is to vaccinate all horses 3 years old and under or any horses that are subjected to exposure from horses outside their own farm. Influenza can be a really big issue for young horses, and not that serious for adults that already have some immunity and exposure," he says.

Routine vaccinations, particularly with properly timed first injections and appropriate boosters, can help the young horse build a foundation for immunity. "Influenza is one of the main ones we think about for youngsters, along with tetanus. You want to get their immunity started," says Connally. The things to vaccinate for, and age to start, are listed in the AAEP's recommendations. This is something you should also discuss with your own veterinarian, especially when working on a herd health program for a breeding

farm.

Warts

One issue that is mainly a young horse problem is warts. These are not a health hazard (usually just cosmetic) unless they become so large that they obstruct the nostrils or make the area so sore that the horse won't eat. The most common warts seen on young horses tend to appear around the muzzle.

"We rarely have to treat warts because they run their course and disappear after the young horse mounts an immune response against them," says Connally.

Tia Nelson, DVM (veterinarian/farrier in Helena, Montana) says these warts on the muzzle are often called "yearling warts" or "two-year-old warts" because they almost always appear in young horses rather than adults. "Most of the time they are not a problem for the horse. Occasionally they can be painful, so if you are training the young horse and trying to put a halter or a bridle on, it might cause the horse to resist," she says.

Usually these warts go away after a time, disappearing about as quickly as they appeared. If they cause problems (becoming large and in the way, creating issues with bridling, for instance), they can be treated to hasten their disappearance.

"Typically we simply try to talk the owner into ignoring them because in most horses they run their course quickly. Then they are gone and the horse usually has immunity against warts for the rest of its life. Once in a while, however, we see some that are really awful—so thick and large that the young horse has a hard time eating. To get rid of them, we sedate the horse and use a pair of pliers to crush one or more of the warts deeply enough to make it bleed," she explains. Warts are caused by a virus, so stimulating the immune system by crushing the warts--getting the wart virus into the bloodstream--acts like a vaccination.

"This signals the immune system that an intruder is present, allowing the horse's body mounts an immune response (to fight the warts) quicker than when you simply leave the warts alone. Usually within a week to 10 days they shrink up and are all gone. In the meantime, we may give the young horse some bute or banamine to ease the discomfort while recovering," she says.

Strangles And Other Respiratory Infections

"Strangles, influenza and rhino are probably managed best with a good biosecurity program rather than by vaccination. The vaccines are fairly effective, but not spectacular. To rely on vaccines, without biosecurity, is a huge mistake," says Connally.

"We need to keep the babies from being exposed to other horses, and it makes sense, vaccination-wise, to try to protect young horses during their weanling

through 2-year-old years as they move out of the biosecurity of their home pasture. You need to start on their first vaccinations at the recommended ages and do the appropriate boosters. Influenza vaccinations are important up to 3 years of age, and I wish the rhino vaccines were more effective," he says.

"One of the veterinarians at Colorado State University doing research on rhino could not find any young horses that were not already sero-positive. This virus is everywhere. Young horses have some natural immunity just because they've been exposed. We know the vaccines are not very effective and don't give much protection. That same researcher told me that the vaccines simply decrease the amount of virus the horse sheds when it's sick, but won't prevent it from getting sick." Vaccination mainly helps keep the disease from spreading so readily through the herd.

Biosecurity is the best disease prevention, especially on a farm where there are young horses. "Using vaccine is great, but biosecurity when raising young horses is extremely important. When I worked with racehorses I had one client who every year could count on his 2-year-olds doing fine in training and staying healthy at his



own place—and then he'd take them to the track and at least half of them would be unable to run in their first race because of respiratory disease. This illustrates the biosecurity issue. You couldn't completely fix the problem with vaccines alone," says Connally.

Young horses tend to be more vulnerable to respiratory diseases than adults, especially if they are stressed at weaning or become exposed to contagious diseases. "It could be strangles, influenza, Rhodococcus, herpes virus or some other virus or bacteria," says Nelson. "As a start, make sure mares are well vaccinated before the foals are born, so the foals will obtain antibodies soon after birth (via colostrum). Then we hope that as these maternal immunities are waning, their own immune systems are starting to take over this protective role."

This raises questions regarding the best age to vaccinate foals. "It depends on the vaccine. Influenza vaccine has a bad reputation if you give it too young because there is some evidence that the foal then has a difficult time gaining immunity. Usually 6 months old is when we start vaccinating for some diseases. You can start tetanus vaccination and West Nile at 4 months, but you wait longer to start vaccinating against influenza."

Strangles is a controversial vaccine, and something you might not vaccinate for unless you've had a problem with strangles on your farm. There are some situations where your veterinarian might feel you need to vaccinate. "We had a strangles outbreak here last year. Generally, strangles vaccination is not recommended, except in the face of an outbreak—to give horses some protection. The main thing is to not vaccinate horses that have already been exposed, or horses that have high titers, or you increase the risk for them to develop purpura hemorrhagica," Nelson explains.

It's a good idea to consult with your veterinarian regarding all the dos and don'ts of vaccinations. "Regarding strangles, even many veterinarians are not sure what we should do. Strangles is a very serious disease, and the vaccine itself has some drawbacks," says Nelson.

"Last year several horses died of strangles in our area. This can be a scary disease and you need to work with your veterinarian regarding vaccination. This is something I don't recommend routine vaccination for, however, unless you have a real reason. The AAEP core vaccines are EEE, WEE, tetanus, West Nile and rabies. They do not include flu, rhino, or strangles," she points out. If your horses are not exposed to other horses (with no horses coming and going) with good biosecurity, you shouldn't need to worry about those. If you are taking horses around the country, however, that's a different situation.

Respiratory diseases in young horses must be dealt with on a caseby-case basis regarding circumstances, exposure to other horses, etc. Discuss herd health with your veterinarian. "Every farm should have a good working relationship with a veterinarian. If you have a problem, it is important to have hands-on help from someone who is familiar with your region, the diseases, the local farm, etc." she says.

There are also some unscrupulous individuals and organizations that operate here, not to help the horses but to line their pockets while competing for media attention. The most important thing you can do to make sure that your donation does not leave you with a false sense of accomplishment is to do your homework before you send them money!

The Jockey Club has a program that adds a fee to your foal registration payment to help fund equine rescue and re-homing efforts. "Thoroughbred owners and breeders can select one of the designated amounts or an amount of their choice to the checkoff program on the Application for Foal

Registration form or during the payment process on Interactive Registration[™]."In case you may wonder how much of that money goes to help horses in Louisiana that would be zero. Zero dollars. Over just a few years, this amounts to hundreds of thousands of dollars that have been siphoned out of Louisiana. If each of you would please call The Jockey Club at (800) 444-8521 or (859) 224-2700 and tell them to give you an option for this money to remain in our state it would be a tremendous help to us at Louisiana Horse **Rescue Association!**

Right now there are major news networks coming to our state and asking why there are no official programs that support the basic welfare of our horses. All of the bickering, greed, infighting and back-stabbing among the unscrupulous money hungry individuals and organizations doesn't help our state at all, doesn't help any horses and most importantly it is a black eye on horse racing in general.

If you are wondering, like we often do, exactly what needs to be done to redirect some of this publicity and create some "real" positive action, well, we at LHRA just happen to have a plan. Although rather extensive, our solution can be outlined in a few steps that I will share here and requires the involvement of the Louisiana Racing Commission, which should be involved in this anyway. An appointment to the Louisiana Racing Commission is a huge responsibility that governs a large industry, a huge tourism draw and affects the livelihood of hundreds, if not thousands, of families in Louisiana. It is paramount that we have knowledgeable individuals in these positions if we want this industry to flourish – individuals that see the big picture and are willing to work to make all of the separate parts work together. A few of the things that need to be done are:

- 1. Create a task force and develop a marketing strategy to shine a positive light on horse racing in Louisiana.
- 2. Create rules that prevent individuals involved in horse slaughter from being involved in the racing industry.
- 3. Create a horse-friendly publicity campaign that shows the general public how horses are treated after their racing careers are over. If we keep publicizing all of the negatives we could lose the entire industry.
- 4. Create continuity throughout the horse racing industry by requiring an appointed member from each aspect of the Louisiana horse racing community. The seated members of the Louisiana Racing Commission should include a member from the board of the LTBA, HBPA, LQHBA, someone from the rescue community, a representative from LSU vet school, and


maybe a few other areas of our racing community. We need a Commission made up of people that know this industry.

This plan has a lot of other parts but these are the most important. We only want the industry to thrive and the animals to be treated with respect and the care they deserve regardless of which organization gets the credit. At this time we are an all-volunteer 501©3 and 100% of every dollar collected by LHRA goes right back to our horses. There are some other good organizations in our state as well and we welcome their efforts here! All we ask of you is to be cautious and be involved, even just the slightest bit will help our industry. When any organization asks you to contribute money and then uses it for "administrative fees", lavish employee salaries and fancy advertising campaigns nobody wins, especially not the horses of Louisiana. Maybe some of us get a false sense of something positive, but that is all.

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Oh Brother!

Louisiana natives and brothers jockey Calvin Borel and trainer, Cecil Borel, have had careers that were related not just by the horses but by blood.

On a sunny Sunday afternoon at Ellis Park in Henderson, Kentucky, it would be easy to miss the family having a picnic under a willow tree just over a fence at the far end of the paddock. In riding pants and boots, Calvin Borel enjoys time between races with his wife, nine-month-old Chase and Renee's four-year-old son,

Stephen, adopted by Calvin. They had been in Henderson most of the week, combining work with a family vacation.

He is a man who has climbed the pinnacle and who treasures time and life with his family. He has also had a family of origin to treasure -parents who supported him pursuing riding full-time at a very early age, and most important, Cecil, who couldn't have been a better teacher, guide, friend, and brother.

Early in his career, a broken leg sustained on a bush track ridegone-bad, (perhaps the first of close to 40 broken bones that would follow in his career), sent Calvin back home and an eventual reunion with Cecil. There's a lot that created their relationship: a difference of 14 years

between the two; ever-present horses on a farm in Catahoula, Louisiana for the boys

to ride;

a Cajun culture spiced heavily with "bush track" racing with jockeys as young as eight years old; and last, but probably most important, trainer and jockey careers that dovetailed.

The scene featured cussing a sailor would admire, familiarity breeding genuine contempt, and the tough kind of brotherly love that can only come from, well, a brother. For who knows how many times, Cecil Borel, at the time a Thoroughbred trainer, watched younger brother Calvin earn his nickname "Calvin Bo-Rail" afresh. It was another patented bootscraper race down on the rail at Louisville's Churchill Downs, Calvin once again proving that the shortest distance between the gate and the wire can often be the fastest. Never mind that it can be the most dangerous. Never mind, that is, unless you're Cecil and that's "Boo" out there risking an addition to 38 (or is it 39?) broken bones or worse accumulated in a storied riding career. There's always another win on the racing card, but there's no replacement for a brother, hence the sputtering and fuming of Cecil on his brother's risky riding.

The funny thing that Cecil wouldn't want reminding of is that he is the one who taught Calvin to go to the rail to save ground, a factor, in no small part, behind at least one of three Kentucky Derby-winning rides in only a four-year span. That "rail ride" was on Mine that Bird in 2009 that is, perhaps, the most famous of Calvin's wins and one of the most dramatic finishes in Derby history.

It wasn't all that Cecil taught Calvin, and, if you totaled the lessons, they would exceed the wins--5,000 and counting for the Hall of Fame jockey—in importance. Calvin said his brother taught him not only how to ride but how to live. It accounts for Calvin getting serious if not sad when asked if there's anything he can tease his brother about in an interview for this story. "He needs to come train again," he said of Cecil, retired from racing since 2014 and living back in south Louisiana.

Calvin sorely misses Cecil. Yes, the rides continue for the 51-yearold jockey. But it's not the same for him who got to his big brother's barn pre-dawn at Churchill Downs for many years to muck stalls, gallop horses, and win more than a few races together.

There's a lot that created their

relationship: a difference of 14 years between the two; ever-present horses on a farm in Catahoula, Louisiana for the boys to ride; a Cajun culture spiced heavily with "bush track" racing with jockeys as young as eight years old; and last, but probably most important, trainer/jockey careers that dovetailed.

Calvin's first memory of Cecil, in fact, was as a jockey at one of those bush tracks. "I was probably about four or five, and he'd put me up on horses. That's what I remember," Calvin said with a smile.

Calvin's first memory of riding, however, was of his pony dragging him across a field. "My brother-inlaw was telling me to be careful because it was wet." The pony fell and got back up with Calvin's foot through the stirrup and the rest of him bumping and scraping along the ground. "When we got to the gate, there was no way we were both going to pass," said Calvin, who either forgot how the "ride/drag" ended or doesn't want to remember the first of many "spills".

Cecil has said he saw something in "Boo" as a small boy that foretold a jockey career. Part of it may have been the courage to get back on that pony and then, only a few years later, to ride speeding Quarter Horses charging down one side of a rail splitting a quarter-mile or so straight on the bush tracks. "The first one I rode on was in Abbeville, a little bush track called Clement's. I was eight.

"I was raised on a horse, really and truly," Calvin said with earnestness accompanied by a smile.

It's well-known that Calvin dropped out of school in the eighth

grade at age 12, something that might embarrass anyone else who hasn't ridden horses earning \$130,000,000 million, won multiple Kentucky Derbies, and dined at the White House with President George W. Bush and Queen Elizabeth.


Even his time in school was maybe more devoted to horses than book knowledge. "Most of the time I'd carry a whip with me to school," he said. "Cecil told me to do that to learn how to switch hands," a necessary skill for a jockey. It's not as easy as it sounds with a handful of reins on the back of a horse going 40 miles per hour. Cecil also had Calvin carry a stopwatch when working out horses. "I was only eight or nine years old, but I was studying pace," Calvin said, acknowledging that he still has a "good clock in my head."

"Going to the bushes" was next for Calvin and an "agent" of sorts, with a name a screenwriter for a movie about Cajuns couldn't pass up. "I'd go with O'Neal Boudreaux to the bushes every weekend," he recalled. "I'd go stay at his house every Friday night and he'd take me to the bushes Saturdays and Sundays at tracks around Breaux Bridge, Abbeville, and all over.

"He'd kind of go around and make sure I was riding people he knew.

"Cecil taught me how to ride but Boudreaux and another man, 'JuJu' Blanchard, helped me a lot."

While Calvin was riding bush tracks, the bane of many jockeys, weight, was sidelining Cecil from his own riding career which had taken him as far away as Chicago's Thoroughbred tracks. A literal break, a broken leg for Calvin suf-

fered in a bush track race, provided the figurative break both Borel boys needed to launch careers that brought them together on the racetrack as jockey and trainer.

"Cecil came home one winter and, matter of fact, he was crawfishing," said Calvin. "A neighbor gave him a few horses and he started training." Thus began a training career that took Cecil to Evangeline Downs, Delta Downs, and the now defunct Jefferson Downs in Kenner outside New Orleans. The broken leg and departure from formal education led Calvin to leave home to live with his brother and wife, Debbie, on the Louisiana racing circuit. From age 12 on, according to Calvin, he was on the racetrack with his brother, galloping Cecil's horses and doing other barn tasks before getting his jockey's license at age 16. "They took me under their wing."

The influence of older brother and sister-in-law laid the groundwork for successfully handling the huge success and the things that would come for Calvin. "I wanted to ride, have success, live a good life, save my money, and do right," goals not set, unfortunately, by many "green kids" Calvin sees come on the racetrack as jockeys. Looking back, he had the good fortune of living with a combination employer, teacher, and, most important, "second father," according to Calvin.

Humility came with other life lessons from his older brother. "Cecil was proud of me, but he didn't let success go to my head." The next day, no matter how many winning rides the previous day, "I had to be there at work and keep working."

Their relationship helped Calvin in another respect: galloping his brother's horses he could, as he said, "ride comfortable" because he knew Cecil's horses like the back of his hand.

Cecil may have also known like the back of his own hand when Calvin hadn't given one of his mounts the best ride. "I won five out of six and got beat by a nose on that sixth one. I got to the sixteenth pole and went to go around two horses on the outside and, oh God, the horse started pulling up on me. I went back to the fence and got beat like that [holding up fingers separated by less than an inch]. Cecil chewed my ass," Calvin remembered, shaking his head, but smiling at the memory.

No, it wasn't the sole lesson that taught him to "ride the fence" but one of many.

Calvin also learned a secret many jockeys either don't know or do know but choose to ignore: "A horse will go through a hole you would not imagine on the rail instead of going between two hors-

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es." He added, "but a lot of horses don't like to run there. You have to be aggressive with them as a lot of them would rather go around."

A better secret to Calvin's riding style is that he will actually teach a horse to hug the rail in morning workouts, something that is rare if not unheard of with jockeys hardworking enough to be on a racetrack as early as 6 a.m.

"When you get on them as a two-year-old you can teach them to get against the fence as close as you can...some of them. They may get against it but they won't like it. They'll go to switching leads and 'cross-firing' (a hind leg on one side makes contact with the front leg on the other side, disrupting the horse's gait). But if you teach them early, they'll switch leads and fall against the rail, and just run on."

Calvin may not have known Mine That Bird would go to the rail in the 2009 Kentucky Derby, but he definitely knew not going to the inside had cost the horse wins in previous races. He studied tapes of the horse's two-year-old starts and could understand why trainer Chip Woolley wanted him to take the horse well back off the pace in the early going. What he couldn't understand was prior riders going to the outside with the horse to circle the field and getting beat by short distances. "I knew if I rode a smart race he'd have a shot," particularly after the horse galloped out the last eighth-of-a-mile for Calvin in an exceptional 11 seconds after a five-eighths mile workout leading up to the Derby.

Hard work and horsemanship are things Calvin traces back directly to his and his brother's time on the bush tracks. They are gone now, a part of life in south Louisiana probably never to return. Also gone, according to Calvin, are good jockeys originating from those Louisiana bush tracks. "It's kind of funny, but ever since they closed the bush tracks, you don't see that many Louisiana riders coming along." He names Robby Albarado, Brian Hernandez, Corey Lanerie, and the retired Shane Sellers as maybe the last of the good Cajun riders.

Speaking of his brother as well as other South Louisiana jockeys, Calvin said wistfully, "We are a dying breed."

That being said, there is no end in sight for Calvin. After a brief, March-to-August 2016 retirement he returned to riding. He also has begun a new life with wife Renee and his first child, Chase Clovis Borel, named after his father, Clovis.





Mobile Bay Retires to Whispering Oaks

After an outstanding racing career, Mobile Bay, two-time Accredited Louisiana Bred Horse of the Year, has been retired from the track. He will soon take up residence at Carrol Castille's showcase breeding facility, Whispering Oaks Thoroughbred Farm in Carencro, Louisiana. There he will begin preparation for his stud career for the 2019 breeding season. Mobile Bay is owned by Irwin Olian's Tigertail Ranch and was trained for his entire career by popular local favorite Victor Arceneaux.

Mobile Bay, a 2012 dark bay or brown son of Lone Star Special out of Tranquility Bay, ran from ages three to six, hitting the board in 21 of 29 lifetime starts. He won eleven stakes, often showing speed in route races of 1 1/16 to 1 1/8 miles, including the G2 Super Derby, open company stakes such as the Sunland Park Handicap, the Maxxam Gold Cup and the Zia Park Derby, as well Louisiana Bred Stakes including the Louisiana Champions Day Classic at the Fair Grounds twice. He placed in another five stakes including the G3 Oklahoma Derby. His Lifetime earnings of \$1,246,440 rank him 4th among all-time Leading Accredited Louisiana Bred Runners. Cabo's Rumor First Stakes Winner for Amanecer de Oro

Northpointe Thoroughbreds' homebred Cabo's Rumor wore down rivals in the final furlong and drew off for a three-length victory in the \$60,000 Louisiana Cup Juvenile Stakes at Louisiana Downs Aug. 4 to become the first winner and first black-type winner for his sire, Amanecer de Oro.

Trained by Steven Duke, Cabo's Rumor was making his fourth career start. Out of the Kafwain mare The Rumor's True, Cabo's Rumor broke his maiden at second asking June 18 at Louisiana Downs.

Amanecer de Oro was a multiple stakes winner, with all his blacktype victories coming in Louisiana. The son of Afternoon Deelites retired with seven wins from 31 starts and \$401,193 in earnings. He is a half brother to stakes winners Dynamic Time and Tactical Brush.

Amanecer de Oro stood the 2018 season at Holly Hill Farm in Louisiana for an advertised fee of \$1,250. He has two starters from his first crop of racing age.

Atchata First Stakes Winner for Apriority

Heiligbrodt's Atchata became the first black-type winner for her sire. Atchata, a 2-year-old daughter of Apriority competed in the filly division of the D.S. Shine Young Futurity for Louisiana-breds, on July 14 at Evangeline Downs. She dueled for the lead and kicked away in the lane to win by 6 1/2 lengths.

The win was the second in three starts for the filly, who debuted May 24 on grass for trainer Steve Asmussen. She finished third in that maiden special weight debut at Belmont Park. Atchata won next time out going six furlongs on the Belmont inner turf but was switched to the dirt for the Futurity.

Apriority raced from age 3 to 7 and won the 2011 Mr. Prospector Stakes (G3) as a 4-year-old. The son of Grand Slam retired with a record of 6-9-3 from 36 starts. Four of his second-place finishes were in stakes, including a nose difference in the 2011 Churchill Downs Stakes (G2). He also finished second to Morning Line in that year's Carter Handicap (G1).

Standing at Elite Thoroughbreds in Louisiana, Apriority has a 2018 stud fee of \$2,000.

Victory Trip First Winner, Starter for Guilt Trip

Victory Trip went gate-to-wire to win by 7 3/4 lengths June 13 to represent Guilt Trip's first winner from the stallion's first starter.

Victory Trip, a 2-year-old colt bred by Terry Adcock in Louisiana, broke on top to set fractions of :23.06 and :46.71 through a halfmile and finished out the 4 1/2-furlong maiden test in a final time of :53.17 over a fast track.

With no challengers in the remaining field of four, Victory Trip sped to a 7 3/4-length score.

The colt was purchased at the 2017 Equine Sales of Louisiana yearling sale by his connections for \$20,000. He is out of the Songandaprayer mare Anne Margaret.

Guilt Trip, a 9-year-old son of Pulpit, was campaigned by Gary and Mary West and trainers Chad Brown, Bob Baffert, and Wayne Catalano. After breaking his maiden in his second start with Brown and following it with an allowancelevel score, he was unable to make the grade as a 3-year-old. But he returned the following year to take the Strub Stakes (G2) with Baffert.

Bred by Winsong Farm in Kentucky, Guilt Trip is out of the Quiet American mare Mysterieuse Etoile. From two crops the stallion has 67 registered foals to date.

Guilt Trip stands at Jay Adcock's Red River Farms in Louisiana for \$2,500.

Pickett First Stakes Winner for Goldencents

Spendthrift Farm's Goldencents was represented by his first blacktype winner July 14 when his son Pickett scored a nine-length, gateto-wire romp in the D.S. Shine Young Futurity for colts at Evangeline Downs.

Trained by Glenn Delahoussaye, the 2-year-old gelding broke sharply in the 5 1/2-furlong sprint, shook free from the rest of the pack as they hit the turn, and drew off in the stretch under a brisk drive to finish in 1:05.37.

Saturday's win was the second for Pickett, who broke his maiden May 30 with an equally speedy 6 1/2-length win going 4 1/2 furlongs.

Goldencents, whose three grade 1 wins included consecutive Breeders' Cup Dirt Miles, is the son of fellow Spendthrift stallion Into Mischief . The now 8-year-old horse broke his maiden on debut at Del Mar and competed in graded stakes races for the rest of his career.

Goldencents retired in 2014 with a record of 7-7-0 from 18 starts and career earnings of \$3,044,000. His advertised fee for the 2018 breeding season was \$12,500.

Lagartijo is Real Solution's First Winner

Blue Star Racing's freshman sire and grade 1 winner Real Solution picked up his first winner July 7 when his son Lagartijo won a 5 1/2furlong maiden claiming race in his third start at Hipodromo de las Americas in Mexico City.

The colt out of the winning Danehill daughter Keeping Watch had been making steady progress since he debuted June 1, when he finished third, four lengths behind the winner. In his next start, Lagartijo was second by only a half-length. Then, in breaking his maiden, he won in near gate-towire fashion by 3 1/4 lengths in a final time of 1:07.20 for owner Cuadra San Jorge.

Ken and Sarah Ramsey bred Lagartijo in Kentucky. The Ramseys also bred and raced Real Solution, who won the Arlington Million Stakes (G1T) and Knob Creek Manhattan Stakes (G1T). Real Solution placed in the Man o' War Stakes (G1T), Joe Hirsch Turf Classic Invitational Stakes (G1T), and Woodford Reserve Manhattan Handicap (G1T).

The son of Kitten's Joy entered stud at Ramsey Farm with \$1,374,175 in earnings. After one breeding season, the stallion was transferred to Calumet Farm, where he stood two seasons before being shipped to Blue Star Racing in Louisiana. The stallion stands at Blue Star Racing for \$5,000.

Indigo Girl Dies

It is with great sadness Randy Davis & Associates, Inc. announced the recent death of multiple stakes winning mare Indigo Girl. Sired by Leestown out of Sister of Soul (Bluebird), Indigo Summer 2018 Girl won 8 stakes races from 2-6 years in addition to several 2nds and 3rds in stakes company. With total winnings of \$486,000 she was Leestown's leading female earner.

Farm Manager Sandra Coffman is raising the 30 day old orphaned Tizway filly Indigo left behind at Mathews Farm in Benton.

Indigo Girl was a crack sprinter, but was able to harness her speed to win a stakes going a flat mile. She was trained by Sam Breaux and was able to compile a 13-4-2 record from 25 starts.

Delta Jackpot Will Not Be Renewed in 2018

The \$1 million GIII Delta Jackpot S., which had been the signature race of the Delta Downs meet, is no more.

According to Delta Downs management, the local horsemen's group, the Louisiana HBPA, was opposed to putting so much money into one race and one card at the expense of overnight purses, and when the two parties could not reach an agreement, it was decided to do away with the race.

"While it was our original intent to move forward with the Delta Downs Jackpot this year, we changed course after lengthy discussions with the state's horsemen," said Delta's Vice President and General Manager Steve Kuypers. "They made it clear to us that they were vehemently opposed to proceeding with the Jackpot, as they felt the prize money could be put to better use in strengthening purses for the rest of our racing schedule."

Jackpot Day had also included the \$400,000 GIII Delta Princess S.

for 2-year-old fillies, the \$250,000 Delta Mile and the \$200,000 Treasure Chest S. Those races also will not be renewed.

The Jackpot card was canceled in 2017 after Hurricane Harvey hit the eastern part of Texas, which is where Delta draws the majority of its casino customers. Management and horsemen feared that there would be such a downturn in business due to the hurricane that the money would not be available for the Jackpot races. Those fears never materialized, as business at Delta's casino remained steady. The money that would have gone to the Jackpot card was instead put into overnight races and by the end of Delta's meet earlier this year, horses were racing for huge purses.

Trainer Ron Faucheux, a member of the HBPA Board, said horsemen at Delta and its sister track, Evangeline Downs, came to believe that the money would be better spent on races that normally involve local horsemen.

"Lousiana racing has taken a fall," he said. "You've see it in the breeding industry and everywhere else over the last five, six years. The main thing is to help the locals

Billy Cannon

Billy Cannon passed away peacefully in his home early Sunday morning, May 20, 2018, LSU announced. He was 80 years old.

A Baton Rouge native, Cannon was the winner of the 1959 Heisman Trophy as a halfback, and led the Tigers to the 1958 national championship. He was a longtime member of the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Assoc.

He was inducted into the LSU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1975 and into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2008. He was named LSU Alumnus of the Year in 2010.

"There may be no other figure in LSU sports who was more beloved and revered," LSU Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics Joe Alleva said. "His loss will be felt across the world today. The LSU family mourns with the Cannon family. He will always be a Tiger and will always be in our memories."

"To say that Billy Cannon was legendary is an understatement," LSU President Dr. F. King Alexander said. "His talent catapulted LSU Athletics into the national limelight, but more than that, he had unwavering commitment to his alma mater. He will forever remain a part of the LSU legacy throughout the nation."

David Beard was the President and Leader of Great American Foods. He led the company through over 40 years of a successful business and provided careers for many employees. He opened his first restaurant, David Beard's Catfish Village, in 1969 on Highway 155 near Ore City. David learned his skills, not from school, but from hard work, determination and putting quality above all else.

Allen J. "Pummy" Guillotte, Jr.

Allen Joseph Guillotte Jr., a native of St. Mary Parish, longtime former resident of Franklin, and a resident of Kentwood for the past 17 years, passed away at the age of 71 on Thursday, May 17, 2018, at as much as we possibly can."

Delta and Evangeline are owned by Boyd Gaming and the vast majority of money for purses at both tracks comes from slots revenue. "We are hoping this move will allow a transfer of money from Delta to Evangeline," he said. "The purses over the summer at Evangeline have gotten depleted over the last several years...With the extra money now available, we believe the purses at Delta will be what they were at the beginning of last year's meet and we can also boost purses substantially at Evangeline."

FairGrounds Concludes 17-18 Meet

Trainer Brad Cox and jockey Shaun Bridgmohan added another Fair Grounds Race Course & Slots championship title to their accomplished resumes for the 2017-18 Winter Meet while owners Maggi Moss and Brad Grady tied for winningest owner with 12 victories apiece.

Moss won her first title at the Fair Grounds since the Winter Meet in 2014-15. It was a first title for owner Brad Grady, whose meet was highlighted by stakes victories with Triple Chelsea in the Jan 5 Pan Zareta Stakes and the March 10 Nelson J. Menard Memorial Overnight Stakes. It was a second consecutive winningest meet for trainer Brad Cox who completed the Winter Meet with 54 trips to the winner's circle at a 30% win rate. The highlight for Cox's meet came when Monomoy Girl took the Gr. II Rachel Alexandra Stakes on February 17. He took two homebred stakes events with Inveniam Viam who won both the Si Cima Stakes and the Louisiana Champions Day Ladies Stakes.

Jockey Shaun Bridgmohan scored his first title since taking the 2009-10 Winter Meet. Bridgmohan scored 66 victories on the meet, only one up on newcomer Adam Beschizza.

Pin Oak Stable's Synchrony was voted Horse of the Winter Meet by Fair Grounds media and racing officials. Trained by Mike Stidham, the son of Tapit won the Gr. III Fair Grounds Handicap and Gr. II Muniz Memorial Stakes.

Live Thoroughbred action will resume in November.

Oaklawn Park to Extend 2019 Meet


Oaklawn Park plans to make the most significant change to its racing schedule since World War II.

The Arkansas oval traditionally runs its biggest race, the \$1 million Arkansas Derby (G1), on closing day. But in 2019, Oaklawn will open Jan. 25 and run through May 4, three weeks after the Arkansas Derby.

April 11, the Arkansas Racing Commission unanimously approved Oaklawn's request to race 57 days in 2019. Oaklawn's new schedule pushes its start date two weeks later than normal and end date three weeks later than normal, meaning dates for the Hot Springs, Ark., oval will conflict, or further conflict, with venues that normally receive its horses following the meet's conclusion.

"Frankly, it's all about the weather," said Oaklawn President Louis Cella, whose family has owned Oaklawn for more than a century. Oaklawn was scheduled to race 57 days this year, but it lost two dates in January to winter weather. Over the last decade, Oaklawn has lost 14 days in January due to winter weather.

David Longinotti, Oaklawn's director of racing, said the new schedule will not change the placement of the Arkansas Derby, which will continue to be run three weeks before the Kentucky Derby..

All nineteen Louisiana bred twoyear-olds that went through the sale, sold in the ring for a total of \$611,200. The Louisiana bred average of \$32,168 was well above the sale average of \$25,737.

Texas Juvenile Sale Posts Increased Gross, Average Nearly Steady


The 2018 Texas 2-Year-Olds in Training Sale on the grounds of Lone Star Park concluded April 10, with a sizable increase in gross sales and a slight decrease in average compared to last year's smaller catalogue. A total of 106 horses went through the ring at the sale operated by the Texas Thoroughbred Association in partnership with Lone Star Park and 84 horses found new homes. Last year's auction included 93 head with 70 selling.

Gross sales this year totaled \$2,161,900, up 15.4% from last

year's mark of \$1,873,900. This year's average was \$25,737, down 3.9% from last year's \$26,770, and the median slipped 18.2% from \$16,000 to \$13,100. Buybacks this year came in at 20.8% compared to 24.7% last year.

New Award For Top-Placing Louisiana-Bred At 2018 Thoroughbred Makeover

Ten Louisianabreds took part in the 2017 Thoroughbred Makeover, competing in eventing, dressage, show jumpers, show hunters, and polo. Louisiana was ranked eighth and Canadian among states provinces for the most horses entered.

"The Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association continues to make an investment in the future of our Thoroughbreds by helping our former runners secure a beautiful life after their time on the racetrack is done," said Roger Heitzmann III, secretary-treasurer of LTBA. "We believe that by assisting the Retired Racehorse Project, former racers are able to show others the true beauty of the Thoroughbred, as well as their continued usefulness."

The LTBA award will be presented to the Louisiana-bred that earns the highest percentage of the total possible score in any of the ten disciplines offered. Almost 800 trainers have been accepted to compete in the 2018 event. There are 27 CDEs encompassing a broad range of career opportunities from communications to mechanics. Some events allow students to compete as individuals, while others allow them to compete in teams.

"That commitment matches with ours as we work to support future horsemen/horsewomen, veterinarians, farriers and others in the horse business," said Heitzmann.

Warren Harang called the meeting to order and asked Roger Heitzmann to call the roll. A quorum was present and the meeting was ready to proceed with business.

Charlotte Clavier led us in prayer.

Brett Brinkman made a motion to approve the minutes of the April 10, 2018 Board of Directors Meeting. Tom Early seconded the motion, which was voted on and passed unanimously.

Warren Harang III then requested from the Board any conflict changes that needed to be noted. Hearing none the meeting continued.

Warren then called on Mr. Greg Romig, of the Accounting Firm LaPorte, to present the Audit Report as will be reported to the Legislative Auditor.

Before Mr. Romig began Roger Heitzmann introduced to the Board Perry Segura and Zeke Zeringue who are currently running for the Board of Directors, and were on hand to get a head start on the well being of the organization if they are elected.

Greg Romig of LaPorte, APAC, presented a draft of the 990, the informational return LTBA is required to file annually with the IRS. Greg Romig completed his presentation and opened the floor for questions. After brief discussion, the 990 draft was unanimously accepted as presented.

Greg then presented a draft of the audited financial statements for the Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association (LTBA) for the year ended December 31, 2017. LaPorte audited the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets – modified cash basis of the LTBA, a non-profit organization, as of December 31, 2017, and related statements of revenues and expenses – modified cash basis, and changes in net assets – modified cash basis, for the year then ended, and related notes to the financial statements. Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with modifiedcash basis of accounting. The auditor's responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on their audit.

The audit was conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, as issued by the Comptroller of the United States.

Mr. Romig stated, in LaPorte's opinion, except for the effects of accruing certain revenues as discussed, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and net assets of Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association as of December 31, 2017 and its related revenues and expenses and changes in net assists for the year then ended, in accordance with the basis of accounting described in note one of the audit (modified cash basis).

Mr. Romig pointed out that they did not find material weakness; however with the recent work force reductions mandated by the Board of Directors to reduce expenses, the board must monitor activities of the Association closely to ensure the audit requirement of separation of duties is not compromised in the future. He points to the finance committee and to the board to be reminded to keep an eye on the process used by the association. Exposure to risk is higher with employees assuming multiple jobs due to operational cuts.

Mr. Romig called the Directors attention to the functional classification of expenses. Financial accounting standards require disclosure of expenses between the functional classification of program and support. For the year ended December 31, 2017, 91% of the Association's expenditures were for program services (all award and purse supplementation programs). Approximately 9% of all expenses were for supporting activities.

He then opened the floor for questions.

Michele Rodriguez questioned why slots were down so much. Was it just Delta Downs? Roger Heitzmann answered that it was an accumulation of all the tracks being down overall.

Charlotte Clavier made the motion to accept the draft of the Annual Audit as presented. Michelle LaVoice seconded the motion, which was voted on and passed unanimously.

This report will be submitted to the Louisiana Legislative Auditor no later than June 30, 2018, as required by law.

Mr. Romig then proceeded to address the Board and inform them about the Louisiana Legislative Auditor's state wide agreed upon procedures (implemented 4/01/2017). These procedures are expected to be followed by local governments and quasi-public organizations, including nonprofits that meet the legal requirement to have an audit under the Audit Law. The management of Louisiana Thoroughbred Breeders Association fully cooperated with the mandatory testing of these agreed upon procedures.

Tom Early made the motion to accept the audit as presented. This motion was seconded by Charlotte Clavier, which was voted on and passed unanimously.

Ryan Robicheaux was introduced by Warren as the President of the Louisiana Quarter Horse Breeders Association. Ryan expressed his interest in working with us and was well received.
